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GERMAN SOCIETY
(WILL EIGHT "DRYS")

At Meeting Otto Kleeman
Elected President of Organization for Third Time.

Otto Kleeman of the Turn Verein of Portland, was for the third consecutive time elected the president of the German Speaking Societies of Oregon, at a meeting of the delegates from every branch of the organization in the state, held in the hall of the German Aid society yesterday afternoon. Mr. Kleeman was the organizer of the state federation, and has been its president since its inception.

Besides the regular election of officers, the society went into political discussion long enough to express its dislike of the prospect of Oregon going to have in 1910 or in any other year.

"We have no desire to mix in politics," said Otto Kleeman this morning, "but we do not intend to stand idly by and see our personal liberty taken away from us. We have always been accustomed to eat and drink what we wish without any law stopping us. We do not intend to give up that right now. We will fight any law or constitutional amendment making it a misdemeanor to drink liquor. We are not, however, lined up with the brewers or the liquor interests in any way, but will make an independent fight against the adoption of any such law."

BROUGHER'S LAST
SERMON HERE IS
ATTACK ON DRINK

Says Scenes in Saloons and Restaurants New Year's Eve Can Be Used as Argument for Prohibition.

Dr. Brougher preached last night at the White Temple to a crowded house on the subject of "Change Your Mind." It was a New Year's sermon, with an appeal to young people to leave the "low vaulted past" and raise their standard of living to the perfect ideal presented in the life and character of Jesus Christ. He put special emphasis upon the misery that sin brought into the world and said:

"The tempter led our first parents to believe that sin was a good thing and would be to their advantage. It has ever been thus. People usually begin sinning under the false impression that it is the road to happiness and that they will gain something by it. But all experience goes to show that the pleasures of sin are only for a season; then comes the shame, sorrow and disgrace."

Condemns New Year's Orgy.
"The word of God, the verdict of history, and observation and experience all cry in unison: Change your mind. It will debauch old and young, arrest and smother the high and low. The most shameless expression of sin last Friday night, New Year's eve, was to be seen according to the papers, in the big hotel grill of our city. There they drank and caroused in a more shameless manner than was to be found in the north and south."

So-called respectable people were the leaders in this drunken orgy. Yet these same hotel men tell us that they are opposed to prohibition. It is a well known fact that men and women who, in their own senses are perfectly proper, do the most disastrous, disgraceful things when under the influence of the intoxicating cup. It is not necessary for the enjoyment of life to indulge in a drink that robs you of your senses and gives added power to your lower nature, which finds expression in indecent actions.

Helps Prohibition.

"No man can deny that intoxicating liquors excite and inflame every lust and passion that degrades and brutalizes humanity. If we could have just a few more such scenes as this enacted to arouse an indifferent public to the danger that lurks in the big hotel grill where liquor is sold it will help on the cause of prohibition in the state of Oregon for 1910. The very center of all this devilishness was liquor drinking. There is no question about this."

"The scenes enacted Friday night will do more to refute the arguments of hotelkeepers against prohibition than any word that can be spoken. It is not necessary to sell liquor in the grill in order for people to have a pleasant evening. I have eaten with friends in some of these many times, listened to the music and had an enjoyable time and have touched a drop of liquor. The whole liquor business is an enemy to mankind, a destroyer of character and a menace to all purity and decency."

Quotes Abraham Lincoln.
"Abraham Lincoln once said, 'If slavery is not wrong, then nothing is wrong.' So say I to you, if drinking intoxicating liquors is not wrong—with its train of disease, disgrace and dishonor—then nothing is wrong. In the name of the pure mother who bore you, in the name of the pure wife that you desire for the queen of your home, in the name of the pure child, climb upon your knee and nestle in your arms, in the name of purity for all classes of society, in the name of all that is good and true and holy, as opposed to that which is low and vile and mean, I call upon the morally upright people of Portland to unite against this demon of drink and stop its manufacture and shut it out of our hotels, our homes, our city and our state."

TALKS ON RELIGION
AND MORAL FREEDOM

Father Thompson's contention, made a week ago, that "moral freedom and real religion are incompatible," was the subject of a sermon by Rev. W. G. Eliot Jr. at the First Unitarian church yesterday, in which the Rev. Mr. Eliot took an absolutely different stand on the question. He declared that a real

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religious life and moral freedom were possible. Mr. Eliot declared that the world's evils were too serious to permit the reality of the religion to be determined. He showed how religion and moral freedom were possible by the man who really understood the extent of moral freedom. The myths, he said, were subjects of great thought and much conjecture. He said in part:

"I confine myself to three of Father Thompson's contentions: First, that miracles attest Jesus' character and teaching; second, that modern scholarship worked out on the presuppositions of all sound historical study is subversive of religion, and, thirdly, by inference, that moral freedom and real religion are incompatible."

Father Thompson believes that the myths that grew up about the story of Christian beginnings were not myths and that they attest divine truth. He held that these myths are myths, and that all that is true and vital in Christianity is believable in spite of, not because of, these myths. A subversion of the physical order, even if believable, has no essential connection with moral values.

The issue in the present day is becoming increasingly clear between the churches of authority, whether of hierarchy, creed or book, and the churches, together with the "modernists" in all churches, who hold that Christianity and heresy are less inconsistent than Christianity with scientific materialism. We are perfectly aware that we are between two fires—the fire of those who deny that we can be free and Christian, and the fire of those who deny that we can be Christian and free, but the place of peril has its own joys, and if we can believe that even our defeat as an organized company would inspire and organize the next battle we shall stand our ground with generous and happy loyalty."

"The world's evils are too serious to permit the reality of religion to be determined. Religion is too vital to require miracles in the physical order for its attestation, unscientific scholarship for its substantiation, and constraint under the dread sanctions of excommunication or persecution for its outward growth and power."

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RABBI WISE DENOUNCES
POLICE COURT AND JAIL

Rabbi Jonah B. Wise spoke at the Forum on the "Jails of Our City" last evening. He declared that the police court lacked dignity and inspired contempt rather than respect for it by reason of the utter absence of decorum. He told of the experience of a youth arrested for no crime and subjected to the abuse, vilification, blows, starvation and all manner of insults for several days, when a few minutes would have sufficed to disclose that the young man was an orderly and steadily employed resident. The conditions in the city jail were described as disgraceful and unreasonably degrading.

Rev. James D. Corby said that the Kelly Butte rockpile was a palace to a man who has spent a few days in the city prison. Another speaker told of the very satisfactory way of handling petty offenders in Cleveland, where men were paid for working on farms and not arrested unless absolutely necessary. In Salt Lake City the prisoners are frequently released and given work, subject to supervision by the authorities. The new offenders were separated from the old ones, and some attempt was made to distinguish between the criminal and the unintentional violator of the law.

Next Sunday, C. E. S. Wood announced, would be a social meeting, with recitations and music, and no "cranks" should speak on any subject.
