Architect in Trouble.—Upon a charge of appropriating funds to his own use, A. G. Herald, senior member of the firm of A. G. Herald & Co., architects in the Hamilton building, was arrested yesterday and is held in county jail. Mrs. Nellie Pfeiffer, 1507 East Seventeenth street, makes the charge. Pfeiffer alleges she employed Herald to superintend the construction of a house for her, and at various intervals advanced him money to pay lumber bills. She accuses him of failing to pay such bills. Herald declares he paid the bills, and did not use the money as the woman charges. He further says the suit is brought through jealousy over his recent marriage. The arrest was made yesterday afternoon by Deputy Constables French and McCollough, and the case will be heard in the justice court. Herald is held under bail of \$1000.

AIM TO MAKE SOUTH PORTLAND BEAUTIFUL

"Bridgeless South Portland of sunshine and scenery," became the subject of glowing eulogies delivered before and by South Portland boosters at a meeting held last night in the hall at Third and Sherman streets.

"Such a meeting of fervent enthusiasm, splendid spirit and unanimous purpose I never attended before," said Judge M. G. Munly, telling about the session today.

"If such spirit should be communicated to the rest of the city an improvement revolution would be accomplished." Several hundred persons attended the session. Since the boosters of South Portland have been organized but little more than two months the number in attendance was as surprising as gratifying to the promoters. The effect of the meeting was a resolution that South Portland shall be made the most beautiful and attractive part of the city.

The natural advantages of the southern side of the Rose City were discussed pictorially by the boosters' president, J. G. Heitsch.

"South Portland Realty a Profitable Investment," was the subject of M. J. Clobes, and J. B. Lober followed with an address on "South Portland as a Desirable Residence Section."

The practical and permanent benefits of systematic street improvements were discussed by Judge Munly, and Julius Friendly took up various phases of street lighting.

D. M. Donagh advocated the despending of the channel of the Willamette river as far as Sellwood in order to give South Portlanders harbor facilities, and Councilman Belding closed with an interesting resume of improvements obtained and hoped for in South Portland.
