

FIND DAVIDOR AND GET \$100

Uncle Sam Offers Reward for
Arrest of Fugitive Promo-
ter Wanted Here.

Samuel V. Davidor, the wily real estate broker and promoter of many and varied schemes in Portland, who slipped quietly out of this city some months ago, on learning that he had been indicted by the United States grand jury,

is being hunted over the western hemisphere, as shown by a circular received today by local authorities, offering a reward of \$100 for his capture.

Issued by the chief of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice of the United States, Washington, D. C., the circular contains a full description of the fugitive, two photographs and his written signature. The circular follows:

"The United States department of justice will pay a reward of \$100 for the arrest and delivery to a proper federal officer of Samuel V. Davidor, alias Davidov, who is wanted in the district of Oregon, at Portland, for using the United States mails in furtherance of a scheme to defraud, in violation of section 548, revised statutes of the United States. Davidor has been indicted twice in that district for promoting a fraudulent real estate concern. His description is as follows: 'Age, 47 years; height, 5 feet, 9 1/2 inches; weight, 150 pounds; eyes, maroon; hair, black; complexion, dark; teeth, good; nose, large; chin, medium; mustache, black; pit near on root of nose; vertical scar on left cheek bone near corner of eye; two pit scars on forehead. Is fond of luxury, dresses flashily, and usually wears a broad brimmed, light Fedora hat. He looks very much like a Spaniard, and is believed to be either a Portuguese or Mexican Jew. He generally engages in the promotion of wildcat mining or oil well, or natural gas schemes, and fits up his offices in elegant style, stops at the best hotels and spends money lavishly. He formerly lived in Milwaukee, and in Chicago, where he was arrested for conducting a fake watch scheme. Upon the receipt of any information regarding his whereabouts, communicate with the chief of the bureau of investigation, department of justice, Washington, D. C.'"

Davidor lived several years in Portland. Several times previous to indictment he was in the clutches of the law. He maintained an elaborate suite of offices, first in the West-Paro building, and later in the Beck building, and promoted various real estate and mining schemes. It was through false manipulation in connection with the Pacific Coast Realty association, his pet

scheme, that he was indicted by the federal grand jury. At last reports Davidor was in Canada.

ATTORNEYS IN FIGHT OVER PIRATES' LAUNCH

A three cornered fight has been started between the attorneys representing the two river pirates and William Matheson. This difficulty is over the ownership of the launch "Hattie C. Hoover." George Ferens and George Burke, the two river thieves, were held to the grand jury yesterday by the justice court in the sum of \$2500 bail. Burke had charge of the launch, claiming an interest in it. The launch formerly belonged to Matheson. Ferens had a lien on the boat for towing and repairs. Both Burke and Ferens assigned their interest in the boat to their attorneys. Matheson claims neither man has a right to the boat, as it was moved without his consent. Evidence of wholesale burglaries along the riverfront is piling up against the men.

NEW COMPANY TO BUILD AIR CRAFT

C. W. King, E. P. Preble, Richard Martin, John J. Rekar, Grant Phlegley and F. H. Whitfield have filed articles of incorporation of the Preble-Rekar Airship company, for general aircraft business, capital stock \$500,000. The Oregon State Automobile association has been incorporated by J. H. Albert, George W. Sanborn and W. O. Van Schuyver. The association has no capital stock.

The Pioneer Trust company has been incorporated by James Cole, Bartlett Cole and John Guy Wilson; capital stock \$50,000. C. H. Lane, George J. Cameron and C. E. Johnson have filed articles of the Oxford Tailors, capital \$10,000.
