

## JAPANESE ARE RETURNING HOME

Statistics Show That Emigration to America Is Less by Half Than Heretofore.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
San Francisco, March 1.—According to data given out from the office of the consulate general of Japan here, the number of Japanese arriving in the United States is steadily decreasing. Figures gathered by the Japanese foreign office show that the number of Japanese who left for this country in 1909 was 1913, as compared with 1908. For the same period the number of Japanese who returned to their country from the United States was less by 405.

## Y. M. C. A. TO CARE FOR CHILDREN

"Big Brother Movement" for Delinquent Tots Will Be Started Here.

For the care of delinquent and near-delinquent children, Portland is to have a "big brother movement," such as was inaugurated in New York some time ago, and has been taken up in other cities. The movement here has been launched by the Young Men's Christian Association and officers of the juvenile court.

The big brother movement is to be organized tonight at a dinner to be held in the auditorium of the Young Men's Christian Association. Invitations to the dinner have been sent out to those who have expressed an interest in the work of caring for delinquent children. It is hoped to enlist still others at future meetings. In fact, there will be an open session tonight at 7:15, which all interested are invited to attend.

Each person who joins the movement takes on himself the responsibility of acting as a "big brother" to some child who is in unfortunate circumstances. In this class are included not only charges of the juvenile court, but other children who are in danger of becoming delinquent. The "big brothers" put forth their efforts to direct these children along the lines of upright living.

The meeting tonight will be addressed by Circuit Judge Bronaugh and by R. R. Perkins, religious work director of the Y. M. C. A. Fred Lockley of the Pacific Monthly will preside. Mr. Perkins is very familiar with work among delinquent children, having spent some time investigating juvenile court cases in St. Louis.

## CAN'T CALL BLUFF OF PACIFIC MAIL

Secretary of War Fears Withdrawal of Ships if Exclusive Contract Is Not Made.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Washington, March 1.—Secretary of War Dickinson has begun an investigation of the subject of mail contracts, and of the feasibility of chartering steamships and of any other possible way of avoiding his enforced acceptance of terms offered by the Pacific Mail Steamship company in the transaction of business of the war department.

Dickinson appeared before the senate committee on interoceanic canals, which is investigating transcontinental railroad conditions and their possible effect on the commercial value of the Panama canal. He said he had been led by circumstances into a position where he must grant the Pacific Mail an exclusive carrying contract. He declared the grant would be illegal, as neither he nor any other cabinet member had authority to make it.

The secretary said the Pacific Mail intimated that it would withdraw its ships from the Pacific coast run, thereby depriving the government of an outlet on that coast unless the government consented to its demands.

"If the ships on the Pacific side should be withdrawn, I feel my position would have been indefensible, and therefore I was forced to accept the terms offered by the Pacific Mail," said the secretary. "I consulted with President Taft, who knew more about canal affairs than I did, and we were not willing to take the risk of calling the Pacific Mail Steamship company's bluff."

Dickinson said he is in alliance with the Southern Pacific railroad. He told the committee that he visited President R. P. Schwerin of the Pacific Mail regarding his suspicion, and that his interview with Schwerin had been somewhat stormy. Schwerin denied the existence of any working agreement, but Dickinson said he departed with the belief that the steamship line was not independent.

In conclusion the secretary told the committee that the surest way to break the alleged monopoly was for the government to establish a steamship line to ply between Pacific coast ports. He added, however, that he was not prepared to say that this would be the wisest course for the government to pursue.

The committee will continue its investigations and probably Secretary Dickinson will appear before it again, fortified with further data.

## HAWLEY FAILS TO SEE OREGON'S NEEDS

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)  
Salem, Or., March 1.—In the opinion of the state land agent, Peter Applegate, Congressman Hawley's much mooted land bill is designed to remedy a situation in this state that does not exist. The bill, Hawley said, is employed more profitably, it is said, in an endeavor to bring about the purchase of the Oregon City locks, to get a weather bureau for southern Oregon, or to secure relief for the Siletz home-steader.

Hawley has introduced several bills in congress with the idea of correcting an evil in relation to school lands that does not exist, and, according to the state land agent, he is fighting windmills. Neither the state land board nor any of the state land departments have been consulted by Mr. Hawley, but he has jumped into the matter blindly without an understanding of the true situation, says Mr. Applegate.

The congressman has the idea that Oregon has been cheated out of a lot of school lands through the creation of the forest reserves. The truth of the matter is, the state has been benefited to the extent of hundreds of thousands of dollars through the creation of the reserves, for land has been passed by congress, providing that whenever a tract of school land is included within the boundaries of a forest reserve, whether surveyed or unsurveyed, it may be surrendered to the government and other lands outside of the reserve selected in lieu of it. School lands become a basis for lieu selections and for that reason are called "base."

The state of Oregon has left only from 40,000 to 60,000 acres of this base, or school lands, within the bound-

aries of forest reserves, and this base is now selling rapidly at \$13 an acre. Most of the unsold lands included within forest reserves were worthless, rocky, mountainous lands. If they had not been included in the forest reserves they would have been left forever upon the hands of the state and could not have been sold for \$2.50 an acre.

On account of the reserves this land became available for base and has been exchanged for other unselected lands, both surveyed and unsurveyed. It is now being sold by the state at \$13 an acre. It is likely that within six months the whole amount now included in the forest reserves will be sold, or its equivalent, for the lieu land is going fast, and the state will be gaining by several hundreds of thousands of dollars.

## SYMPATHETIC STRIKE IMPENDS AT BUTTE

Butte, Mont., March 1.—A sympathetic strike of all crafts affiliated with the American Federation of Labor employed at the mines here is imminent because of the attitude of the Western Federation of Miners in refusing to permit six of the seceding engineers to return to work under any consideration. National President Matt Comerford of the International Steam Engineers, offered to order back all the striking engineers under virtually the same conditions as obtained before the strike, but officials of the miners' union declared that in view of the action of the six engineers in furthering the movement to pull apart from the

Western Federation they would be barred forever from working in the Butte mines.

This attitude so aroused other American Federation of Labor unions that at an excited meeting last night which continued until early this morning it was decided to dispatch to the miners tonight another committee representing
