

HIGHER ORDER OF LIFE REQUIRED

Rev. Luther Dyott Tells of Demands of Today in Interesting Sermon.

"Our sufficiency is of God," was the subject of an interesting sermon delivered at the First Congregational church by Dr. Luther Dyott yesterday morning. The speaker argued that the present day demands called for a higher order of life than in times past. Stronger men and women were needed. It is impossible for their demands to be met without reliance upon God, Dr. Dyott said, in part.

"We are living in an exciting age. The times press upon us with authoritative demands. Some problems are connected with all life upon earth. They belong to every generation, slowly evolving and struggling up the slope. They were met by men and women in other ages, and we face these same problems today, in a more or less aggravated condition. Other problems belong to a given age, possessed of certain distinctive peculiarities.

"Our modern life is more complex than was the life of our fathers. The inherent condition of things today admits of more emergencies and exigencies. Everywhere our present tense civilization finds itself frequently confronted with sudden or unexpected occurrences and conditions, calling for immediate action.

Perplexing Combination.

"Now and again a perplexing and pressing combination of circumstances may be found requiring prompt remedy, relief or help. So also it is with individuals in trying places in life.

"In many respects, if not in every respect, it requires a higher order of life to meet the demands of today than at any other period in the history of the world. Hence stronger men and women are needed.

"It is well for life, it is well for us, that it is so, if we are what we ought to be. A strong man is not at his best in an easy place. He cannot let himself out upon a task that is no match for him.

Concerning a Good Man.

"A good man does not ask for an easy place, unless he is good for nothing, and then he is no longer good at all. The fact of the whole matter is that any person who becomes at all conscious of just what is required of him or her in this serious and yet joyous business of living finds that not only comes to one's best in giving the best there is in one, but in attempting to face the whole stupendous proposition one must move up to the place where one finds that which is impossible without God.

Full Below Measure.

"To be held to the facts of life as they are, to be ignorant, to be weak, to fall back, to shrink, to offer inexcusable excuses must mean that all such persons as are in these conditions, and do these things, fall below the full measure of individual life, and defraud the sum total of human life of that which belongs to it.

"No man is even approximately near the chief contents of his best life who feels that he is altogether equal to that which he ought to do. We need to

TALENT HERE FOR GREAT ORCHESTRA

This Demonstrated Yesterday When Band Played for Rose Festival at Bungalow.

Portland is so well equipped with professional musicians of unusual talent and ability that on a few days' notice a band equal to the best in the world could be organized here without seeking assistance anywhere outside. This was demonstrated yesterday afternoon when the Musicians' Mutual association gave its concert at the Bungalow theatre.

And many of those who heard it went away hoping that in the future the performers would get together occasionally in concert, and it would not be necessary to wait for a Sousa, 'Creator of any of the other 'big ones' to come and charge \$2 per seat for a program of less merit than that played yesterday by home talent.

The instrumentation was complete, every section being splendidly represented among the 60 performers who had been selected for the occasion. There could have been more had the stage and auditorium been larger.

Nothing Lacking.

From the oboe down to the Bb basses and the string contra basses there was nothing lacking in reed or brass, and the result was beautiful tone effects and exquisite coloring. The tone effect was aided by the use of four cellos. It is seldom that the traveling organizations, even those of first order, carry such a well chosen and evenly balanced instrumentation.

The audience was not as large as might have been anticipated, but this was perhaps largely due to the heavy showers that certainly did not invite the people to get out and away from their cheerful firesides on a Sunday afternoon. It had been expected that the house would be filled to capacity.

The program had been well selected, for it contained such numbers as the difficult "Ritual" overture by Wagner, the "Dance of the Hours" from "La Gioconda" by Ponchielli, three "Nell Gwynn" dances by German, Victor Herbert's "Red Mill" and the grand fantasia from Verdi's "Aida."

Solo Work Liked.

The solo work included the well known cornet solo, "Sanctus" from St. Cecilia, charmingly played by Ben Brisson, and Titi's serenade duet for flute and French horn, played by H. G. Knight and Charles Walrath. The duet was so well received that it had to be repeated. Mr. Brisson played "The Rosary" for an encore.

The program opened with the military march, "Pomp and Circumstances," No. 1, by Edward Elgar, conducted by Ralph W. Hoyt, president of the Rose Festival committee and a musician of note. This march is a composition majestic in character and calling for a large instrumentation.

The other numbers were conducted by Charles Fierke and W. H. Boyer and both were enthusiastically applauded for their excellent work.

The proceeds from the concert will form a nucleus for a fund with which to encourage street decorations during the Rose Festival week.

"A MIDNIGHT MARRIAGE" LAST OF MELODRAMAS

When Band Played for Rose Festival at Bungalow.

At the Portland theatre last night "A Midnight Marriage," the third and last of Russell & Drew's melodramas to be presented here by the Portland theatre stock company, drew heavily on the remaining thrills of sensational theatricals. A feature of the present production was the diversity of the settings; the interior of the New York subway, a glittering dance hall, a den of thieves, other dark and uncanny spots peculiar to the slums, the palatial homes on upper Fifth avenue are among the showing.

Through such scenes, with the hero and heroine pursued by the villain and confederates, this mighty drama makes its way. And, needless to say, all this trouble is occasioned by the villain's insatiable desire for the hero's papa's money.

Miss Neva West, the leading woman of the organization, is again seen to advantage in the part of the heroine. Miss West is an earnest, conscientious player, whose chief asset is a musical and appealing voice. William Dowling played the lead and received his share of applause. True Boardman and Miss Claire were the scheming villains, acquitting themselves with credit. Miss Eva Earle French, prima favorite with her audiences, contributed a character drawing that was excellent. The remainder of the cast fulfilled all expectations.

ADVENTISTS ADJOURN; INCREASE TERRITORY

After a week spent in deliberation over the various problems which confront the church in the northwest, the North Pacific Union Conference of Seventh Day Adventists adjourned yesterday.

The conference has been one of the most successful ever held by the Adventists.

In attendance at the convention have been over 75 delegates from other cities, representing seven conferences. The work of the conference has so largely increased that the delegates found it necessary to enlarge the district into seven instead of five conferences. Conferences to be known as Southern and Eastern Oregon conferences were established. The other five are Oregon, Washington, Upper Columbia, Idaho and Montana. All were represented at the conference just closed.

In order to assist the work of the medical division of the church, each conference was assessed the sum of \$1000, the major part of which will go towards the installing of a college at Loma Linda, Cal., for the education of medical missionaries. Copies of the book, "Ministry of Healing," are to be sold in hopes of raising at least \$45,000 for the benefit of the Portland sanitarium at Mount Tabor.

A missionary convention at which the delegates will be taught the best methods of reaching the public will occupy the attention of some of the delegates up till Wednesday of this week. Most of the delegates left for their homes last night.
