Priest Saves From Prison—Upon the solicitation of Father Thompson, assistant pastor of St. Mary's cathedral, Thomas Ryder, who wanted to get out quick, has been released from the county jail. Charges of larceny against him will be dismissed. Ryder is 34 years old and conceived the idea of buying goods, having them charged to a third party and then pawn the goods. He was arrested and Father Thompson took up the matter with the individuals who had been defrauded. The latter agreed to withdraw the charges, and Justice of the Peace Olson released the young man upon the condition that he pay weekly sums to the defrauded merchants. Ryder has been employed with the Underwood Typewriter company, and is a member of a highly respected family at Seattle.

Nature of Drug Not Proved—Upon failure of the prosecution to show that the drug Alfred Gilmore, a drug peddler from Vancouver, Wash., had in his possession was morphine, the charge of having that drug in his possession has been dismissed. He was arrested by the police, and connected with what was considered an underground method of getting morphine and opium into the oriental colonies. Elmer was again arrested upon a warrant charging larceny, in which his employer accused him of selling drug store articles to friends in Portland. He will be heard on the second charge in municipal court.

White Slave Trafficker—Upon advice of Seattle authorities A. A. Plant, alias Edward J. Wells, 20 years old, and Miss Edna Ring, 17 years old, were arrested yesterday afternoon, and are held at the city jail. The charge against them is that they were engaged in the traffic in white slave girls, and the girl will be turned over to her father. The couple have been rooming at Fifteenth and Washington streets the past two weeks. Evidence in the hands of the police show that Plant accepted immoral earnings of the girl. The Seattle officers are on the way for Plant. He says he has been working for a picture enlarging concern.

Fred Gilmore to Rockpile—A \$5 day rockpile sentence was given Fred Gilmore this morning in municipal court upon a charge of accepting earnings of an immoral woman, Miss Josie Gilmore, representing to be the wife of the man, is held at the city jail, pending investigation in this city on the matter and past career. She was the woman from whom Gilmore took the money. They were arrested by Detective Coleman and Snow in a Sixth street rooming house. Both say their home is at Spokane, and they came to Portland to live.

25 New Companies, (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Or., Jan. 7.—The annual report of Insurance Commissioner S. A. Koser shows that there have been 25 new companies licensed to transact an insurance business in Oregon since the new insurance law of 1909 went into effect about March 1 last. There are now 51 insurance companies competing for business in Oregon while under the old law but 26 companies could write business in this state. The new law is more flexible and during the first nine months appreciable improvement in the insurance affairs of the state are noted. The report is only partially printed but will be ready for distribution within a few days.

MILLS FUNERAL TRAIN IS READY

Son Reaches San Francisco on Special Train to Accompany the Body to Tarrytown.

(United Press Pressed Wire.) San Francisco, Jan. 7.—Ogden Mills, who raced half way across the continent to be present at the funeral of his father, the late D. O. Mills, arrived at Millbrae at 5:30 this morning on a special train that was furnished him at Sacramento, Cal. It was announced that the funeral of D. O. Mills would be held at Millbrae this afternoon. Bishop William Ford Nichols of the Episcopal diocese of California, and Rev. R. W. Galloway of San Mateo officiating. The services are to be private.

At 5:30 o'clock this afternoon the body of the philanthropist will be carried to a special train at Millbrae station and will be taken to Tarrytown, N. Y., by Ogden Mills and Mrs. Whitelaw Reid. The train will be made up of a baggage car and three coaches. Ogden Mills and Mrs. Reid will occupy the private car of the Crocker family which was turned over to them for their use.

Arrangements have not been completed for the burial services at Tarrytown, but it is understood that they will be simple. D. O. Mills' body will rest beside that of his wife in Sleepy Hollow cemetery, near Tarrytown. It is rumored here in financial circles that Ogden Mills will assume direct control of the interests left by his father. No information regarding the will is forthcoming, but the closest friends of the late capitalist declare Mills' regard for strict business methods also entered his personal affairs, and he would not have neglected to make a will.

New Power Company Incorporated, (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chehalis, Wash., Jan. 7.—The Centralia-Chehalis Water and Power company filed its articles of incorporation yesterday with the county auditor. The capital is \$250,000 and the incorporators are Messrs. J. W. Heasty, L. W. Goodrich, E. S. Price, F. S. Blatner and C. W. Quale, all Tacoma men. The purposes of the 50-year company are to furnish water for domestic and manufacturing and other uses. Centralia is named as the principal place of business.
