SCHOOLING PAYS FOR SALE OF BEER

Judge Cleland Assesses Fine of \$250 for Passing Out Three Bottles.

W. A. Schooling gave up the fight when he was brought before Judge Cleland for trial in the circuit court this morning on the charge of selling beer in a prohibition precinct at Astoria. Entering a plea of guilty in the case in which he was convicted in the justice court, he was sentenced to pay a fine of \$250.

Schooling's offense was the sale of three bottles of beer to W. L. Stinson for 50 cents on the first day of July. Several complaints against him were made at that time. He was selling agent for a brewery and was alleged to have sold to customers who came to his place on the quiet.

Justice Cleland fined Schooling \$500 and also sentenced him to serve 10 days in jail. There exists some doubt about the right of the justice to impose a double barreled sentence. The grand jury later returned an indictment on the same charge. By pleading guilty in the appealed case Schooling thus escaped trial under the indictment, as well as in the case tried by Olson.

BLOCKADE DELAYS CARS ON TWO RAILROADS

The blockade on the Washington division of the C. & N. W. line between Starbuck and Bolles, has not yet been removed and trains between this city and Spokane are routed by way of Wallula and Pendleton.

Superintendent M. J. Buckley reports that throughout the Washington division the C. & N. W. line has been operated under caution orders because of the two stations mentioned and on the Pomeroy branch. He reports all the track slow and trains are moving cautiously.

The track is still slow on the Oregon division and trains move under caution orders.

North Bank trains are also being operated under caution orders because of the slow track caused by the heavy storms of last week.

YAKIMA BREWER AND PASTOR RETURN FROM VISIT TO PENDLETON

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) North Yakima, Wash., Jan. 24.—John Schlottfeldt, the North Yakima brewer, and Rev. Marion L. Rose, of the North Yakima Christian church, who went to Pendleton to ascertain from first hand investigations the effect that prohibition had on the business conditions of that city, returned here last night. Rose said that the pictures and statements made by the "wets" had been grossly exaggerated. Mr. Schlottfeldt said that not all the truth was told.

He says that not only are there as many vacant buildings as was shown, but there has been a large decrease all down the line in rents and values. He says that he found that a number of people who had worked the hardest for local option had left Pendleton as soon as they found out how disastrous were the effects of prohibition. He says that the majority of the business men of Pendleton are now of the opinion that the city should have about a dozen well regulated saloons. He is more firmly convinced than ever before that prohibition is not a good thing for the business of a community.

CARRENO RECITAL TO BE BRILLIANT EVENT

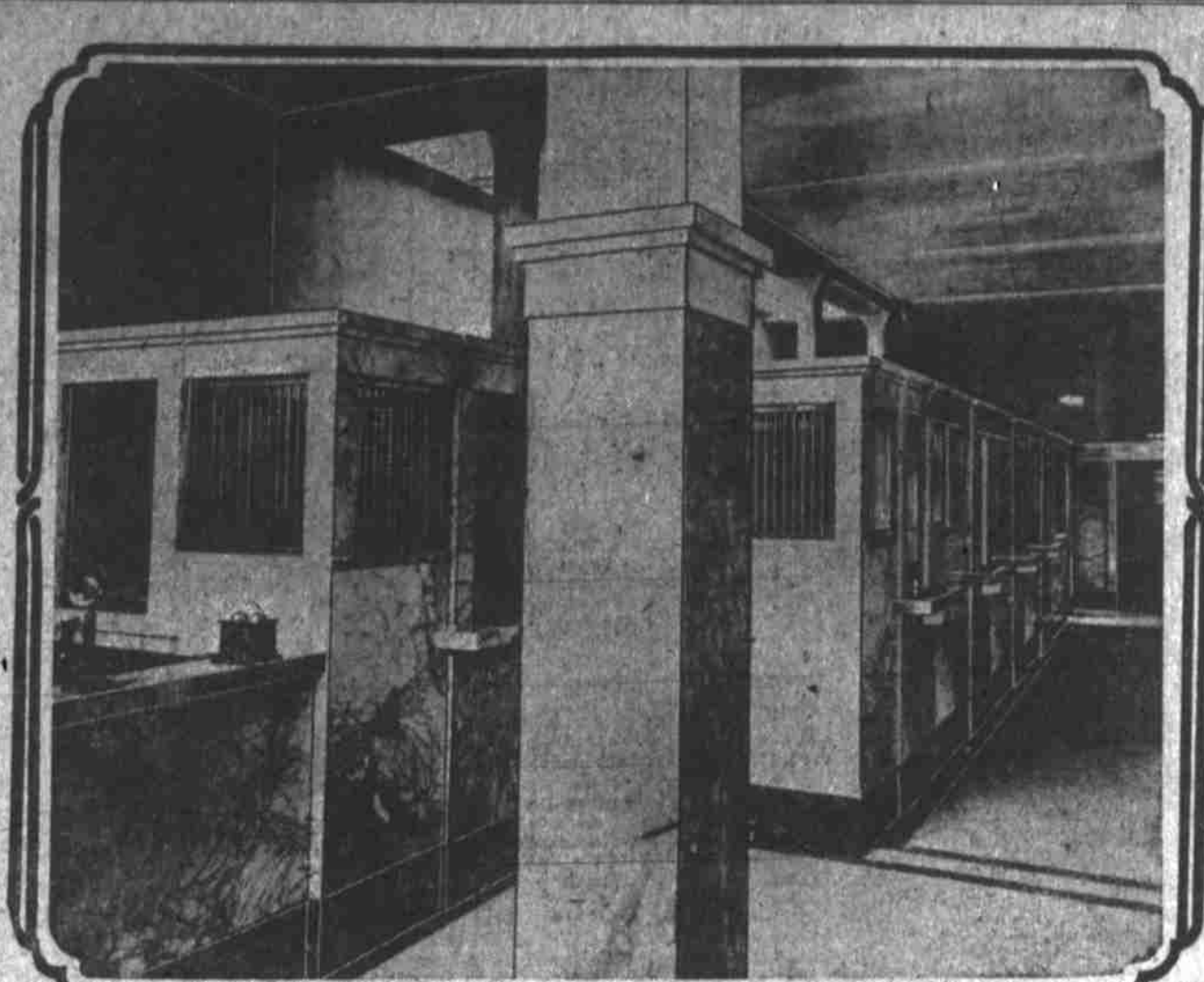

GRIST MILL OLDER THAN THE REVOLUTION

The property just sold is the famous grist mill, latterly used as a whip factory, which antedates the Revolution. It is understood Mr. Hawley will keep it intact. The price paid is said to be \$40,000. Mr. Hendrickson's father paid \$10,000 for the property.

"HIGHER LAW" NOT GOOD IN LOCAL COURT

Because of his adherence to a "higher law" which might appeal to him more forcibly than the law given from the bench, F. J. McHenry a juror called in the circuit court this morning, was promptly excused by Judge Gatens.

McHenry, who described himself as a traveling lecturer, was under cross-examination by Ralph W. Wilbur as to his qualifications as a juror. He was asked the usual question as to whether he would follow the instructions given by the court in rendering his verdict.

"If the instructions of the court were palpably wrong, I would not," he answered.

Asked another question to elucidate his unusual answer, the juror said: "I do not wish to be misunderstood. What I mean is that if the instructions of the court were even to a layman palpably wrong, I could not conscientiously follow them."

Attorney Wilbur submitted a challenge for cause, and it was promptly allowed by the court.

McHenry was one of the men called in securing a jury for the trial of Anton Glineski's suit for \$7500 damages against the Inman-Poulsen Lumber company. The plaintiff was operator of a planing machine in the defendant's mill and lost three fingers of his left hand in the cogs on April 19, 1909.

Glineski alleged that the accident was the result of negligence on the part of his helper, Francesco Danzeno. He asserts that Danzeno failed to obey his signals in adjusting the pressure bar on the machine. A jury to try the case was secured about noon.

GIRL MOTHER DESERTS 2-WEEKS-OLD INFANT

"I don't want the little brat" is the reason 17-year-old Lottie Rogers gives for deserting her 2-weeks-old baby boy. She left it in a rooming house. The child-mother is now under arrest in the county jail upon a charge of abandonment.

Mrs. Lola G. Baldwin, head of the women's public safety bureau, arrested the girl Saturday afternoon.

The story of Lottie Rogers is one of sadness. She said her wayward career began five years ago at Calgary, Canada. When a little school girl, she began disobeying her parents. Two years ago she ran away from home with a young man at the age of 15. She was returned to her home but ran away a second time.

Grill rooms and questionable companions began to claim her attention when she came to Portland last fall. Becoming acquainted with a man, with whom she lived at a lodging house, and being deserted by him when he discovered her condition, formed another chapter in her life.

It was in the crowded rooming house that she became ill. She was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital, where a boy was born. After being discharged from the institution, she took up quarters in a cheap lodging house where, on December 8, she furnished up the little son in the best clothing she had, and then deserted him.

She engaged living rooms in the Newlands hotel, 208½ First street.

BRYCE SEES DANGER OF WAR WITH EAST

Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 24.—James Bryce, ambassador from England, who was the principal speaker at the session of the student missionary convention here, said that the present time is a critical one in the world's history, and added:

"People are afraid of a conflict of races. People think that some of the great ancient races of the east may be led into a mortal struggle with European peoples. If our attitude to them were governed by Christian principles there would be no risk of any such conflict."

"I hope, I believe, it will be averted. The sense of human brotherhood was never more needed than now at this critical, this critical moment. It is needed not only by missionaries, but not only for missionaries, it is needed by all who come in contact with those eastern races."

MAYOR OPPOSES SALARY INCREASE

Retrenchment in Expenses May Bring Defeat of Ordinance.

That Mayor Simon will today veto at least a part of the ordinance appropriating money from the general fund to pay municipal salaries is almost certain. The mayor has declared himself to be in favor of retrenching expenses wherever possible, and it is hardly likely that he will be disposed to approve all the increases granted by the council at its last session.

Today is the last day on which the executive can approve or disapprove the measure. If he vetoes it, the council can at its next session, if the veto were sustained, pass another ordinance with an emergency clause attached, so that city employees could get their pay on the first of next month. Unless some such action is taken the servants of the municipality will be forced to wait at least two weeks after the first of their January salary warrants.

"You would be making a pretty safe guess," said Mayor Simon this morning to a Journal representative. "If you should say in your paper this afternoon that I will veto the ordinance. Of course, I would not want to be held to an absolute statement that I will veto the measure, for I am not sure what I will do."

"I do not approve, as a general rule, of increasing public expenditures, and yet I do not like to disapprove an ordinance unless there are most urgent reasons for so doing. I am in a quandary. I think some of the increases in salary are advisable, but I think that others are not."

HORSE THIEF STEALS TEAM FROM SHERIFF

Kalamazoo, Mich., Jan. 24.—A sleigh load of farmers out hunting for a horse thief near White Pigeon was driven from the sleigh at the point of a revolver by a suspect whom Sheriff Campbell was pursuing. Some of the farmers were thrown to the road by the fugitive while the others tumbled out themselves. The suspect, who fled with the farmer's team and sleigh, was later overtaken by the sheriff and was badly wounded in the side after an exchange of shots. It is thought that his wound will not prove fatal.

At White Pigeon, where he was taken

for immediate treatment, he refused to reveal his identity. He is about 30 years of age.

The sheriff discovered a gray and roan team answering the description of one stolen in Grand Rapids and took possession of the horses and rig after the driver had exchanged several shots with the officer and fled. Becoming confused, the man crossed his tracks later in the day and ran directly into the sleigh load of farmers hunting him.

"CURE" FOR CANCER OFFERED IN MANILA

Manila, Jan. 24.—A conditional and preliminary report of what is hoped will prove to be a successful specific treatment for cancer has been presented before the Manila Medical society. The treatment consists in making the patient immune from further progress of the disease by the use of vaccine prepared from his own cancer.

Experiments have been made during the past eight months, both in cases where an operation was possible and where it was not. Various cases show that the progress of the disease has been arrested, and the results have been uniformly encouraging. A number of the patients who had been cured apparently were exhibited before the society by the originators of the new method.

The medical authorities here express a wish to watch these cases over an extended period for a possible recurrence of the malady before they accept the treatment as successful.
