

ELEVEN OREGON CITIES WILL BE PYTHIANS' HOSTS

Grand Chancellor Prepares Official Itinerary for Visits in January and February to State Lodges.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Albany, Or., Jan. 17.—Eleven Oregon cities will entertain big gatherings of the Knights of Pythias during the coming two weeks. Frank Menefee of The Dalles, grand chancellor of the Grand lodge of Oregon, will make official visits to 13 different lodges between January 20 and February 5 and many special features of entertainment are being planned in connection with his visits. At least three of these meetings will attract prominent members of the order from all parts of the state and all of them will be big gatherings, according to the announcement made today by Willard L. Marks of Albany, chairman of the publicity committee of the K. P. Grand lodge of Oregon.

The first big meeting will be held next Thursday evening at Baker City. Gauntlett lodge will hold its annual roll call and will give a big banquet. Veterans' jewels for 25 years continuous

active service in the order will then be presented to J. T. Donnelly, George W. Jett, D. M. Boynton and E. L. Baer. The veterans' jewels is regarded as a great honor in Pythianism. George W. Jett is a past grand chancellor of the order in Oregon and has served as supreme representative from this state to the supreme lodge and the other men who will receive the jewels of veterans are prominent in the work of the order in Baker county.

Many big delegations. All of the lodges of Baker county will send big delegations to this gathering and among the many prominent men of the order who will be present are: Frank Menefee of The Dalles, grand chancellor; W. L. Bradshaw of The Dalles, supreme representative; L. R. Stinson of Salem, grand keeper of records and seal; Marion F. Davis of Union, past grand chancellor; Gus C. Moser of Portland, who concluded a most successful term as grand chancellor last June; Judge Robert G. Morrow of Portland, chairman of the judiciary committee of the Grand lodge; and Attorney Frank S. Grant of Portland, chairman of the finance committee of the Grand lodge.

One of the biggest Pythian gatherings of the winter will be the annual convention of the Eighth Pythian district, which will be held at The Dalles next Saturday evening. This district comprises Wasco, Sherman and Crook counties and big delegations are expected at the convention from Prineville, Moro, Wasco and Mitchell. A banquet will be served at the Hotel Shepherd and covers laid for 200 guests. The Dalles is the home of Grand Chancellor Frank Menefee, present head of the order in this state, and Judge W. L. Bradshaw, one of the supreme representatives from Oregon to the supreme lodge, also lives there. Among the other distinguished men of the order who will attend this convention are: Grand Vice-Chancellor Darwin E. Yoran of Eugene, Grand Keeper of Records and Seal L. R. Stinson of Salem, Past Grand Chancellor of Oregon and Grand Representative Robert G. Morrow and Frank S. Grant of Portland.

From Dalles to Portland. From the convention at The Dalles, Grand Chancellor Menefee will go to Astoria to attend the annual roll call of Astor lodge Monday evening, January 24. Grand Keeper of Records and Seal Stinson, Past Grand Chancellor Moser and Grand Representative Morrow will accompany him on this visit.

Grand Chancellor Menefee and Grand Keeper of Records and Seal Stinson will then visit the lodge at St. Helens, January 25; at Oregon City, January 26; and at Forest Grove, January 27. On January 28 they will visit Phalanx lodge in Portland, and on February 1 they will go to McMinnville on February 2; to Hubbard, February 3; to Aurora, February 4; and to Eugene, February 5. Extensive plans are being made for all of these meetings, with receptions and banquets as the leading feature. The meeting at Eugene particularly, will be a big one. Several of the leaders of the Grand lodge will be present on each occasion and will contribute to the enjoyment of the official visits.

FARMERS CONDEMN SHIP SUBSIDY PLAN

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., Jan. 17.—Strong condemnation of the ship subsidy plan and a demand for the repeal of the act authorizing ship building materials are contained in the resolutions adopted Saturday morning without a dissenting vote at a mass meeting of farmers and citizens of Umatilla county.

The same resolutions were adopted Saturday evening at a meeting of the Farmers' Educational and Cooperative union. The meeting was attended by over 100 ranchers.

Indiana Bank Closes. Evansville, Ind., Jan. 17.—The Citizens National bank, one of the oldest financial institutions in this city, closed its doors today pending an examination by State Examiner Johnson. Bad loans and alleged embezzlement are reported to be responsible for its condition. The directors declare that every depositor will be paid fully.

Farmers' Anti-ship Subsidy Resolutions

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., Jan. 17.—Following are the resolutions against the ship subsidy adopted Saturday afternoon by the Umatilla order of Farmers Educational and Cooperative Union of America. Over 100 farmers attended the meeting:

"Whereas, Under the high tariff and navigation laws of many years past the American merchant marine has steadily declined until less than 8 per cent of American commerce is carried in American bottoms; This decline is due principally to the refusal of our government to allow registry to foreign built ships, and to excessive duties on all ship materials, so that it costs more than 50 per cent more to build ships in this country than abroad; and

"Whereas, Extreme duties tend to restrict imports and also exports, and are a heavy handicap on commerce, and

"Whereas, All other commercial nations admit all ship building materials and supplies free of duty; and

"Whereas, Government subsidies to any industry, interest or concern are in contravention of the doctrine of equal rights to all and special privileges to none, and ship subsidies would lead to the formation and operation of another great trust, constantly growing by the increased subsidies it was fed on; and

"Whereas, The subsidies would have to be paid by the taxpayers and producers, especially the farmers and particularly wheat growers, with no compensating advantage to them whatever, but would be a constant and growing burden upon them for the benefit of a combination of capitalists; therefore,

"Resolved, That we, the farmers of Umatilla county, in mass meeting assembled, hereby declare ourselves emphatically opposed to the ship subsidy bill pending in congress, or any similar measure.

In duties in favor of imports carried on American ships, we prefer the latter as by far the better method.

NEW BOAT FOR SIUSLAW RIVER

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., Jan. 17.—The people living on the Siuslaw river between Florence and Mapleton, the latter place being at the head of navigation, are soon to have a first class steamer service. The steamer Favorite will be brought up from Coos Bay and placed in regular commission. Heretofore small tug boats and launches have plied the river between Florence and Mapleton. The traffic has grown to such proportions that a larger vessel is necessary. The Favorite will carry 125 passengers and is modern in most respects. The increase in traffic is accounted for by the recent announcement that work on the jetty at the mouth of the river will soon begin, attracting hundreds of people to towns along the river.

To Hold Missionary Council. Oklahoma City, Okla., Jan. 17.—All arrangements have been completed for the opening here tomorrow of a big missionary council of the Protestant Episcopal church. The sessions will be held in St. Paul's church and will continue three days. Distinguished clergymen, including ten bishops of the church, will be here from New Orleans, San Antonio, Kansas City, St. Louis and other points.

Pennsylvania Grocers on Trial. Harrisburg, Pa., Jan. 17.—The cases of a number of Harrisburg grocers accused of selling products containing alum came up for trial today. The cases are intended as a test of the Pennsylvania pure food act passed by the last legislature.

Farmers Take College Course. Stillwater, Okla., Jan. 17.—A good attendance marked the opening of the annual farmers' short course at the A. & H. college today. Instruction will be given in domestic sciences, dairying, cotton and corn growing and stock breeding.

NO MURDERS IN COLUMBIA COUNTY, WASH., IN 14 YEARS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Dayton, Wash., Jan. 17.—Columbia county, with a population of 8400, has not had a murder in 14 years. Since the county was settled 35 years ago, only five murders have been recorded. Of this number, only two were brought to trial, the others either being killed or having escaped the hand of the law. The last case in 1896, was committed by a negro at Starbuck. Two hangings have taken place within the borders of Columbia county. One was a legal hanging and the other a case of mob violence.

1 DEAD, 10 INJURED IN RAILROAD WRECK

(United Press Lensed Wire.) Pinesville, Ill., Jan. 17.—Carl E. Kitchen, a railway fireman, is dead and 10 persons are suffering from injuries as the result of a collision between the St. Louis and Memphis special of the Illinois Central and a freight train near this city. Both trains were running at high speed when they crashed into each other on a curve. Several coaches were derailed.

Mrs. T. H. McKenzie of Lulu, Miss., a college girl on the way home for a week end holiday, proved to be the heroine of the wreck. Ignoring her own painful wounds, she tore her skirts to strips to provide bandages for the other sufferers and cared for them until she was forcibly restrained by persons who saw her near collapse.

Suit for Commission. Nathan A. Tibbitts has sued Otto Schumann in the circuit court for \$375 for commission alleged to be due on business he obtained as a solicitor. Schumann is a marble and monument worker.

DEMAND OPENING OF ST. PAUL MINE

Alleged That Mine Was Sealed, With 310 Bodies in It to Save Company's Coal.

(United Press Lensed Wire.) Princeton, Ill., Jan. 17.—A peremptory demand that the St. Paul mine death pit at Cherry, Ill., be opened immediately and an effort made to recover the bodies of the miners that were not removed following the disaster in which more than 300 men lost their lives, was wired to A. J. Earling, controlling owner of the mine, by State President McDonald of the United Mine Workers. Following the fire in the mine a sealed charge was made by United Mine Workers officials that the owners sealed the mine and left the bodies of the victims below to the mercy of the flames. This was done, it was alleged, to prevent further spread of the fire and consequent heavier loss by the company.

McDonald's demand was made as the result of a resolution adopted at a recent meeting of the widows of the victims, in which the mine workers were petitioned to use their influence to secure the reopening of the shaft.

They believe that 310 bodies are still in the mine.
