

\$1,000,000 BRIDGE ACROSS COLUMBIA BE STARTED SOON

Work on Oregon Trunk Railroad Span at Celilo Will Begin as Soon as Plans Received From Chicago.

Work on the construction of the Oregon Trunk Railroad company's bridge across the Columbia river at Celilo will be started as soon as the plans are received here, from Engineer Modjeski in Chicago. President John F. Stevens of the railroad company, stated today that the engineers have instructions to rush the drawings as rapidly as possible.

The bridge that will give the Deschutes line of the Hill system direct connection with the main line of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway company will be a large structure, 3000 feet in length, and built throughout of steel. It will have a swing draw for the accommodation of navigation in the canal.

As compared with the building of the North Bay bridges across the Columbia and Willamette rivers, the Celilo bridge is expected to give little trouble when it comes to the laying of the foundations for the several piers. The river bottom at that particular point consists of solid rock and the greater number of the piers will be built where the rocks are exposed at low water. This does away with the expensive services of divers, except perhaps to a small extent.

The cost is estimated at \$1,000,000, but President Stevens says that figure is only tentative and that it may run much higher.

Now that an agreement has been reached between the Harriman and Hill people over the rights of way over disputed ground in the Deschutes valley and the Oregon Trunk line's crossing over the O. R. & N. line at Celilo, the work is being pushed all along the line. The same is being done by the Harriman people on the west side of the river in anticipation of having its application for right of way over a strip of 12 miles along the river through the Warm Springs Indian reservation, honored.

Unless the Harriman people obtain this right, the agreement between the two competing forces will cease to exist, as it would leave the Harriman line blocked at a point about 70 miles up the valley, where the Oregon Trunk is in possession of a right of way on the east bank of the river.

SALARY ORDINANCE IS VETOED BY MAYOR

Mayor Simon yesterday afternoon vetoed the appropriation ordinance carrying with it the salaries of all the municipal employees paid out of the general fund. Although he objects to only five increases, as these are included in one general item with seven others which he favors, the veto applies to all the others, as well.

The increases which the mayor does not think necessary are those of Deputy City Auditor Gill from \$150 to \$175 a month, and Deputy Auditors West, Hutchinson, McEachern and Pierce from \$125 a month to \$150.

During a session of the judiciary committee of the council yesterday Councilmen Baker and Cellars indulged in another contest of words over the appropriation ordinance for the fire and police departments, which ordinance was vetoed by the mayor last week.

"Well, I am going to stand 'pat' and vote to pass the ordinance over the mayor's head," said Mr. Baker, "and I think I can get enough votes to whip you into line, Mr. Cellars."

"You could not whip me into line if you had 47 teeth," was the retort of Councilman Cellars.

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GOOD FEATURES ON ORPHEUM BILL

Seldoms' Venus Is One of Hits of Show—Vest Pocket Comedienne Another.

It is seldom one's lot to see more artistic work even off the vaudeville stage than is shown at the Orpheum this week by Seldoms' Venus. The name of the turn was not meant for a pun; it is one of those good things that sometimes happens.

The power is a man named Seldoms, a splendidly athletic built fellow with muscles so suggestive of the old Hercules and Ulysses that he is divinely fitted for classical poses. Erna Claren, a woman of graceful physique, is made the central figure of the poses and a third man assists. The turn has been here before, but has lost nothing of its artistic beauty.

Toby Claude, the vest pocket comedienne, has received a good deal from nature to make her attractive. She is about as big as a minute and has a way about her. She would be intensely amusing if she would not sing such suggestive songs.

The Five Mowatts are lightning club manipulators who know the value of the tricks of the trade. With trim, pretty suits, lively music, constant motion and judicious use of correct club they arouse the audience to a wild pitch of enthusiasm. Knight Brothers and Marion Sawtelle give a stunt with some fairly clever dancing and a tune or two. The comedienne is reasonably funny. Lester and Kellett give a hedge-podge which is really amusing in spots, especially in the melodramatic spot.

Watson and Cohan, in "The Hoosier Girl," have a dreadful vehicle for their mirth, which rather prejudices you, but Miss Watson comes up on top in her song, "My Mother's A Fool, I've Got Stole," followed by a monologue. At least half her jokes were new. The Carrey twin brothers do some exceptionally good dancing, and are so exactly alike in looks and steps that you wonder if you have imbibed enough to see double. The moving pictures show some very good series of stag hunting scenes and another exceedingly funny and unrelenting youth-time story.

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DRUGGISTS FROM TWO COUNTIES TO ORGANIZE

Druggists of Multnomah and Clackamas counties will meet tonight at the Commercial club of this city to organize a permanent association that will probably be known as the western Oregon Drug club. It will have active and associate members and will be incorporated under the laws of the state.

The meeting will be held in conjunction with a banquet and several prominent druggists will express their reasons why a permanent organization of drug men is much needed in this part of the country.

Until a few years ago there was an organization known as the Multnomah County Drug association, but it finally became dissolved through lack of interest on the part of the members. It is believed, however, that the conditions are now ripe for a successful organization.

Proprietors will be entitled to active membership, while employees will have access to the meetings as associate members. The intention is to hold regular meetings before which authorities will be secured to speak on topics of interest to the trade and profession.

JUDGE WILL HEAR WATER PETITION

Salem, Or., Jan. 25.—Judge William Galloway tomorrow will hear the argument on the petition to review the findings of the water board of control in the awarding of the water rights in the Powder river valley for reclamation purposes. The board after an investigation awarded the water rights of Powder river to the same parties to whom the desert land board would award the land rights.

When this action was taken R. S. Cookingham and W. A. Thatcher, opposing the interests represented by O. C. Finklenburg, applied for a writ of review on the ground that the board exceeded its authority and that the proceedings generally were irregular. O. C. Finklenburg had already secured a preliminary contract from the desert land board to make preliminary surveys looking toward the procuring of the permanent contract for the irrigation of the tract under the Carey act.

The Powder river irrigation project is one of the most important now proposed for eastern Oregon. It
