BIG CROWD HEARS PROFESSOR STOUT

Singing Evangelist Causes the Taylor Street Church to Be Packed to the Doors.

Professor R. P. Stout drew a monster audience to the Taylor Street church last night to hear his singing. More people were turned away unable to secure admission to the church than were able to get inside, where people were packed into every available seat and ranged around the steps of the pulpit and at every vantage point.

The meeting last night was the first of a series of two weeks' duration and provisions have been made for an overflow meeting this evening in the Sunday school room of the church. Professor Stout will sing at both meetings.

The singing evangelist fulfills the promises made for him by those who had heard his singing before he came to Portland. He has a voice of remarkable range and power, singing the high notes and the low notes without apparent effort. Every song sung by him carries a message and his enunciation is so clear that every person within the reach of his voice is able to understand that message. Professor Stout also has a wonderful control of his voice, handling it with wonderful ease and facility like a master player at his instrument.

Tonight he will sing two songs, which are particularly pleasing as given by him, one "The Model Church," and the other "The Sword of the Lord and of Gideon." Professor Stout will sing every night this week except Saturday night.

Dr. Fletcher Homan, president of Willamette university, will preach a short sermon this evening, after which Professor Stout will take charge of the musical part of the services.

the hiding place for the poison. Mrs. Wilcox, Mrs. Pugh and Crossan will take the stand, telling of the discovery that the vial of strychnine was missing from the hiding place, and the finding of the empty bottle in the pantry, which adjoins the room in which Wilcox and Pepon mixed the drink for Mrs. Pepon on the afternoon she died.

Then the cashier of the Bank of Northport will be asked to testify to the effect that he cashed a check for \$100, drawn to the credit of Wilcox by Pepon, on the day the convict escaped and broke parole. Penitentiary officials will declare that under the law, Wilcox, being a paroled convict, was entitled to only \$15 a month. He worked for Pepon 20 days.

Northport, Wash., (via Spokane Junction, Wash., March 7.)—I thank The Journal. It has forced justice in Stevens county. I was prosecution of the murderer or murderers of my daughter to The Journal.

The analysis of the remains of my daughter was not needed to convince me she was murdered. I knew, three days after she died, that she was killed. But it was needed to convince others. It has.

Before the analysis was completed I knew strychnine had been administered. The result of the analysis has convinced the authorities that my daughter was murdered. The case will be prosecuted.

Nearly every resident of Stevens county is interested in the murder mystery. Interest is intense. I would also thank the people of Northport. They have helped me in every possible way.

ever, it is said, since scores of labor leaders throughout the country would gladly volunteer to carry on the fight. It is understood that the unionists have made every preparation for such a contingency and that the leaders would be released almost immediately provided the courts would accept bail. The authorities are making every effort to keep the United States troops out of Philadelphia. The regular and special force, which numbered 7500 men last week, has been increased to 10,000. Director of Public Safety Henry Clay announced that he thought this number sufficient to prevent rioting. He denied that he would ask for troops and said the men at his disposal, augmented by the city employees, particularly of the fire department, would be able to handle the situation.

Clay's Denial. Clay denied the claims of the strike leaders that 15,000 men were on strike, declaring that he believed only 20,000 men had quit work and that many of these were ready to return to work.

It is reported, however, that coast artillery companies at Fort Dupont, have been ordered to prepare for duty in Philadelphia to protect government property.

After the dynamiting of a car, and the riot which followed, today the total number of men under arrest in connection with the strike is 52. Many of these are prisoners in hospitals suffering from serious wounds.

SCHWAB IS OBDRATE; STEEL MEN TO STAY OUT INDEFINITELY

(United Press Leased Wire.) South Bethlehem, Pa., March 7.—Following the refusal of President Charles M. Schwab to recognize their union, indications today are that the strike of the Bethlehem Steel Workers will continue indefinitely.

When Schwab received a communication containing the demands of the strikers and signed by the executive committee of the union he said he would refuse to recognize it, as it did not emanate from the men themselves.

He declared that no consideration whatsoever would be given the men not working at the plant.

In a letter to the public, in which he defines the company's position, he said, in part: "We infer that the communication signed by the 'executive committee' originated either with representatives of organized labor or men who left our employ during the past month. We desire to notify those men who have left our employ, as well as the general public, that we can give no consideration to the communication, since it does not emanate from the men working in our plant. It must be understood that under no circumstances will we deal with men on strike or a body of men representing organized labor."

UNEMPLOYED TO BE ORGANIZED TO KEEP DOWN STRIKEBREAKING

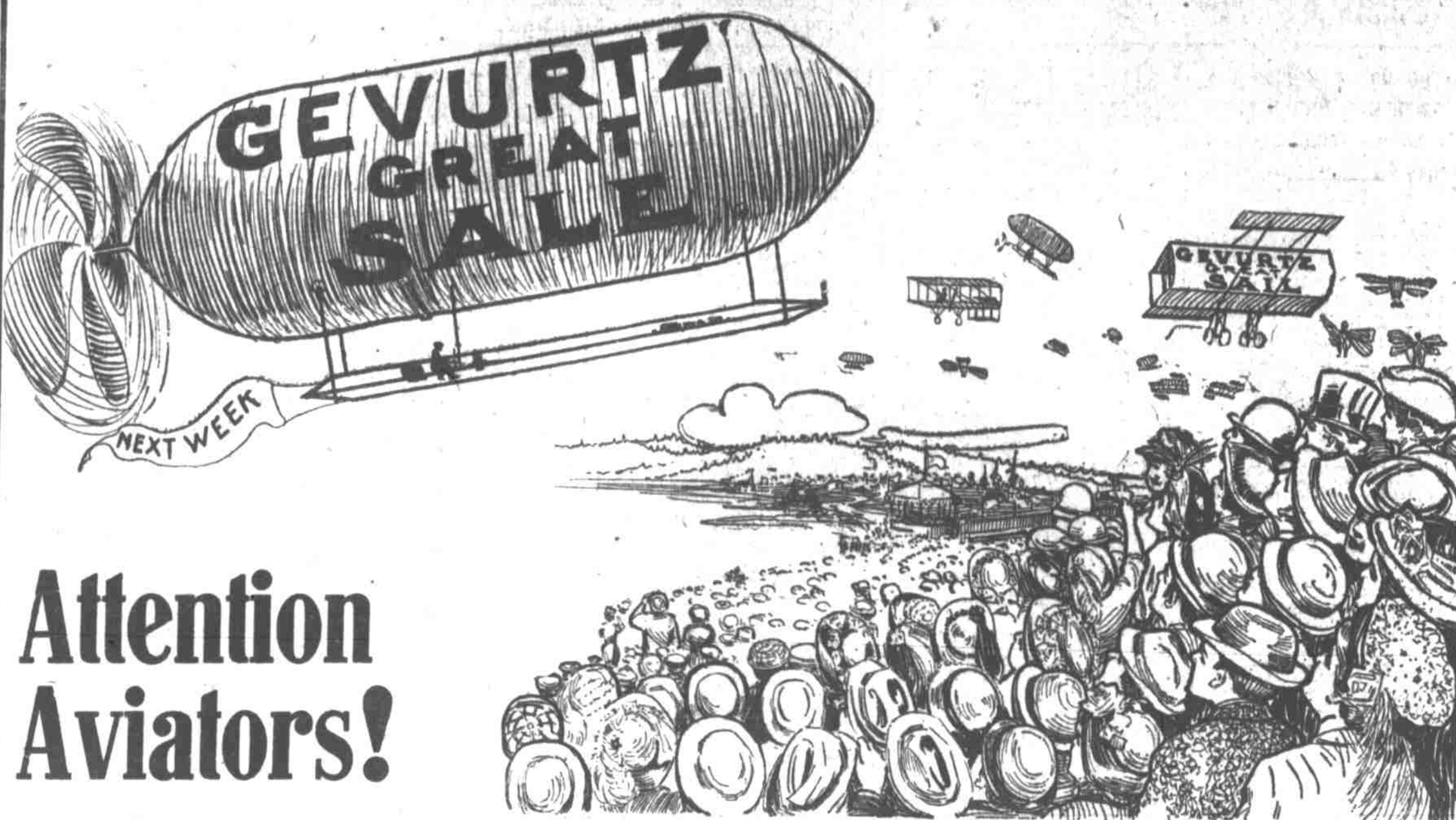
(United Press Leased Wire.) St. Louis, Mo., March 7.—James Eads How, "the millionaire tramp," who has formed a national organization of the unemployed, will leave for Philadelphia tomorrow to perfect an organization of the unemployed of that city and seek to prevent them from becoming strikebreakers. How will go to Philadelphia in response to a telegram from President George Ferguson of the national committee of the unemployed. Ferguson stated in his message that the danger to the success of the general strike in Philadelphia lies in the number of unemployed who apparently are willing to become strikebreakers. He said there were 25,000 men without employment in that city, exclusive of those who had complied with the strike order issued by the union labor leaders.

Goldman Meeting Broken Up.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Pittsburgh, Pa., March 7.—Emma Goldman, and a band of her followers, whose proposed meeting yesterday was broken up by the timely arrival of a squad of police, declare they will remain in Pittsburgh until they have "delivered their message to the people." The police were informed that Miss Goldman and Alexander Berkman, who recently served a term in the state prison for attempted murder, intended to hold an anarchist meeting in the interest of the Philadelphia strikers. It was also stated that the woman would arraign Pittsburgh millionaires. The crowd that had gathered in the great hall where the meeting was to be held dispersed suddenly when the police appeared.

HEALTH BOARD WILL ACT ON CREMATORY

A meeting of the city health board will probably be called some time this week to order the advertising for bids for the construction of the new garbage incinerator. The plans and specifications for the plant have been prepared by the city engineer and the superintendent of the crematory and have been approved by the board. A few minor changes are to be made and copies of the specifications prepared today when all will be in readiness for the special meeting.
