TEST OF FLUSHING MACHINES MADE

Members of Street Cleaning Committee Pleased With the Result.

Two new street flushing machines, recently purchased by the city from a St. Louis company, were tried out yesterday afternoon on the Belgian block pavement between Ninth and Eleventh streets on Hoyt. Present at the test were Chairman Sam Connell of the street cleaning committee of the executive board, L. G. Clarke of the same committee, and Superintendent Alex Donaldson of the street cleaning department.

The machines worked to the satisfaction of the committee and the superintendent, who will report favorably upon them to the executive board. The machines cost \$1125 and were ordered by the committee subject to a test.

The flushers are manufactured by the St. Louis Street Flushing Machine company. Their capacity is 500 gallons and the water is thrown upon the street by compressed air, the compressor being automatic and maintaining the same pressure as that of the water at the hydrant from which it happens to be taken.

Much Lumber From Kalama. (Special Dispatch to the Journal.) Kalama, Wash., March 5.—The port of Kalama is turning out nearly 2,000,000 feet of lumber per month at present. This amount would be increased some if ships could be had regularly. The Willard Case mill is preparing to

double its output as soon as the weather settles. At present they are turning out about 75,000 feet per day. The Mountain Timber company is making preparations to put in a logging road from the Willard Case mills to their holdings.
