STREET WORK TO COST CITY \$200,000

Street Committee Passes Big Number of Paving Contracts.

Contracts for \$200,000 worth of public improvements were recommended by the street committee of the city executive board yesterday afternoon. Most of the improvements consist of hard surface pavements but two of them are east side fills. One of these latter, of great importance to the traveling public is the East Ninth street fill from Washington to Belmont. The Pacific Bridge company will get this contract, its bid being \$15,511.45.

Following is a list of the most important paving contracts recommended by the street committee:

Sixth street from Morrison to Davis, to be resurfaced with asphalt; Barber Asphalt company, \$14,500.00.

East Third street from Holladay avenue to Welder street, to be paved with bitulithic; Warren Construction company, \$14,073.48.

WOMAN BUYS HALF BLOCK FOR \$45,000

The half block fronting the north side of East Salmon street between East Second and East Third was sold yesterday by M. G. Thorsen and H. J. Fisher to Mrs. Mary M. Gillette for \$45,000. One interesting feature of the transaction is the fact that Messrs. Thorsen and Fisher were never out of a cent of actual cash on the parcel, they having purchased the entire block 13 years ago for \$5300, a mortgage being given at the time to secure the purchase money.

In 1905 the north half of the same block was sold to the Western Electric company for \$18,000, and this sale together with the deal closed yesterday for the south half of the block makes a total of \$53,000 realized by the sellers on the \$5300 deal made in 1897.

This half block was acquired by Mrs. Gillette purely as an investment and it is not probable that it will be improved at an early date.

The report that the sale of this half block to Mrs. Gillette was handled through the agency of D. Parker Bryon & Co. is not true, as the deal was made directly by the interested parties.

OWNER OF "SNICKERS" VISITS ROSE CITY

W. R. Hotman, who owns a poultry ranch near Truwell, Mo., and is owner of the famous chicken cat "Snickers," is a guest at the Imperial hotel. He has come to be interviewed about "Snickers," but was finally induced to talk.

ROOSEVELT HUNT VIRTUALLY OVER

Party Leaves Gondokoro for Khartoum—Inventory of Big Game Killed.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Gondokoro, Sudan, Feb. 18.—With the departure of the Roosevelt party down the Nile, the great hunt of Bwana Tumbi through the wilds of East Africa closed today. The story of the "poorly master," replete with stirring incident and full of admiring praise for his prowess as a mighty hunter, will now take its place in the lore of the native who worships him as a king from a foreign land.

It is probable that there will be several little side trips for hunting on the way to Khartoum, but these will be of little comparative importance and it is not expected that any big game will be found. The members of the party, all of whom are well and apparently have thrived upon the outdoor life of the jungle, consider that the big hunt is over. Therefore it is possible to give the result of one expedition in respect to the same killed by Colonel Roosevelt and his son Kermit, which, aside from birds and reptiles taken by the naturalists, include practically all the game killed by the party.

Roosevelt's List.

Following is a record of the accomplishments of the former president and a list of the game he bagged: Rhinoceri, 18, including three white ones; elephants, 9; lions, 7; giraffe, 10; wild-beasts, 4; Thompson's gazelle, 1; hippopotami, 4; buffalo, 8; topi, 5; elands, 4; pythons, 1; ostrich, 1; leopard, 1; harlequin, 1; bohor, 1; impalla, 1; water buck, 1; zebra, 1; oryx, 1; bush-buck, 1; oribi, 1; kob, 1.

Kermit's Victims.

Kermit Roosevelt may boast of the following record of his shooting: Lions, 11; elephants, 2; rhinoceri, 3; bongo, 2; sabre, 3; buffalo, 4; giraffe, 3; hippopotami, 1; cheetahs, 3; popi, 3; monkeys, 2; wildbeasts, 1; elands, 1; leopard, 1.

These lists are made up of the more important items of the bag. Most of the animals included in the summary either will be sent to America or are on the way there for exhibition in the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, the Museum of Natural History of New York, and other museums.

No schedule has been arranged for the trip through Egypt, and it is impossible to state when the party will arrive at Khartoum.

The trip from here to Khartoum will probably be made in two weeks, but the progress will be regulated according to the pleasure of Colonel Roosevelt, who may decide to stop over at some point of interest. It is probable that Khartoum will not be reached before March 5.

Khartoum Prepares for Roosevelt.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Khartoum, Feb. 18.—Although former President Roosevelt is not expected to arrive here for two weeks, the city is rapidly filling with visitors anxious to greet him. It is estimated that Khartoum will entertain the greatest crowds in its history when the distinguished American reaches here.

The plans for entertaining Roosevelt are giving the city officials no little worry. In view of the fact that the former president has not announced the probable strength of his stay. They are anxious to arrange a formal program, but all attempts to learn the number of days he expects to be here have met with dismal failure.

LAURENS' HEIRS TO DIVIDE PROPERTY

Charles Laurens and William C. Laurens, the sons and only heirs of the late C. W. Laurens, who died on January 27, will divide \$14,700 worth of property between them, by the terms of the will of their father, admitted to probate in the county court. They are named as executors of the will.

Thomas M. Hurd's estate is valued at \$7000, according to an estimate filed in a petition for letters by Everett M. Hurd, a son and only heir. Hurd died on December 3. Herbert C. Miller, Arlie Thurlow and F. Beler were appointed as appraisers.

The estate of Bertha Louise Kleatsch is valued at \$1200, and letters have been issued to the mother of the deceased, Bertha Kleatsch. The heirs are the mother and eight brothers and sisters.

Honor Miss Willard's Memory.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., Feb. 18.—The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Hood River held appropriate memorial services at the I. O. O. F. hall Thursday afternoon in commemoration of the life work of Miss Frances E. Willard. The hall was decorated with evergreens and cut flowers. Mrs. William Kerr, president of the local W. C. T. U., read a splendid biographical sketch of Miss Willard's life. The program was interspersed with recitations, vocal and instrumental solos. The local society has a membership of 50. One hundred persons attended the exercises.

420 Acres Sold in Crook.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Bend, Or., Feb. 18.—Charles Graves is negotiating for the sale of a 420-acre tract, comprising what is now the town of Crescent, formerly known as Odell. The land is situated in the northern part of Klamath county, on the Oregon Trunk line, at a point where the Natron-Vale survey crosses that of the Oregon Trunk line.

It is said that the Oregon Trunk line is back of this deal, and the land will be played as a townsite. Arrangements have been made for the erection of a \$6000 hotel.

MRS. HINSHAW'S DEATH IN MOHLER ANNOUNCED

Word has been received by relatives in Portland of the death of Mrs. Isabella McKinney-Hinshaw of Mohler, Wash., who was well known here as the sister of Mrs. Rachel Cornelius of Portland. After the death of her husband about 15 years ago, Mrs. Hinshaw visited in Portland a number of times each year. Mrs. Hinshaw was born in Indiana in 1821, and came to Oregon with her parents in 1845. They settled in Washington county. In 1852 Isabella McKinney was married to Luke Hinshaw. Five children resulted from the union. Two died when young, but three—Mrs. Dora Morgan, John Hinshaw and William Hinshaw—survive. All live at Mohler, Wash.

Besides her sister, Mrs. Cornelius, wife of Dr. Cornelius, Mrs. Hinshaw left three brothers—Montgomery, William and Newton McKinney. Her father was William McKinney and her mother, Ann McKinney.

Mrs. Hinshaw was active in the sessions of Oregon and Washington pioneers and Indian war veterans. She was an ardent church worker.

WOMAN FAILS TO GET JUDGMENT SUED FOR

S. Russell Smith, a real estate dealer, will not be required to pay damages to Mabel H. Potter for injuries she sustained in a collision with his automobile at Third and Morrison streets on August 31. A verdict for the defendant was rendered in the case by a jury in Judge Gatens' department of the circuit court this morning.

The plaintiff asked for \$2600 damages. She was knocked down and severely bruised by the puffing auto.
