SUNNYSIDE WANTS AUTO MAIL SERVICE

A meeting of the Sunnyside Push club was held in the reception office of Dr. Joseph A. Pettit last night. It was one of the most interesting held by the club this year. The delegates to the water convention who represented the Sunnyside district made a report to the club which stated that the members of the sub-committee had several meetings and developed plans for the new amendment.

The committee concluded not to formulate any plan until the supreme court, which holds session today, renders a decision. The secretary of the club was instructed to ask the water company for a sub-paying station to be established in the Sunnyside district for the payment of water fees.

A movement was started for the securing of an auto mail service.

A resolution was adopted favoring this plan and to take the matter up with the various push clubs and send the congressmen a full report of the movement. A resolution endorsing Mayor Simon for his action towards the closing of the draw bridge during the rush hours and for mentioning the matter to the war department, was adopted. Councilman Copper spoke on the vacation of streets for the O. R. & N. Railroad. After his short talk the club adopted resolutions endorsing him.

The interest in the meetings at the Taylor Street Methodist church is increasing and last night surpassed highest expectations. Professor Stout opened the service by leading the congregation in several hymns and before the sermon he sang "Life's Railway to Heaven" and "The Singer," a song descriptive of the life and death of P. P. Bliss, the noted gospel singer. Professor Stout sang with the dramatic power of a grand opera singer and stirred his audiences deeply.

Dr. Clarence True Wilson, pastor of Centenary church, delivered a strong and helpful sermon on the "Personality of the Holy Spirit." After the sermon Professor Stout sang "Saved or Lost" and "The Mother Song," which swept the audience with a great wave of emotion. When asked if he might not run out of songs, Professor Stout smiled and replied that he had something like 2000 more in his collection.

The audience was not dissatisfied. Instead of pronouncing the benediction, the time was devoted to the singing of "Lil' Brack Sheep" by Professor Stout. This was the second time that he had been requested and it seems to be a great favorite. About 25 stood up for

prayers and several went forward for consecration. In all about 50 have come forward and expressed a desire to lead a better life. It is noticeable that a large number of professional, business and young men are attending the service.

ROBBERS FLEE WITH TWO PIGS

Others Break Into Saloons and One Man Has No Clothing When He Awakes.

Two saloon burglaries, two men robbed by their roommates, and two dressed pigs stolen, were part of last night's crime record.

Shortly after 1 o'clock, the Mug saloon, 43 North Third street, was entered by burglars. They took \$50 from slot machines and the cash register. Early this morning the saloon of Thomas Fallon, Third and Couch streets, was entered and about \$15 taken.

E. M. Dumbat, living at Hillsdale, butchered two large hogs yesterday afternoon. He left them hanging in a shed last night, and about midnight they were stolen. Each hog weighed about 175 pounds.

While Thomas Manning, a railroad laborer, was asleep in a rooming house, 75 Burnside street, some one entered and stole his clothes and \$5 in money. This morning the landlady loaned him a pair of overalls to go to the police station and make the report.

Henry Jacobson, who arrived yesterday on a lumber boat from the coast, reported this morning part of his clothes and \$10 were taken from his room in a north and lodging house.

A trunk belonging to Alf Ripon, vaudeville actor, was stolen yesterday from a baggage car in the terminal yards. The contents are valued at \$150.

ALASKA'S GOVERNOR WANTS HELPFUL LAWS

Seattle, March 10.—Governor Walter E. Clark of Alaska is in Seattle on his way to Washington, D. C., where he will appear before congressional committees to urge the needs of his territory. Chief among the recommendations he will make is that whatever appropriation is made for aids to navigation in Alaskan waters may be spread over as wide a stretch of territory as possible, rather than being tied up in the construction of one or two expensive lighthouses.

Collision in Yards at Seattle.

Seattle, Wash., March 10.—Express Messenger Fred Anderson of St. Paul is in the hospital severely injured as a result of the collision of Northern Pacific train No. 324, from Hoquiam, with the Northern Pacific express, empty, in the local yards at 10 o'clock last night. The accident was caused by the failure of the switching crew to place the red lights on the rear of the empty train. The engine of the Hoquiam train, which was running 15 miles an hour, was demolished. The engine crew jumped to the tide flats and were uninjured. Passengers were badly shaken up and cut by broken glass.
