EASIER MARKET FOR EGGS SHOWN ON FRONT STREE

Prices Again Lower, Although No Break Shown in Wholesale Values for Day-Eastern Storers Frantic.

There is again an easier feeling in the local egg market and on Front street prices are ruling between 210 and \$2c, with fully as many sales at the lower prices as at the higher.

Receipts of local eggs are increasing and because of the temporary strength of the past few days and the higher prices reached, holders and speculators eastern stock succeeded in again thing their holdings on the market. With lower prices for strictly fresh ranch eggs there is practically no de-

ranch eggs there is practically no demand at all for eastern stock except from bakers.

Attempt to hold the Front street egg market at 32½c proved unsuccessful and cut consumption just as it was assuming quite fair proportions. Eggs are again lower in California and while shipments in this direction are not possible at the moment, still there is every likelihood that values in San Francisco will reach a basis where Francisco will reach a basis where northern shipments are possible. In fact outside of the Portland trade, which itself is a primary market, California can now make shipments to the north. It costs just about as much to ship eggs from the Willamette valley to Transma and Souths as it does from Tacoma and Scattle as it does from San Francisco, and therefore, because of the lower prices ruling in the ex-treme south, no more buying from the Puget sound country is likely here for the near future at least.

Egg Storers Are Frantic. Every day brings to light additional supplies of storage eggs. It now develops that many retailers contracted for huge supplies early in the season and many of them are still holding some of this stock in ice houses because they cannot selt. Loss from storage operations has been sovere in the east and while some parties on the west coast have made money still the larger coast have made money still the larger per cent of the trade has come out, of the storage season with losses instead of profits to shew for the year's specu-lation.

NOMINAL CALL FOR ONIONS.

But Two Cars of Oregons Have Been Shipped to Frisco This Season.

Demand Is Quiet and Lower Prices Result-Some are Held Over. A very slow tone is shown in the chicken market today. While those who have been willing to sell at the lower price range have been able to do so, some receivers of a speculative mind have been holding out for higher prices. Therefore, the market has dropped from under them and shippers will suffer if any further decline is made. Cleanup prices for chickens during the past 24 hours ranged around 15 @ 15 %c.

SALMON IS VERY SCARCE.

Receipts from Columbia Nominal-Coos Bay Comes to Rescue. According to reports received today from the lower river, the run of salmon in the Columbia is the poorest in years. But few fish from there are being shipped to this market. Practically all the salmon now selling in Portland comes from Coos Bay.

Market for cattle is so good that higher prices are likely from this time forth. There is only one disturbing feature of the present season—the fear that the meat boycott in the east will spread to the Pacific coast and stop much of the consumptive demand. In fact, the eastern situation is serious enough at this time to force shipments of Montana cattle to the Portland market.

Excellent Tone at Present, Hoewever. Despite all fear for the immediate future, however, there is a most ex-cellent tone in the cattle market at this time. Stockdale prices are climbing to their highest point and predictions of \$6 for steers during the present seaof \$6 for steers during the present season are now being freely made.

On the basis of sales being made in
the market for bulls, steers should be
selling even higher than today's record, providing the quality offering was
sufficiently good to bring the advance.
Several sales of bulls were made in the
yards during the day around \$3.75.
This really means \$4.75 for cows of
equal quality and \$5.75 for steers of the
same select grade.

Quite a fair run of cattle was shown
in the yards during the day but this

in the yards during the day but this did not in any way affect the demand nor the price. Total arrivals of cattle for the day were 488 head.

Because of the severe drop in swinc values in the east—due to the determination of labor unions there to cut meat off their bill of fare for the period of 60 days—local hog prices are materially easier and buyers are not offering with-

in 25c of former prices.
