The prizes will then be awarded according to the list of marks, won by members of The International Newspaper Bible Study club.

Prizes. First Series—A gold medal to each of the first five contestants. Second Series—A silver medal to each of the next five contestants. Third Series—A Teachers' Bible, price \$5.00, to each of the next five contestants.

Fourth Series—The book "The Heart of Christianity," price \$1.50, to each of the next five contestants. Each medal will be suitably engraved, giving the name of the winner and for what it is awarded and in like manner each Bible and book will be inscribed.

LABOR RESIST ON INVESTIGATION

Will Employ Attorney to Look Into School Board Expenditures.

Central Labor council at a meeting last night gave to its legislative committee full power to conduct its own investigation of school board expenditures. This includes the employing of an attorney and the filing of a formal complaint, if it should become necessary.

A resolution unanimously adopted contained criticism of the board for constituting, as it is termed, "its own judge and jury" in the investigation of charges made by Alex McLeod so far as that investigation has proceeded. At the same time no question was raised as to the justice of exonerating Director J. V. Beach of charges which related particularly to his own conduct.

The board of the labor council's legislative committee is Will Day, who is also president of the State Federation of Labor. The secretary is H. J. Parkins, who said this morning: "The Central Labor council is not particularly concerned with the petty charges thus far made. But it is suspicious that irregularities have obtained during the past few years which are of considerable magnitude and of great importance to the taxpayers of this city. The council has authorized the legislative committee to proceed along the lines of the broadest possible investigation of school board procedure. If such an investigation is ever conducted, it should be some one must take the initiative and the Central Labor council has chosen to perform this service for the people of Portland."

"At the meeting last night affidavits were read which tend to confirm the suspicions that the past administration of the school board has been to an extent irregular. The committee will hold a meeting this afternoon to determine a definite plan of action."

REPAIRS FOR EAST 28TH ST. BRIDGE

Kansas City Engineers Will Start Work Soon as Plans Prepared.

Repairs on the East Twenty-eighth street bridge will be made by the Northwest Bridge Works as soon as plans for the work can be prepared by Waddell & Harrington, the Kansas City engineers appointed by the executive board to examine the reinforced concrete viaduct, which was rejected by the Lane administration on account of faulty construction.

An agreement was made between the present executive board and the bridge works by which the contractors are to make the repairs designated by Waddell & Harrington, and then to sue the city for the cost not only of the repairs, but of the entire bridge. The bridge company maintains that it built the structure according to specifications.

City Engineer Morris said yesterday that Waddell & Harrington would forward the plans for the repairs now in a very short time.
