

GRANGE CONDEMNS
ASSEMBLY PLAN

North Howell Body Calls Upon Voters to Reject Constitutional Convention.

North Howell grange, No. 274, of Marion county, Or., in regular session at Gervais, Or., has adopted resolutions calling upon citizens of Oregon to reject the proposed constitutional convention at the November, 1910, election. The resolutions follow:

"Whereas, the intelligent moral voters of the state of Oregon have, by years of wise, persistent and strenuous effort, secured as permanent political institutions, the initiative and referendum and the primary election law, and have for the first time in the history of any state in the Union, secured a fully enfranchised citizenship and put into practical operation the unqualified doctrine that governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed, and,

"Whereas, at the present time, working through the subsidized press of the state, certain designing politicians—enemies of the common good and conspirators against the principles of popular government—are busy in an underground effort to overthrow our whole system of direct legislation and direct elections by means of their house bill No. 188 (authorizing a constitutional convention) and their proposed assembly plan; therefore, as it resolved, by the North Howell grange, No. 274, of Marion county, Or., in regular session assembled, that we are unalterably opposed to the constitutional convention because said proposed convention completely ignores the powers vested in the electors by the initiative and referendum and can have no other object than the complete and final abrogation of those powers; and we do hereby call upon all citizens of the state of Oregon who believe in self-government to aid us in rejecting the proposed constitutional convention at the November election in 1910, and to be it further resolved that we condemn the assembly plan because it seeks to set aside and render inoperative the primary election law.

CHARGED WITH BRIBERY;
PLEADS NOT GUILTY

George Potter, alleged go-between, charged jointly with the bribery of the jury which tried Yee Gueng, a Chinaman, charged with murder, pleaded not guilty when arraigned yesterday afternoon. Yee Gueng is now under sentence of death. Potter is the first to plead on the bribery charge.

Thomas Ryder pleaded guilty to stealing from A. M. Griley, athletic director of the Y. M. C. A., a valuable watch. He was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary, then placed on parole under the supervision of Chief Probation Officer Tausig. Ryder's home is in Seattle, but during his parole he must remain in Oregon.

F. W. Hewes and Cora Irish are to be tried for a misdemeanor on March 7; Leon White, charged with uttering a forged check, will be tried March 8, and G. H. Langmo will face a jury on a like charge March 10.

HALL REPUDIATES
MURDER CONFESSION

Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 27.—James Hall, who was brought here from Portland, N. H., repudiated his confession that he murdered Anna Schumacher when he was taken today to the Holy Sepulcher cemetery and shown the spot where the girl was assaulted and killed upon her mother's grave.

The intense feeling exhibited at the time of the murder was renewed to some extent when Hall was brought here today.

When he was taken to the cemetery he showed no emotion and declared he never saw the place before.

The authorities are puzzled and will make tests to learn whether Hall is insane. His confession, the police say, made to the naval authorities at Portsmouth, was apparently authentic.

**RICHLAND BANK
OFFICERS NAMED**

Richland, Or., Jan. 27.—The stockholders of the Eagle Valley State Bank met Saturday in the Gover building, and held their first election of officers. W. A. Holcomb was elected president, Dr. F. G. Hewitt vice president, J. F. Herr cashier, F. G. Jasper assistant cashier, J. N. Young director.

The bank's capital stock is \$15,000, in shares of \$100 each, to be fully paid up on the opening of the bank for business. The bank building will be built out of native stone or concrete.

CARRENO CHARMS
WITH HER ART

Big Audience Hears Interpretation of Masters of Piano Composition.

The broad musicianship and unfading art that make Madame Carreno such a delight, even now when she is far along in her fifties, were demonstrated last night before a large audience in the Bungalow theatre, which strove to show its enthusiasm by one recall after another. Madame Carreno is an artist whose work has mellowed instead of aged with years. The masterfulness and strength of her execution tempered with warmth and womanliness of conception, place her work in the ranks of not only the greatest but the most lovely of pianists.

Madame Carreno is fortunate in her personality which radiates cheer and subtle sympathy while she plays with virility. Her audience feels the sympathetic magnetism of her presence even though she is modest and effusive as much as possible her recognition of applause. She is a serious student of art—that is plain. Her music is not for her a mere means of livelihood, nor yet a trititious amusement. It is the contemplative, introspective study of the innermost thoughts of the composer.

Her program was selected to please the serious musician, though it presented little that was new. The Poldini fantasia was the only number approaching the novel. The choice of the Bach chromatic fantasia and fugue for an opening number was a brave one, for it is not a work nor is Bach a composer that appeals to the general public. Bach is respected by everyone; even the snobs of musical literature reverence him. Only a few true lovers of the serious art enjoy him. As one critic has said, "By the concert-going public at large he is regarded much in the same way as the average reader regards John Milton—a genius to be revered and admired but seldom read." But Madame Carreno brought to this composition a skillful technique and a noble reading which delighted those who delight in Bach.

A Beethoven sonata followed and gave more general delight. The allegro movement was big and beautiful, but the favorite movement was the minuet, given with refinement and stately grace. A group of Chopin, beginning with the favorite of all his nocturnes, showed best of all her richness of soul. Two nocturnes and two ballades were delightfully interpreted and played with authority. The Poldini fantasia was an interesting number and was followed by a barcarolle and the Ecstasies of MacDowell, who began his studies with Carreno. The boat song was a dainty bit with much grace and beauty, and the Hexentanz was done with charming brilliancy and playfulness.

The Rubinstein Romance, that favorite of melodies, was played with rich sentiment, and the wonderful pedal effects. The same composer's barcarolle followed, and the Schubert-Tausig Marche Militaire closed the program, a better chosen closing number than was the opening number for impressionistic purposes. Its brilliant measures and inspiring rhythm naturally drew the audience into a frenzy of delight. It was played with masterly skill in shading. She was recalled about a score of times and gave three extra numbers, one a repetition of the minuet movement of the sonata, the dainty Butterfly study of Chopin, and a graceful waltz, "Teretita," by herself.

To Withdraw Snake Lands.

Salem, Or., Jan. 27.—Vance and Wor-

del, represented by State Senator Hart of Baker City, appeared before the Desert Land board yesterday to make application for the withdrawal of the arid lands on the Snake river with a view of reclamation under the Carey act. In the last eight months, since the new water law passed by the 1909 session of the legislature has gone into effect, four definite Carey act projects have taken form and are to be prosecuted.

One of the four new projects is a big one and will utilize the waters of Warner Lake in Lake county.

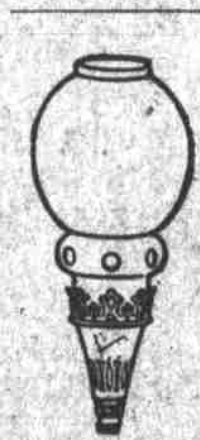
