

KENNEWICK ASKS FOR RESUMPTION OF BOAT SERVICE

Columbia River Town Seeks
Closer Trade Relations With
Portland; Merchants Hold
Shipments.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Kennewick, Wash., Jan. 14.—Kennewick wants the boats back on the Columbia river. In an endeavor to secure an early resumption of navigation between here and Portland, the Commercial club has opened negotiations with the Open River Transportation company. The club will ask the officials of the Open River company to put the steamers back in service at the earliest moment, and will recommend that Captain Arthur Riggs, who had charge of the Twin Cities last season, be appointed as manager to succeed Dorsey B. Smith, resigned.

At the time the steamers were tied up last fall there was a disposition here in some quarters to blame the transportation company for the discontinuance of service, but it seems to be the general opinion now that the steamers were not patronized as they should have been and to insure a greater tonnage next season the Commercial club will take an active part in inducing retail merchants to buy in Portland and turn their shipments to the navigation company.

The water route means a saving of

\$3 a ton in freight and to those who handle heavy commodities this difference amounts to a large sum during a year's business. This fact has been brought home to many of the local merchants very forcibly since the boats were taken off. In many instances the merchants have held up large orders to await a renewal of water transportation. The Commercial club will also ask the Portland wholesalers to establish distributing branches here.

OLD SCHOOL DISTRICT IS REVIVED IN LINN ON M'DOWELL CREEK

Albany, Or., Jan. 14.—County School Superintendent W. L. Jackson reports today that a new school district has been created between Waterloo and Foster on McDowell creek. It is to be known as district No. 151. Years ago this part of the county maintained a school but for a number of years there had not been enough school children in that territory to warrant the running of a school. The present rush of settlers to that part of the county above Waterloo now necessitates the building of a new school house and the employment of a teacher.

Four New Bridges in Umatilla.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 14.—Four new steel bridges are to be constructed in Umatilla county this spring, the county court having directed the clerk to advertise for bids. The proposed bridges are across Walla Walla river at McCoy's ranch, 110 feet long; Dry Creek at Blue mountain, 60 feet long; Butter Creek near its mouth, 50 feet long; Walla Walla river at Milton, 80 feet long.

PACKED MEETING DEFEATS CAR CO.

Linnton People Upset United
Railways' Plan Against
Five Cent Fare.

Friends of the movement for a 5 cent fare between Linnton and Portland are jubilant today in the belief that by attending in force a meeting, intended only to be representative of United Railways' interests they outwitted the management and prevented the passage of a resolution which would have delayed the reduction of the fare from 10 cents.

"The meeting was one secretly arranged by L. B. Wickersham, chief engineer of the United Railways," declared C. F. Bunker, a Linnton resident. "Previous to the meeting J. H. Lawson was sent by the railroad interests to Linnton to tell them that he represented a Minneapolis concern that intended building in Linnton, but would not build if the reduction was insisted upon by Linnton people, so that the United Railways would be compelled to make good and tear up the tracks."

Sends Private Car.

"Then Wickersham sent a private car to Linnton without notifying any of the friends that it was coming, and without notifying Counsel Gearin and Nelson, for the people, that it was the intent to hold a meeting. But, meanwhile, the news that such a meeting was to be held had leaked out. So when the special car came in at 7 o'clock we were there waiting. No one knew just where we were going, but we knew there was to be a meeting."

"D. M. Clark presided. Wickersham stated that the people should not be too

hard on the railroad, but let a fare be charged which would, to an extent, meet operating expenses. Rev. Frank James brought the session to a focus by a repeated query as to what proposition the United Railways had to put before them. The company made no proposition, then Mr. Clarke, resigning the chair in favor of Peter Janson, moved the adoption of a resolution deferring for one year the suit brought by Linnton against the railroad to compel observance of the 5 cent clause in the franchise.

Voted Alone for Resolution.

When the vote was called, Mr. Clarke alone was for the affirmative. Seventy-nine others were opposed. A number of others nonresident in Linnton, were present but were kept from voting by a motion that only people of Linnton have a voice.

When the suit of Linnton versus United Railways was brought before Judge Morrow last Saturday attorneys Carey & Kerr, for the railroad, secured one week's postponement. In the meantime, it was arranged to have a meeting of the people in which all interested would participate. The case is to be called again tomorrow morning.

Attorneys Gearin and Nelson, representing the people of Linnton, stated today that since the 10 cent fare had been charged not a single lot had been sold in the suburban town. Previous sales were on the strength of the representation that the fare would be 5 cents.

D. F. Lavender Reappointed.

HAS IMPORTANT JOB, BUT FEW KNEW IT

Hidden away in a secluded corner of the city hall is the office of one of the most important of the new municipal departments created in the past few years. Few people visit the office and fewer still know that there is such an official as the sealer of weights and

measures. Yet under the management of F. G. Buchtel the department of weights and measures has saved thousands of dollars to consumers during the past year. One of the good results achieved by Mr. Buchtel is that he has compelled unscrupulous fuel dealers to give full measurements to their customers. In the annual report of the department just filed by Mr. Buchtel he states that he prosecuted 11 cases against dealers and secured nine convictions for short measurements and weights. In answer to specific complaints 574 cords of wood were measured and in cases where a shortage was noted the

dealers were forced to give value received or be prosecuted in the municipal court. During the year, 1188 scales were tested and 44 were ordered repaired. Scales condemned and ordered removed numbered 10. Weights tested were 1151, 38 of which were condemned as inaccurate and ordered removed.
