

ALL ENGLAND IS READY FOR BUDGET ELECTION

Saturday Principal Day of
Contest in the Cities; Coun-
try at Large Is to Vote
Later.

London, Jan. 13.—Eight million voters of the United Kingdom will begin tooting Saturday, closing one of the most spirited campaigns in English history. The fate of the Lloyd-George budget is in the balance, which means the life or death of the house of lords, making the contest the most important in the life of a great empire.

The campaign is all over, the candidates have been selected for nomination, the vacancies in the lists of candidates are filled up, the hottest of all possible hot speeches have been made, and the betting—that essentially necessary concomitant of all things dubious in the minds of Englishmen—has begun in high earnest.

London Will Vote First.
Everybody agrees that the first polling of importance will be done Saturday when metropolitan London and the ordinary boroughs all over the United Kingdom will go to the polls. It is possible that one or two boroughs will take advantage of their power to vote on Friday, January 14, but nobody looks for the red-hot work to begin until Saturday, when it is expected that fully 90 per cent of all the boroughs, except the district boroughs and the counties, will go to the polls and vote.

Writs Have Been Issued.
Writs for the nominations and elections were issued by the crown Monday. The available dates for the polling cover a fairly wide range, and the selection of the actual polling day remains with the borough or town magistrate, generally the lord mayor, except in the case of metropolitan London, where the lord mayor is only one of the borough heads.

Business Not Disturbed.
It is not a question of the disturbance of business. The people feel that they are on the edge of some vast change in their heretofore accustomed ways of living, and in the social fabric of which they are and have been the builders.

In the campaign has been an example of the prettiest political cleavage on record. All the literary and artistic set has gone over wholeheartedly to the Liberals. The Liberals, too, have won over the Laborites, the Socialists and the Irish party, which has been promised home rule in case of Liberal victory. John Burns, the Labor leader, has made some of the hottest of the speeches in the campaign, and has paid his compliments to the dukes in terms of the exact meaning of which there could not be the slightest doubt in the mind of anybody.

SOUTH BEND PEOPLE SPEND THEIR MONEY AT PORTLAND SHOPS

South Bend, Wash., Jan. 12.—That Portland is a strong favorite in South Bend from a trade point of view is attested by the fact that during the year 1909 out of a total of \$75,851 in money orders issued on domestic offices, \$44,530, or more than 58 per cent of the total, went to Portland.

December, 1909, was the banner year in the history of the local office, the stamp sales amounting to \$1272. The receipts for the year show a substantial increase over the previous year.

CITY RECORDER QUIT; \$10 A MONTH TOO LOW

Thompson has been appointed recorder and Fred Kahler marshal by Mayor Sutton. Rhodes resigned for the reason that the salary attached to the office—\$10 per month—was not worth the time spent away from his business to attend to the duties of the office. No reason is assigned for Lyons' resignation.

Hill Survey Nears Klamath.

Klamath Falls, Or., Jan. 13.—Hill surveys are now camped on the Klamath Indian reservation. They are working less than 40 miles from this city and the route being followed will bring them direct to this city. The crew left Odell with three month's provisions. It is expected that by the end of that time they will be close enough to Klamath Falls to get provisions from this end of the line.

LOMBARD RECOMMENDS NEW GARBAGE BURNER

Councilman Gay Lombard, who was appointed as a special committee of one to investigate into the crematory situation, has made public a report made by him to Mayor Simon November 20 while Mr. Lombard was at Oak Park, Ill. The councilman, fearing that the health board might possibly decide to accept a garbage burner of the Lewis & Kitchen type during his absence, hastened to advise against such action. Mr. Lombard was told by Frederic P. Smith, formerly the agent of the Lewis & Kitchen company, to visit the Oak Park crematory, which is a good example of that type of incinerator. Mr. Lombard says in his report that he inspected this crematory and finds that it would be utterly inadequate for a city like Portland. The plant, he says, burns only 13 tons of garbage a day and it is not fitted up to destroy obnoxious gases. For every ton of refuse burned, he says, 200 pounds of coal is used, and that would be entirely too expensive a proposition for this city.

Mr. Lombard's report commends the Heenan-Fryoude type of incinerator, one of which he visited at Staten Island, N. Y. Favorable mention is also made of the Decaria type. Mr. Lombard says he has nothing but the city's best interests at heart in advising against the Lewis & Kitchen incinerator and that he would not object to any other standard plant.

The health board now has under consideration among other bids one from the Public Works Construction company for the erection of a crematory of the Lewis & Kitchen design.

Eugene's Fire Loss \$60,650.

Eugene, Or., Jan. 13.—According to the annual report of William T. Campbell, chief of the Eugene volunteer fire department, the fire loss in Eugene during the year 1909 was \$60,650, there being 36 alarms during the year.
