UGLY WORDS LEAD TO FEDERAL COURT

\$10,000 A YEAR PLEGGED FOR GOOD ROADS IN OREGON

**Enthusiasm Over Movement
Greater Than First Expected
—Fund of \$750 a Month Is
Nearly Complete.**

The good roads fund of \$750 a month is nearly complete. Portland business men have subscribed nearly \$600 a month. The remainder is said to be assured. Members of the soliciting committee affirm, however, that if the subscription pass the \$750 mark the additional money can be well used in the proposed state-wide campaign for good roads legislation. The money is to be used in paying the salary and expenses of a good roads expert who will expound among all the people the gospel of commercial advantage and development opportunity that well built roads provide.

Money is being given by advocates of good roads. All vehicle owners have manifested interest. The thought is to provide thoroughfares insuring quick suburban transit, whether for the automobile or the hay wagon. That roads be constructed according to a high standard of excellence as good as the section can maintain, is being especially advocated.

Legislation directed toward procuring solid, safe roads in newly developed country, both for the sake of forwarding development and providing a present convenience is being urged.

The fund as it now stands aggregates nearly \$10,000 a year. Increasing the working fund will proportionately increase the power of the good roads movement, it is asserted. The subscribers to date are:

Arnold Trial Progresses.
(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., Jan. 22.—The prosecution in the trial of Claud W. Arnold for the murder of Andy Rabael closed its taking of evidence yesterday morning and the defense began its attempt to tear holes in the net of close circumstantial evidence which had been woven about the defendant. The principal witness upon whose testimony the defense relied to prove an alibi was the former wife of the prisoner. Although she testified that she had seen her ex-husband several times on the day it was alleged that he was with the murdered man, her testimony was somewhat counteracted by the admission that she had accepted \$50 of reward money for assistance in the apprehension of Arnold.

Arnold took the stand in his own behalf yesterday afternoon and was still on when court was adjourned for the day. His answers were clear and concise.
