Oppose Street Improvement.—A remonstrance to the report of the viewers appointed to assess the benefits and damages on the improvement of Fessenden street, St. Johns, was filed with the city council of St. Johns last night by the property owners along the western end of the street. They claim to be unalterably opposed to the improvement. It is proposed to make a 70-foot street from the bridge across the north bank out to the river, which it is believed will handle a great deal of traffic. Those in the west end of St. Johns are opposed to it, while the residents in the east end of the city are anxious to have the improvement go through.

Machinist Gets Damages.—Three hundred dollars was awarded to N. G. Nutt by a jury in Judge Gates' department of the circuit court yesterday afternoon in a damage suit against William Leeson, a blacksmith and former employer of the plaintiff. Nutt was using a shears and punch machine when a piece of steel fell into his face, breaking his spectacles and impairing his right eye and ear. He alleged that the tools supplied to him were defective and asked \$500 damages.

Bad Checks in Boy's Pockets.—Walter Carroll, alias Clay Williams, a 15-year-old wanderer from Spokane, Wash., was brought before Judge Brown in the juvenile court yesterday. When arrested by Patrolman Robson the boy had \$35 and two fictitious checks on Spokane banks, which he admitted he intended to pass. He gave the address of his parents in Spokane and is being held until they can be communicated with.

Insurance Man Wins.—Verdict for the defendant was given by a jury in the circuit court last night in the case of Fred J. Epler against Mark T. Keady, in which the plaintiff sought to recover \$150 he had paid as premium on an insurance policy, alleging that the amount of the premium was misinterpreted to him. He won in justice court and the defendant appealed. The case was tried before Judge Morrow.

Purse Taken from Room.—The room of Miss E. D. Gayno, 683 Washington street, was entered yesterday afternoon and a purse containing \$50 taken. A stranger was seen in the hall in the afternoon. Dr. R. N. Brewster, a dentist with offices at 549 Williams avenue, reports the loss of a raincoat which was taken from his dental parlors.

W. W. Hutchinson Dead.—Word has been received in Portland of the death of W. W. Hutchinson, well known in Portland, where he was engaged in the insurance business for several years. Mr. Hutchinson died in Fresno, Cal., Monday, January 2, of apoplexy. He was 47 years old and a native of Michigan. He was also prominent in Portland church circles.

May Arbitrate Claims.—The Killingsworth Avenue Improvement association will meet tonight at Carroll's store to finish the business connected with the paving of Killingsworth east to the city limits. The kind of pavement will be definitely decided upon and the claims of the people who are objecting to the improvement will in all probability be arbitrated.

New Streetcar Fender.—On motion of Councilman Rushlight, the city council this morning accepted an invitation from the Standard Fender company of Portland, to visit the Washington building at the exposition grounds for the purpose of seeing a new streetcar fender and life net in operation. The council will go on call of the mayor.

Forfeits His Bail.—Samuel Burrie, a teamster, who was arrested Monday evening for stealing in a moving picture show, was ashamed to appear yesterday in municipal court to answer to a charge of being drunk. His bail of \$20 was forfeited.

Wire Stealers Sentenced.—Mark Crickmore and Hans Fisher, two men charged in justice court with stealing wire from the railway company, were given sentences of \$50. They were unable to pay, and will go to the rockpile for 25 days.

Recommend Contracts.—The street committee of the city executive board held a brief meeting yesterday afternoon. A number of contracts for street improvements were recommended to be awarded by the board at its meeting next Friday.

Mayor's Message Presented.—The message of Mayor Simon asking the council to repeal the ordinance recently passed to call a special election was referred by the council this morning to its committee on sewers and drainage.

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FRATERNITIES IN SCHOOLS REMAIN DESPITE THE LAW

Principals of Lincoln and Washington High Schools, as Well as School Board, Take No Action.

Despite the fact that nearly a year ago the state legislature passed a law prohibiting the existence of fraternities and sororities in the public grammar and preparatory schools and that the governor signed the bill and that it is now a law, the school board of the city of Portland, as well as the principals of the two high schools, Lincoln and Washington, have as yet taken no steps towards the eradication of these fraternities.

No effort has been made on the part of the fraternities and sororities to cover up their actions and they are as much a part of the preparatory schools as ever. A dance was given during the holidays by a sorority known as the "Dix" girls, and two other fraternities are now said to be planning on dances.

Awakened School's Return.—The school board at the time the law was passed said that it was waiting the return of Director F. E. Beach from the east before taking any definite action. Director Beach has been back for some time, but as yet they have not taken any action.

Professor T. T. Davis of the Lincoln High school, when asked this morning what his attitude was on the matter, said: "My attitude is the same now as it was in the spring. I am still waiting for the school board to inform me as to what my steps shall be, as I think that any action on this matter should come from it and not from me."

A great stir in the anti-fraternity circles of Lincoln High school was caused by an apparent official sanction given the fraternities and sororities recently through one high school principal. It is said that the mother of a girl who had been asked to pledge herself to the "Dix" sorority asked this principal if the fraternities were still allowed in the schools.

"They are not supposed to be, but as long as I am the principal of the school they will not be disturbed," is the reply said to have been made.

Fraternity Element Strong.—This reply, it is said, came in such a way as to bring to the attention of the school board the position which the faculty of the school held. The anti-fraternity element is especially strong at Lincoln High school owing to the influence of the "Buss Saw," the little paper which was published there last spring. Every effort is being made on the part of the pupils to keep the fraternity men out of all school affairs.

"There are more fraternity men in school now than a year ago," declared a pupil of Lincoln High school yesterday. "Despite the fact that the state law says that no fraternity man shall attend a public grammar or preparatory school, the fraternities have been taking in new members all the winter. They do not try to handle the school elections now like they used to, however, nor do they attempt to place men on athletic teams as they used to. In fact, they have been behaving very modestly all winter."

GRAND JURY ACQUITS ENGINEER THOMPSON

Thompson, who was held responsible by the coroner's jury for the railroad wreck near Cascade Locks, the grand jury yesterday returned a "not true bill." Over a score of witnesses, including several high officials of the road, were examined. The charge lodged against the engineer was that of manslaughter. Brakeman George Brown was also exonerated.
