O. R. & N. CO. MUST GIVE SOMETHING FOR CITY STREETS

Mayor and City Councilmen View Site on the East Side Asked for by the Company. Executive Speaks Strongly.

ment of necessary incidental expenses there, is hereby levied annually a tax of one-twentieth of a mill on the dollar upon all taxable property within the state of Oregon.

To Collect Tax Annually.

"Such tax shall be levied and collected annually as other taxes are levied and collected, and the fund arising therefrom shall be paid into the state treasury and kept separate and apart from other funds, and shall be known as the eastern Oregon State Normal school fund, and shall be paid out only on warrants drawn by the secretary of state on the state treasurer against said fund, and under the supervision and direction of the board of regents and their successors in office.

"If any portion of said fund shall not be used during any fiscal year, the balance remaining shall be carried over until the next year and added to the fund for that year, and the secretary of state is authorized and directed to audit and allow all claims otherwise payable out of such fund, regardless of the date when contracted."

The members of the committee which met yesterday are: C. A. Johns, J. L. Rand of Baker City, W. M. Pierce and Turner Oliver of La Grande, Dr. C. J. Smith, James A. Fee, Frank Saling, of Pendleton, C. A. Barrett, Athens, P. A. Worthington, Portland; C. W. Steenway, A. R. Shumway, of Milton; F. A. Llewellyn, Owen Richmond, B. F. Lavender, Weston.

The proposed enactment provides for the assessment of one twenty-fifth of a mill on all state property for the support of Weston. This, at the present valuation, would amount to about \$77,000 annually. Its adoption means that the superior Weston institution, consisting of buildings and apparatus valued at more than \$75,000, will again be set into operation training the young people of eastern Oregon for life usefulness where now there are no schools.

Don't Want Delay.

The bill, if adopted, cannot at the best be made effective sooner than the fall of 1912. If approved by the people and the assessment made in 1911, the proceeds would not be in for the appropriation made before the time named. For this reason friends of not only of Weston Normal, but of Ashland and Monmouth, are anxious to avoid delay. Consequently a hot campaign was planned and moved at yesterday's committee meeting.

The current impression that Weston Normal is a defunct institution was converted yesterday by President R. C. French of the Y. M. C. A. school, who was formerly the principal at Weston.

"Weston Normal is like a complete engine waiting for the application of power," said President French. "The equipment there is unusually good. The school is fitted to turn out splendidly trained young men and women. All we need is money to meet expenses."

Needs Normal School.

"That the legislature did not make an appropriation for the school's support at its last meeting is unfortunate for the state of Oregon. Eastern Oregon needs the eastern Oregon State Normal school. Its reinstatement should not be delayed."

P. A. Worthington, formerly a member of the board of regents, also a member of the committee that met at Pendleton, said in regard to the bill:

"In proposing an initiative bill for the maintenance of the eastern Oregon Normal school, its friends are asking that the existing state institution, whose idle plant is valued at \$75,000, may be reopened and made to assist in supplying the demand for trained teachers in the public schools of the state. They believe the people will consider this matter upon its merits, and in doing so will take into account the action of the state which it most directly serves."

Appeal to Rome.

"We appeal to the judgment of the home and society builders of our growing state, whether they reside in southern Oregon, Willamette valley or in the vastness of central Oregon. Knowingly that now an area of one hundred square miles in the most promising part of the state is unsupplied with educational advantages for its young people, and think what a menace such a condition is to the future development of eastern Oregon."

The form of bill which was approved yesterday reads as follows:

"Section 1. For the support and maintenance of the eastern Oregon State Normal school at Weston, the state shall appropriate for the payment of salaries of its teachers and employees; to keep the buildings, grounds and other property thereof in repair; for the purchase of additional land for the campus thereof; or otherwise if necessary; for the purchase of library books, laboratory supplies and apparatus, and for the payment of the cost of the school."

Mayor Simon, nine councilmen and City Engineer Morris made an automobile trip to the east side yesterday afternoon to view the streets for the vacation of which the O. R. & N. Co. has petitioned the city. The municipal delegation was met on the ground by a number of property owners and representatives of the East Side Business Men's club.

The object of the visit to the east side of the river was for the council and the mayor to familiarize themselves with the location of the streets asked for by the railroad company and to gain an idea of the value of the property.

None of the city officials expressed himself in favor of granting the company in the general discussion which ensued after the automobiles had reached their destination, but from the attitude taken by every one of those who took part in the debate it is easily to be inferred that the council will not give away any of the land asked for until the railroad has agreed to give something in return.

Will Insist on Concessions.

Mayor Simon has abstained from mixing in the controversy between the railroad and the East Side Business Men's club, but he stated positively yesterday afternoon that he would insist on a number of concessions from the company before he would be willing to grant its petition.

"I don't like to be quoted on this subject," said the mayor, "as I wish to preserve a neutral attitude. I want to see the new railroad bridge built, as I realize that it will greatly facilitate traffic across the river and will be of great benefit to the public, but at the same time I will not permit the wholesale gift to the railroad company of valuable property now owned by the city, without reasonable compensation therefor. I will see to it that the interests of taxpayers are guarded in every way."

Pier in Terminal Yards.

"For one thing, I will ask that the company give to the city ground enough in the terminal yards on which to build a pier for the proposed Broadway bridge in exchange for the vacation of portions of Adams and Oregon streets needed by the railroad company for the approach to its new bridge. The company should at the very least be willing to make this exchange."

"I think it is the disposition of the city council at this time to take up the matter of the vacation of other streets besides Oregon and Adams at the same time these are considered."

The members of the council whom I have talked to are strongly in favor of threshing the whole matter out at once."

The councilmen who went over to the east side with the mayor yesterday were: Menefee, Ellis, Kuhl, Rushlight, Wallace, Lombard, Cellars, Baker and Conannon.

NEW ANESTHETIC IS FOUND IN QUININE

Kansas City, Feb. 26.—Out of the fever-infected jungles of the backwoods of Arkansas has come a medical discovery that may revolutionize surgical practice. An anesthetic which the faculty of the University of Kansas medical college declares is superior to any other in medical knowledge—one which throws stovaine into the class of short-lived narcotics and which they insist will eliminate cocaine from use as a local anesthetic—is the gift to the world of Dr. Henry Thibault of Scott, Ark.

This new anesthetic is quinine—common quinine—and startling claims are made for it. The effect of quinine when injected locally lasts for days, so that if tonsils are involved, or bones are cut from the nose, there is no pain for many days. Cocaine loses its power shortly after the operation. Quinine has the tissues, preventing hemorrhages. Cocaine does not do this.

The vindication of these claims has just been announced by Dr. Arthur B. Hertler, assistant professor of surgery in the University of Kansas medical college at Roseville; Dr. Ford B. Rodgers of the college dispensary, and Dr. D. Brewster, special investigator.

HITCHCOCK APPEARS TO HAVE A HITCH ON TUCSON CITIZEN

Tucson, Ariz., Feb. 26.—The Tucson Evening Citizen, a daily paper, was sold today to the Tucson Printing & Publishing company of which James T. Williams Jr. of Washington, former United States civil service commissioner, is president. The paper hereafter will be published as a Republican organ. It formerly was Democratic and among the stockholders of the company are said to be men of national importance. This is said to be unusually interesting following the report that the Republican organization contemplates the purchase of five Arizona papers and that they would support the candidacy of Postmaster General Hitchcock for a seat in the United States senate when Arizona becomes a state.

Other officers of the company that has taken over the Citizen are: Allen B. Jaynes, clerk of the United States district court at Tucson, vice president, and general manager; John H. Wright, attorney general of Arizona, secretary and treasurer.

The Citizen has set 12,000 population as its goal for 1912.

EARL HIGLEY IS DEEP IN TROUBLE

Youth Twice Indicted for Burglary Will Have to Stand Trial.

Earl Higley, a youth twice indicted by the grand jury on charges of burglary and larceny, was arraigned before Presiding Judge Morrow in the circuit court yesterday afternoon and allowed until tomorrow to enter his plea. strenuous efforts have been made to secure Higley's parole from the juvenile court, one plan being to allow him to enter the navy, but he has now reached the age of 18 years, and presumably will have to stand trial.

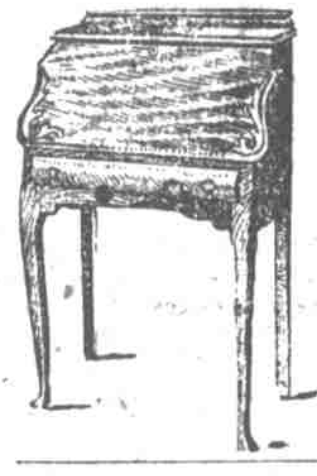
Higley, despite his youth, has many exploits to his credit. The most notable in this county occurred last October, when, with a companion, he bound Sophie Hamre, a domestic, in a home on Portland Heights, and ransacked the house. In July he is alleged to have broken into a house and stolen a suit of clothes worth \$40, opera glasses valued at \$20, and other articles. In Los Angeles he is said to have escaped capture by the officers by hurdling a high hedge on horseback.

Young Higley attained such fame that a youth who confessed a robbery in the juvenile court a few months ago boasted he was "almost equal to Higley." When arrested Higley was under 18 years of age, but since the charges have been pending he has passed the 18 mark, and Judge Brown has steadily refused to interfere with a trial in the circuit court.

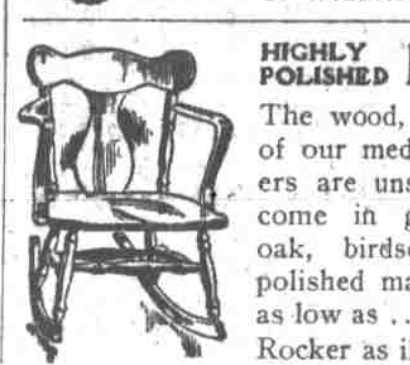

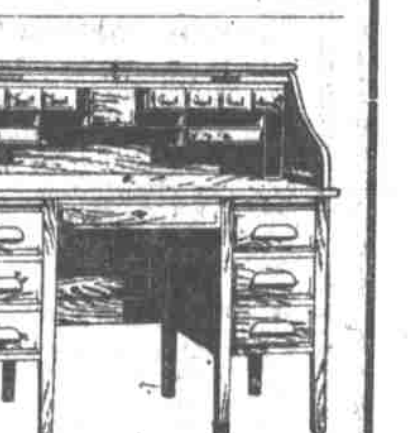
