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will prevent the operation of trains for the next 48 hours. All east bound trains are held at Nampa and west bound at Glenn's Ferry. Boise is entirely cut off from the east and will be without mail service for two days.

The loss suffered at Caldwell by the flood which yesterday and last night swept through the town is today estimated at more than \$100,000. Nampa also suffered heavily, nearly 100 families being forced to abandon their homes.

The Boise river is still rising and the highest water in years is predicted.

HEAVY RAINS DELAY ALL TRAINS FROM EVERY DIRECTION

Trains from all directions are arriving in Portland late because of slow tracks and blockades. Northern trains are arriving in an indefinite way, and trains from the east over the O. R. & N. are about three hours behind schedule. Southern Pacific trains, too, are late, it being deemed advisable to display caution owing to the heavy rains of last night.

The Spokane, Portland & Puget Sound line is open over its entire distance between Portland and Spokane, but the track is soft in places and the running time has been reduced as a precautionary measure.

Carrying Other Trains.

The Pasco-Spokane track of this line is carrying in addition to its own business, trains of the O. R. & N. and the Great Northern and Northern Pacific trains managed to make their own track last night between Pasco and Spokane, but it is not known if that stretch of road is open today, no reports having been received from that district this morning, the wires having gone down in the blow of last night.

The Oregon division of the O. R. & N. was open till 5 o'clock this morning, when a slide about 40 feet in length and five feet deep blocked the track about one half mile west of Cascade Locks. It is expected to have this slide removed early this afternoon. The slide resulted from the heavy rains and rapid melting of the snow during the night.

Branch Open Today.

It is reported that the Shaniko branch of the O. R. & N. will be open for business again this afternoon. The wires along the Washington division of the O. R. & N. are down today and it has been impossible to gain authentic reports concerning conditions of the line, but it has been opened between Umatilla and Wallula. Reports regarding developments on the Snake river line and in Hay canyon are anxiously awaited by the railroad officials here.

Great Northern trains are being routed by way of Vancouver and over the S. P. & S. tracks to Spokane.

Taft Sends for Cannon, Aldrich

Leaders Advise Him How to
Make Administration Doses
Go Down.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Washington, March 1.—President Taft today summoned Speaker Cannon and Senator Aldrich to the White House for a conference in which he urged legislation by congress on the legislation backed by his administration and now pending. Attorney General Wickham was present at the conference.

The six measures which Taft insists shall become laws before the present session of congress ends, were discussed. Aldrich and Cannon pointed out to the president certain features which they deemed objectionable to many of the legislators and which, they intimated, were responsible for the holding up of the measures.

The president, with the advice of Attorney General Wickham, has begun an investigation into the delay of congress in adopting the administration measures.

Gondokoro, March 1.—"I'm getting anxious to see Sandy Hook."

This statement by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt revealed his first touch of malady since leaving New York. He had suffered a slight attack of homesickness. The confession came after his receipt of a message from his wife and daughter, who have arrived at Naples.

Colonel Roosevelt was told that a committee of westerners would meet him at Khartoum and invite him to return to the United States by way of San Francisco. The colonel shook his head and said:

"I want to get home as quickly as possible. During the hunt I did not permit myself to think of home or business. Now that the hunt is practically over, I'm getting anxious to see Sandy Hook."

"My plans for the visits to Berlin, Paris and London, however, have been made for many months, and I have no thought of canceling them now."

Charged With Embezzlement.

Geddes, who was taken away from his books at the market of Pat Burns & Co., butchers, Saturday night, by provincial police, charged with embezzling the funds of the Brecht Butchers' Supply company at Denver, Colo., waived extradition proceedings and agreed to accompany a Pinkerton detective across the line. The amount with which he is charged is \$500, but it is alleged his defalcations amount to \$6000 and he has been sought by the police since last summer. Geddes was wearing under his own name. His wife and three children were with him.

Patten, the "wheat king" whose sensational deals cornered the nation's market nearly a year ago, announced yesterday that he had accumulated money enough to enable him to retire July 1. Patten refused to divulge the extent of his winnings resulting from manipulation of the market.

the ones, without a second's warning, were buried by the great sliding mass.

Brave Rescuer.

James Rogers, after working desperately for several hours aiding the workmen to extricate himself from the snow, was rescued yesterday but his injuries caused his death a few hours after he was taken from the snow.

At Carbonate hill, where the third slide occurred, two are dead and half a dozen men are injured. It is not known how many more are beneath the wreckage. The Carbonate hill slide was not so great in extent as others in the Cœur d'Alene district, but its force was as great and it swept everything before it.

A fourth slide, at the North Franklin mine, near Burke, played a peculiar freak when it descended upon the bunk house of the miners. Two men were sleeping in one room of the cabin. The whole building was torn to splinters. At Dorsey, Idaho, a fifth slide is reported to have caused the death of two unidentified men, and at Adair a third unidentified man is reported to have been killed by a sixth slide.

last 24 hours, from 5 o'clock last night. "There is not enough water in sight now," said Mr. Beals, "to bring the river to a stage of over 15 feet, but if a heavy rain should come, which is not anticipated, it is hard to tell what it might do."

Central Over British Columbia.

The disturbance which made its ap-

pearance last night is now central over British Columbia and the storm warnings which were ordered last night at 6 o'clock to all coast stations in the district, Bellingham bay and the gulf of Georgia, were extended this morning to include all Puget sound ports. Conditions are given on the weather map as follows:

The indications are for occasional rain in this district tonight and Wednesday, with lower temperatures Wednesday.

Note: The river at Portland will reach a stage of 13.5 feet Wednesday, 14.5 feet Thursday and probably 15.0 feet Friday.

Forecast Till 5 p. m. Wednesday. Portland and vicinity—Occasional rain tonight and Wednesday; cooler tonight. Southwest winds, diminishing tonight.

NATIVE TROOPS FOR FRANCE IN AFRICA

Paris, March 1.—A committee of French officers today began its work of choosing a uniform to be worn by a regiment of native African negroes, which is to be created for service in the French African possessions. The negro regiment was authorized by the chamber of deputies recently.

If the regiment proves a success it is planned to enlist other blacks, with the view of using negro troops to replace white regiments now stationed in the possessions. The negroes are better fitted to withstand the climate. It is the present intention to officer the negro companies with white men.

Cable Operator Missing.

Victoria, B. C., March 1.—Samuel Barrett, one of the Pacific Cable company's operators at Bamfield creek, is reported lost. He set out Sunday on a shooting expedition on the Alberni canal in a boat. He did not return and a lifeboat was sent out. Barrett's boat was found overturned, but there was no trace of him. He was apparently caught in a squall and thrown out and drowned.

DREADNAUGHT'S SIZE IS LEFT TO MEYER

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Washington, March 1.—The house committee on naval affairs this afternoon decided to allow Secretary of the Navy Meyer to decide whether the two battleships to be constructed next year should be 24,000, 28,000 or 30,000 tons. The committee merely limits the secretary to the expenditure of \$6,000,000 for each ship, exclusive of the cost of armor, guns and equipment. Meyer's recommendation for one repair ship and two colliers was approved. Four submarines instead of five were allowed.
