

LOANED POSTAL MONEY CHARGED

Postmaster at Alcatraz Island
Said to Have Turned Office
Into Shylock Shop.

San Francisco, Jan. 7.—August A. Liljeblat, postmaster at Alcatraz Island in San Francisco bay, on which is situated the government's military prison, is in jail charged with misusing post-office funds.

According to Postal Inspector James O'Connell, Liljeblat had been in the money lending business, with clients among the soldiers on the island and servant girls in San Francisco. His loans are alleged to have been made from funds that should have been turned over to the main postoffice. He charged interest, it is alleged, at the rate of 15 per cent a month. Liljeblat was arrested after an investigation disclosed the fact that money was due and had not been turned over by him. When his safe was opened \$3 cents was found in the cash drawer where \$504 should have been.

Then the postmaster was arrested. He produced \$585 from his pockets to square the matter, but telegraphic instructions had been received to hold him in custody and he was brought to San Francisco.

Small promissory notes were found on him, each drawing 15 per cent a month. He is alleged to have loaned out \$660 on the island and in this city.

FINE NEW PLAYHOUSE TO OPEN NEXT MONDAY

New York, Jan. 7.—Another notable addition will be made to the ever-increasing list of playhouses in New York, when Charles Dillingham's Globe theatre, in Times Square, is opened Monday night. The new theatre is destined to take rank among the finest playhouses in the country. Several novel features have been introduced in its construction. One of the most notable of these is a movable panel in the ceiling, which can be opened in warm weather, allowing the audience a view of the sky above the theatre, and permitting a complete ventilation in summer time.

The interior design of the theatre is a modern representation of the architecture of the Louis XVI Renaissance. The general color scheme is of Rose du Barry, with the walls of old gold, blue and ivory white. The main vestibule is designed to furnish a commodious promenade between the acts, and there is a foyer on the level of the first balcony intended for an out-of-door promenade.

Mr. Dillingham intends the theatre primarily for stars and attractions under his own management. "The Old Town," with Montgomery and Stone, has been selected as the opening attraction.

The opening of the Globe again draws attention to the unusually large number of playhouses that have been built in New York the past few years. Eight years ago there were but 17 "regular" theatres in Manhattan, while now there are more than 40. The notable additions to the list within the past three or four years include the Hippodrome, Maxine Elliott's, the New Amsterdam, the Liberty, the Lyric, the Astor, the Hudson, the Stuyvesant and the New theatre. And still there are more to come. Before the opening of another season it is expected that Brady's New Netherlands and the new Shubert theatre in Thirty-ninth street will be ready for business.

MUSIC AND DRAWING IN LA GRANDE HIGH

CHINA'S BOYCOTT FALLS THROUGH

Dependent on Japan for Food-
stuffs; Hence Boycott Bound
to Fail, Says Kikuchi.

San Francisco, Jan. 7.—China's boycott of Japanese products has fallen through, according to Baron Kikuchi, president of the Imperial university of Kyoto, who is in San Francisco. China looks to Japan for foodstuffs, he said, and the boycott therefore could never have been a success.

Baron Kikuchi, who arrived yesterday on the liner Nippon Maru, came to this country to study American educational methods and to deliver a series of lectures on what Japan is contributing to the educational world. The empire has 30,000 schools, the baron said, and two large universities were being constructed at a cost of several millions. Speaking of economics, Baron Kikuchi stated that the effects of the war with Russia were beginning to wear off and Japan would soon recover entirely. He said it was expected that the coming budget would increase the sinking fund of the nation to a great extent, thus enabling the government to pay off the war debt soon. Baron Kikuchi will go to New York from this city.

4.9 Per Cent Levy in Umatilla.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 7.—Umatilla county's percentage of the state tax this year is virtually the same as it has been in the past, 4.9 per cent, but on account of the increase in the expense column of the state books a much greater sum will have to be paid into the state coffers. This increase will amount to something like \$15,000 and will cause the tax levy in this county to be raised about 1 mill.

Dies as Result of Fall.

Eugene, Or., Jan. 7.—Mrs. Euphemia Gersbach died at her home at Elmira yesterday after suffering about three weeks as a result of a fall from her hayloft as she was getting hay for her horses early one morning. She sustained an injury to her back, resulting in paralysis to her body below the waist. She was a widow and conducted her farm with the aid of her several small children.

TURKISH SOLDIERS SHOOT AT FRENCH

Native Troops in Tunis At-
tacked; France Peremptorily
Demands Withdrawal.

Paris, Jan. 7.—Native soldiers serving in Tunis under the French flag have been fired upon by Turkish soldiers, according to dispatches received at the war office. The natives returned the fire and several Turkish soldiers were killed and many wounded, the dispatch states. The clash between the Turks and the natives occurred on the border between Tunis and Tripoli, near the village of Daida. The cause of the outbreak was not stated.

Upon receipt of the news of the encounter the French government made peremptory demands upon Turkey to withdraw her troops from Daida.

New Bills Relating to Courts.
Washington, Jan. 7.—Consideration of matters affecting United States courts began in earnest today, when the house committee on the judiciary met to map out its work for the session. Wednesday next the committee will give a hearing to representatives of the American Bar association. A bill to regulate the judicial procedure of the United States and other measures are under consideration.



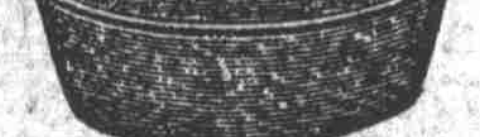
