

WILL PUT DRAW QUESTION UP TO WAR DEPARTMENT

East Side Business Men's Club Determined to Fight for Closed Bridges During Rush Hours.

At a meeting of the East Side Business Men's club last night in the Healy building, the draw bridge question was the important topic discussed. This question has been the subject at all the meetings of the numerous push clubs. The people of the east part of the river are so angry because of delays that they will lay the matter before the war department.

The question of the draw bridge took up much of the club's time at the meeting. A resolution was adopted providing that bridges be closed during rush hours. This resolution states that the war department has been ignoring the pleas of the people of East Portland and that the delay and inconvenience suffered by the thousands who cross the bridge daily to and from work is great.

It is the plan of the club to print 100,000 postal cards and distribute them among residents so they may send in their complaints to be forwarded to the Oregon delegation at Washington. Streetcar conductors will hand out the cards to passengers. When the cards are given to the complaining sufferer they will mail them in a nearby mail box to the senators.

The club will start a fund to defray the expenses of the children's parade and decoration on the east side during the Rose Festival. The resolution calls for \$100 to be subscribed. The club also took action looking to the illumination of east side streets during the festival.

The streets which will be lighted are East Grand avenue, from Sullivan's street to Clay street, and East Burnside and East Morrison streets.

THIRTY MINERS KILLED IN TREADWELL MINE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Juneau, Alaska, March 4.—The bodies of 30 miners killed in yesterday's explosion in the Treadwell mine are in a temporary morgue on Douglas island today. Six injured are in the hospital and between 12 and 15 are in the mine, with no hopes of their rescue. Twenty-seven men were killed instantly. The other three have died in the hospital. Little attempt at rescue work is being made today because of the all but utter impossibility of it. Forty boxes of giant powder exploded with such terrific force, as to completely wreck the station where the men were working. It will take days to clear away the debris. The men rescued and all the bodies recovered were farther back in the level and were taken through a tunnel into another shaft and thence to the surface.

All of the men are foreigners, a motley crew of Austrians, Servians, Italians and a sprinkling of Scandinavians. The body of Nels Rustgard, the stope boss, is the only one identified. He leaves a family. Some of the men were literally torn to shreds. Others received horrible burns on the face, making identification difficult.

Company officials state today that only the grossest carelessness could have caused such an explosion.

Girl Charged With Theft. (United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, March 4.—Florence Thompson, a pretty blonde of 19 years, is in the city jail charged with the theft of a \$500 diamond ring from a woman friend whom she had been visiting. Love of finery is the motive imputed. It is

alleged that she stole the diamond from her friend, Mrs. Finta Christman, and pawned it for \$150. Thereupon, it is alleged, she purchased expensive garments, and then returned to the home of Mrs. Christman. As she stepped into the house she was greeted by a detective, who informed her that the "captain would like to see her at the station."
