Pacific University, Forest Grove, Or., Jan. 1.—The quarterly bulletin of the university, giving a summary of the work and calling attention to the interesting events of the first three months of the college year, is just out.

The football question receives considerable consideration. However, the bulletin says, "The college has just experienced, no doubt action will be taken until opportunity has been given to study the changes suggested by the rules committee."

President Fernin is quoted as follows: "No one who has followed the history of football and observed it as played in certain colleges can fail to note that it is not a game in which students engage as a means to such a high degree of enthusiasm of the student body."

Game Promotes Loyalty.
Intercollegiate football promotes loyalty to one's institution, as perhaps no other game. The fact of the student body being able to do. The enthusiasm with which the young man who has blood coursing through his veins is into football indicates that there is something of value in it.

There are no better fellows in the university, generally speaking, none at all stand higher for manliness and character than those who become actively interested in football. Nor do members of the team fall behind their fellows in scholarship and general room efficiency.

PORTLANDER WILL
TRAIN CLEVELAND

F. W. Schmieder of Multnomah
Club Signs Up With
Big Leaguers.

F. W. Schmieder, who for the past three years has taken care of the Multnomah club athletes, will train the Cleveland American baseball club next season. Schmieder has been in the position at a good salary some time ago, but had not decided to accept until today. He will leave for the south, where the Naps train, about the middle of February and will be accompanied by Speck Barkner, the Beaver pitcher sold to Cleveland.

Schmieder was recommended by Walter McCredie and Roger Cornell, the Portland club trainer. Cleveland had offered the place to Cornell, who also had offered from the Philadelphia Athletics and the Chicago White Sox to train them next season. Manager McCredie gave Cornell the same salary that the easterners offered him, and he remained on the coast.

Place Hard to Fill

Schmieder, who is familiarly known about the club as "Baron," is 35 years old and has been engaged in caring for athletes for the past six years. He was born in Los Angeles and got his first experience at the Los Angeles Athletic club. He quit that to look after the condition of a number of California boxers. He has been with the Multnomah club for three years, and his place will be hard to fill. Cornell regards Schmieder as the best young trainer he has ever seen, and Cornell knows whereof he speaks.

With the signing up of Schmieder, the fact is revealed that the big league managers are looking to the west as a recruiting ground for trainers and coaches. The first western trainer to go east and make a reputation handling baseball players was Harry Tuthill, now the handler of the Detroit Tigers. Tuthill gained his early experience in the training line in handling fighters. The Chicago White Sox have signed a well known colored trainer from Los Angeles to look after the men.

Oakland, Cal., Jan. 1.—Attorney Rollo J. Hugh of this city left today for New York to represent Mrs. Emma Seaman Bennett of Berkeley and Mrs. Elizabeth Seaman John of Oakland in a suit they have instituted to obtain part of the fortune their millionaire uncle, Robert Seaman, left to his wife, who was Nellie Bly, the globe trotter.

It developed after Seaman's death in 1903 that he had made several wills, one drawn at Wiesbaden in Germany, being the one upon which his widow's claims are based. It was also found that a great bulk of the \$5,000,000 estate of Seaman had been transferred to his wife during his lifetime.

Mrs. John and Mrs. Bennett, Seaman's nieces, not alone attacked the Wiesbaden will but alleged that the transfer of the estate was made while Seaman was mentally incompetent and unduly influenced by his wife.

AUSTRALIAN WANTS
ANOTHER BATTLE

Burns and Johnson Can Get
\$40,000 of Kangaroo
Land Gold.

San Francisco, Jan. 1.—Hugh McIntosh, the Australian fight promoter, wants to match Jack Johnson and Tommy Burns for another fight in the antipodes, according to a cablegram from a local sporting man.

McIntosh would match the big negro and Burns to fight for a purse of \$40,000 on a winner take all basis, next September. In his cable he declared that the money to guarantee the purse has already been deposited, and that Burns has affixed his signature to an agreement to fight.

It is known that the Australian sports have long wanted to see their favorite in action again with the champion. Burns has repeatedly declared his desire for the match. Johnson's attitude toward the proposition is problematical.

DRAIN LAKES AND
RECLAIM MUCH LAND

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Pendleton, Or., Jan. 1.—That the government will drain the lakes which have formed on the government project and that it will use much of the water thus accumulated a second time, is the announcement made by Mayor Newport of Hermiston. He says that steps have already been taken to lower the water in the largest of the lakes one foot by means of a ditch. This will uncover the greater part of 300 acres now under water. The remainder of the power station at that point it will be necessary to divert any of the water intended for irrigation purposes for the operation of the power plant, for the water will be used while en route to the thirsty fields.

It was at first feared that the water in these lakes could not be used a second time on account of the alkali accumulated in its percolations through the sandy soil. It has been demonstrated, however, that the water is free from alkali and can be used a second time without evil effects.

43.81 Inches of Rain in 1909.

Albany, Or., Jan. 1.—The total rainfall in Albany during the year 1909 was 43.81 inches, a little more than the average, which is 40 inches. The charge amount is due to a wet November when there was a precipitation of 11.86 inches.

GRANTS PERMIT
FOR NEW FLUME

City Authorizes Its Construction From Willamette Heights to Lake.

At a special meeting yesterday afternoon the city council passed an ordinance granting to the Lewis-Wiley syndicate of Seattle a permit to construct a flume from Willamette Heights to Guild's lake. The company will be required to put up a bond for \$5000 to guarantee the city against loss by reason of injury to any person, caused by a possible break in the flume, or otherwise. The flume must be constructed under the supervision of the city engineer. The permit granted may be revoked by the council at its pleasure.

A permit to build street railway tracks on streets in the vicinity of the new reservoir being constructed on Mount Tabor was granted to Robert Westfield & Co. The tracks will be temporary and are to be used for the purpose of carrying away the earth excavated from the reservoir site.

Authority to reconvey property bought from William Hayhurst by the park board was given to the mayor in an ordinance passed by the council yesterday. The city secured an option on a tract of land, a little more than 4 1/2 acres in area, but when the land was deeded an error in the description made the tract purchased only three quarters of an acre for which \$8400 was paid to Hayhurst. The city will give back the land and Hayhurst will give back the money and negotiations for the purchase of the property will be commenced anew.

George Tracey on Trial Soon.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 1.—The legal battle to save the life of George Tracey, charged with the brutal murder of Andy Rabal near Umatilla, will be opened on November 22, is about to start. Lot L. Feltham, an attorney of Weiser, Idaho, has been employed as attorney and has arrived to take up the case.

Tracey was given the opportunity of securing an attorney and being given a preliminary hearing, immediately following his arrest. Up until the present time, however, he neglected to avail himself of the opportunity offered. This was due principally to the seeming reluctance of relatives to come to his rescue.

NARROW ESCAPE
FROM COLLISION

Southern Pacific Officials Investigate—Quick Wit of Engineers Saves Lives.

Oakland, Cal., Jan. 1.—The Southern Pacific officials, investigating the narrow escape of the northbound coaster from Los Angeles, when Engineer E. C. Wright nearly ran his work train into the bay to avoid a head-on collision with the flyer Tuesday, had not placed the blame late today.

Engineer Wright was taking five flat cars and a caboose along the main tracks of the West Oakland freight yards, when the whistle of the oncoming flyer warned him of danger.

He opened wide the throttle of his engine and made for the siding, reaching the track and clearing the main line just in time for a brakeman to throw the switch as the flyer thundered by.

Recent repairs left the track of the siding projecting over the water of the bay, and Engineer Wright brought his train to a standstill as the wheels of the engine's forward truck left the track and dropped to the stone breakwater.

SCAR ON FACE CLUE
IN DYNAMITE CASE

Oakland, Cal., Jan. 1.—A deep scar on the face of a man arrested here today following his successful holdup of a woman in the tenderloin district, the police believe may serve to identify him as one of the men who attempted to dynamite the Southern Pacific station at Alvarado early this week.

The man, who was a revolver brand, was with the police. The description fits that furnished by Deputy Sheriff De Mattos of one of the dynamiters, whom he wounded at Alvarado. The man refused to tell his name. He will be held pending attempts at identification.
