SOCALISTS ARE
MUTILATED AND
MAIMED IN RIOT

German City Scene of Horrible
Conflict When Men Gather
to Protest Against Franchise
Bill—Many May Die.

(United Press Telegram.)
Berlin, Feb. 16.—Socialists and their sympathizers who gathered in the streets of Neumunster today and refused to disperse at the orders of the military were charged by the troops and scores were taken to hospitals suffering from horrible wounds.

The soldiers sent to break up the Socialistic demonstrations charged with fixed bayonets into compact masses of men who were unable, owing to the crowded streets, to escape.

Driven at bay by their very numbers, the mob turned on the soldiers, and hand-to-hand conflicts raged in the thoroughfares. Cavalry was used to break up the fighting hordes, and only when they were ridden down, trampled beneath horses' hoofs or slashed with

sabers, did the Socialists break and run to shelter in doorways, courts and houses.

Terrible Injuries.
Those taken to hospitals were suffering from terrible mutilations. Many of the victims lost ears, noses or hands from saber slashes. Heads were laid open and deep slash wounds from bayonets were inflicted. Many of the injured are in a precarious condition, and several may die.

The toll of blood paid by the Socialists today emphasized the protests of their delegates when the Prussian government's new franchise bill was adopted.

Following the adoption of the measure, rioting by Socialists occurred in various parts of the empire.

Dispatches were received here from Cassel today stating that no less than six riots took place there when the police attempted to disperse mass meetings of Socialists gathered to protest against the franchise bill.

More Than 50 Riots.
The disorders today are an aftermath of more than 50 riots throughout the country last Sunday. The government, fearing that the Socialists may discover their strength and that a serious revolt may threaten the present ministry, gave orders to the commanders of departments throughout Germany to hold themselves in readiness for active service, and it is believed that if the discipline and increase troops may supplant the police in the work of maintaining order.

The emperor's palace has been double guarded and light artillery is at hand in case of emergency. Several batteries were parked near the palace last Sunday, when the riots were at their height. Later the artillery was withdrawn, but is being held within easy reach of the kaiserhof.

Cruiser Washington at Quarantine and 950 Men Are Being Vaccinated.

(United Press Telegram.)
Port Townsend, Wash., Feb. 16.—The cruiser Washington is anchored off the United States quarantine station today, her flag at half mast, one of her crew buried in the quarantine cemetery and four more in the hospital seriously ill with smallpox.

The Washington reached the quarantine station last night. The sailor who is dead passed away a few minutes before the cruiser dropped anchor. There are 950 men aboard and doctors are busy today vaccinating and revaccinating the men.

The Washington was in quarantine at Honolulu and had just been released and ordered to Bremerton when the cases developed.

The Tennessee, which accompanied the Washington from Hawaii, continued to the Bremerton navy yard.

San Francisco, Feb. 16.—The United States quarantine officials here today declared that they had discovered no traces of smallpox or other communicable disease aboard the ships of the Pacific fleet, from which the cruiser Washington was detached at Honolulu. News of the arrival of the Washington with smallpox cases was conveyed by wireless to the other ships of the fleet here. No reason for the spread of the disease on the Washington alone could be given. Other ships of the fleet passed quarantine here with clean bills of health.

Misleading Article Regarding
Phonographs.

A story was recently printed in several of the New York papers regarding the sale of a block of stock of one of the phonograph companies of which Mr. Edison is a controlling stockholder. Mr. Frank L. Dyer, president of the National Phonograph company, manufacturers of the Edison phonographs and records, has issued the following statement:

My attention has been called to a recent article in a New York daily newspaper, which has been widely copied, and wherein it stated that the future of the phonograph was not very bright. This article is entirely misleading and does not accord in any way with the views of myself or any one connected with the Edison company. The future of the phonograph was never so bright as at the present time, in fact I feel that the surface has hardly been scratched. Orders are coming in so rapidly at the present time that we are not able to fill them promptly, and the sales are entirely satisfactory. The fact that we are just starting in with the Amberola and a full line of grand opera records is certainly an indication that so far as we are concerned the future does not have to be questioned. If any one of us had the slightest doubt as to the future of the business, why should we be spending hundreds of thousands of dollars each year in advertising and a corresponding amount in the development of new lines and in experimental work?

In connection with the very article under consideration, it is interesting to inquire why, if Mr. Edison has any doubt as to the future of the business, he should be willing to spend \$155,000 in cash to acquire a minority stock interest? The whole transaction was simply this, that in the early days of the phonograph business this particular minority block of stock of the Edison phonograph works was acquired by outside interest and was later put up as collateral to secure the issue of bonds of another independent company (not controlled by Mr. Edison) having rights in certain foreign countries, and on which the interest payments were defaulted. These bondholders were anxious to realize something from their investment, and Mr. Edison was willing to buy the stock, so that the transaction was consummated.

The Edison phonograph works, as persons familiar with the business know, is a separate company located at Orange, and engaged only in the manufacture of machines, which are turned over to and are distributed by the National Phonograph company. The National company manufactures all Edison records and sells directly to the trade. The National company in assets, property and amount of business done is immeasurably larger than the Edison phonograph works.

The purchase of this block of stock by Mr. Edison was a personal matter and has no direct bearing on the future of the phonograph business, other than showing his confidence and a desire to withdraw the stock from litigation.

Accommodations for Passengers.

Salem, Or., Feb. 16.—The railroad commission has taken up the matter of providing facilities and conveniences at the point near Derry where the west side division of the Southern Pacific crosses the line of the Salem, Falls City & Western railroad. Waiting rooms will be built and the schedules arranged so that connections both north and south can be made by the passengers en route over the Salem, Falls City line from Salem and Dallas to Corvallis and Portland.

Crossan to Succeed Meredith.

Salem, Or., Feb. 16.—Robert A. Crossan has been elected by the city council to fill the vacancy by the resignation of City Treasurer Frank B. Meredith, who has been elected secretary of the state board of agriculture. Mr. Meredith's resignation will take effect February 28 and Mr. Crossan's duties will begin on that date. William H. Burdett Jr. was the only other candidate before the council for the position.
