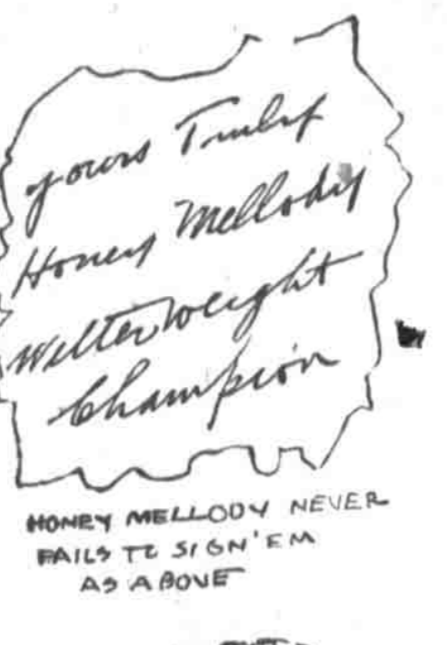
TALKS ON TEETH
