Seattle Judge Holds If Couple Lives Together 20 Years Are Legally Married.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 18.—Following the decision of the supreme court of the state in a similar case, Judge Gay late yesterday decided that if a man and woman have lived together as husband and wife for 20 years and reared a family, they are married, in the eyes of law, whether any ceremonial celebrated their nuptials or not.
