At its meeting yesterday afternoon the street committee of the city executive board recommended the awarding of a contract for paving First street, from Washington to Madison, with bitulithite.

RARE BIRDS ENTERED AT PENDLETON SHOW

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., Jan. 21. - More than \$800 in prizes, including five \$25 silver cups, have been subscribed by local merchants and banks for the first annual Umattila-Morrow poultry show to be held in this city, January 25, 26 and 27. One of the latest entries is the new Sussex breed of birds by T. C. Elliot of Waukegan, Wash. The eggs for these birds were imported from Ireland, where the British government had been experimenting with them. Of the 26 eggs carried over, 25 produced chicks, and but two have since died. Another rare exhibit will be two coops of Columbian Plymouth Rocks. They are owned by Earl Williams of Milton.

FORESTRY STUDENTS IMPROPERLY DROPPED

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, Jan. 21. - Clifford Pinchot, former chief of the forest service, speaking of the action of the comptroller of the treasury in ruling that 200 young men who had been on the payroll as forest rangers and attending college courses to learn some things of scientific forestry must be dropped from the rolls, said: "These young men were attending, at the longest two month courses in forestry at the universities of Washington, Montana, and a few other states, to make them more fit to serve the government. I maintain it was sound policy to permit them a few weeks of such instruction."

Pinchot's followers here do not hesitate to endorse him in his statement. The impression had been given that the rangers in question were taking full college courses. Students to Visit Portland. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) University of Oregon, Eugene, Jan. 21. - Professor F. G. Frink of the College of Engineering is making plans to take juniors and seniors of the engineering department to Portland in the near future on a tour of inspection of some of the engineering projects under way in that city. He believes that the embryonic engineers should have a practical demonstration of some of the problems that arise in teaching civil engineering.
