McGuire Enters Protest.

McGuire protested, taking the mat ter up with the National Trotting board of appeals, who decided that the judges could not place a horse once distanced. The commission's official decision follows:

5195-Joseph McGuire, Denver, Colo. vs. Portland Fair & Livestock associa-tion, Portland, Or. Appeal from a decision of the judges in the third heat of the 2:13 trot contested September 23, 1909.

The horse Henry Grey was distanced in the first heat of the 2:12 trot at Portland, Or., September 23, 1909, and ould not thereafter win, and the premium is ordered to be forwarded to the National Trotting association for proper distribution. The judges seem to have credited the horse at the finish with the distance he lost at the start and by that means to have allowed him inalde of the flag, when he was in fact out. This was an error.




