A large number of people will find enjoyment today in walking over Eastmoreland and in exploring the banks of Crystal Springs lake. Until very recently this great property was privately owned, and since it was opened up a great many people are discovering that it holds some of Portland's prettiest landscape. Reed Institute will crown the hill above Crystal Springs lake, and there are many who will be glad of an opportunity to see the site of this gigantic institution. Automobiles may be run right to the heart of the property. Just there Milwaukee road must be followed to Tolman avenue. Streetcar passengers will find it most convenient to leave the Sellwood car at Tolman avenue. Reed Institute site is only four blocks east.

Eugene to Plant Roses.—A large delegation of Portland business men will participate in the exercises rose planting day at Eugene, Friday. It is the first rose planting day at the college town, and the citizens as well as college students are trying to make it a success. Manager George Hutchins, of the Portland Rose Festival, will be one of the speakers of the day, his topic being "The Rose." Invitations have been sent to all the state officials as well as the mayors of the valley nearby towns. If the weather permits a number of the governor's staff and the executive probably will make the trip by auto to Eugene from the capital. President Ralph Hoyt, of the Rose Festival, will attend the rose planting exercises and will extend an invitation to citizens of Eugene to be represented at the coming Rose Festival.

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START TEN STORY BUILDING JUNE 1

Structure Will Be at Southwest Corner of Sixth and Alder Streets.

June 1 has been named as the date for the beginning of the construction of the 10-story steel structure at the southwest corner of Sixth and Alder streets. Ben. Selling and co-owners of this property have commissioned Architects Doyle and Patterson to prepare plans and let the contract so that work may begin on the above date. The tenants occupying the present premises have all been given legal notice to vacate on or before June 1, so that no delay is anticipated in the beginning of another skyscraper for Portland. W. M. Kennard, of Kennard & Adams, is having plans drawn by a local architect for a concrete block residence which he proposes to build at East Twenty-third and Thompson streets. The design as outlined by Mr. Kennard calls for a \$15,000 expenditure, which will make it one of the most handsome homes in that section. The building will contain ten large rooms and will have a Spanish tiled roof. Oak and mahogany will be used in the finish of the lower floor and the upper story will be done in white enamel.

PRIMROSE, MINSTREL MAN, MAY LIVE HERE

George Primrose, the old time minstrel man, who has delighted minstrel loving audiences all over this country for the past 25 or 30 years, has written friends in Portland that he is going to improve his property known as Primrose Acres, on the Oregon Electric line. It is understood that the minstrel man has commissioned a local architect to get up the design of a typical California bungalow, of the large and roomy kind, which he will build this summer. Mr. Primrose's friends believe that he will hereafter make Portland his home. He is a moneyed man and it is altogether probable that he will build a handsome home and beautify it in the most luxurious manner.

BUILDING ACTIVITY THROUGHOUT CITY VERY NOTICEABLE

Permits for First Four Days of Last Week Amounted to Almost \$200,000; Mrs. M. E. Lee Biggest Builder.

Probably at no time in this city's history has building activity been greater, more widely spread or embraced a greater variety of construction than is to be seen now going on in every section of Portland. Office structures, business houses, apartment buildings, warehouses and residences of every class, representing all characters of construction and totalling millions of dollars, are being rushed to completion with a speed never before seen here.

All of the leading architects are crowded with plans for heavy construction, while those architects who make a specialty of designing have more work on hand than they can possibly turn out.

Permits Represent \$200,000.—Building permits issued for the first four days of last week amounted to nearly \$200,000 and of the 75 authorizations for the construction of new buildings 74 provided for new dwelling houses on the east side.

The largest permit issued during that period called for the erection by Mrs. M. E. Lee of a two story frame store and rooming house on the Macadam road, between Boundary and Sweeney streets, to cost \$5000.

Ralph B. Lloyd of the Pacific Pipe company, has begun the erection of a two story brick garage on Union avenue, between Wasco and Multnomah, to cost \$7500. The permit for its con-

struction was issued last Tuesday. Two \$6000 permits were taken out Thursday, one by the Columbia Building company for a two story frame dwelling on Woodworth avenue, between Glenn and Alameda, and the other provided for the same class of building to be erected by J. M. Berry on East Twenty-first between Brasse and Knott. Will Cost \$7000.

Monday last J. E. Pillman was authorized to begin the construction of two two story frame flats on East Sixteenth, between Salmon and Taylor. The cost of both buildings will approximate \$7000.

A. Freeman will erect the same class of building on McMillan street between Larabee and Crosby. The permit calls for an expenditure of about \$5000. Ground has been broken on Ladd avenue, between Palm and Central street, for a one story frame cottage which is being erected by T. H. Stomer at a cost of \$1500.

One of the most extensive building programs recently inaugurated by a Portland speculative builder is to be carried out by E. Laurson on property at East Eighty-sixth and East Gilman streets. Mr. Laurson has begun the erection of eight residences, each to be a one story frame cottage and the total expenditure will be between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

More New Buildings.—E. W. Reeder took out a permit Wednesday for seven two story frame residences to be erected in the vicinity of East Thirty-ninth and Clinton streets. These buildings will cost \$2000 each, the total sum being invested by Mr. Reeder being \$14,000.

Permits were issued on the same date to the Provident and Investment Trust company for two dwellings, one to be erected at East Fifth and Brasse streets at a cost of \$1600 and the other on the Alameda between East Forty-eighth and East Forty-ninth at a cost of \$2000.

On East Morrison between East Thirtieth and East Thirty-ninth J. W. Dwyer will build two two story frame cottages each to cost \$2000. Permits for these buildings were issued last Thursday.

A. B. Scott will build two frame cottages which he will build on East Forty-first and Lyon streets. The buildings will cost \$1500 each.

The Portland Realty and Construction

company has begun the erection of three one and one-half story frame cottages on the east side. The buildings will cost \$2500 each. One will be erected on Capitol avenue, between Shaver and Mason streets, and the others on Longgreen between Falling and Shaver.

Harmony lodge, No. 106, I. O. O. F., has taken out a permit for a two story frame hall and store building to be erected on Williams avenue, between Skidmore and Mason streets, at a cost of \$5000.

M. M. Habbler has begun the erection of two cottages on East Thirtieth, between Lincoln and Grant, each to cost \$1500.

The Portland Building and Investment company took out three permits Thursday last providing for the erection of three one and one-half story frame cottages each to cost \$2500. Two of them will be on Long View between Falling and Overlook and the other will be on Vernon between Alberta and Brainerd.

Frame Cottages.—On the same date, W. B. O'Dale and R. G. Constable each took out a permit for the erection of the same class of house. The O'Dale house will be erected at the corner of Alberta and Summer streets and the other on Long View between Mason and Shaver.

The Columbia Building company has taken out permits for the erection of two one story cottages, one to be built on Russell street near Pippin and the other on Stafford near Pippin. These houses will cost \$2500 each.

J. B. Decker has broken ground on Mallory avenue between Summit and Emerson for a \$3000 two story frame residence. The permit was issued Thursday.

Charles H. Day has taken out a permit for a one and one-half story frame cottage to be erected on Schuyler between East Thirtieth and East Thirtieth-sixth at a cost of \$2250.

Begins to Build.—On East Fifty-second near Broadway, M. E. Berry has begun the erection of a one and one-half story cottage. The permit which called for an expenditure of \$2000 was issued Thursday.

Harry L. Hambel took out a permit last week for the erection of a one story frame cottage at the corner of Winchell street and Montana avenue to cost \$1500.

On East Thirty-third, between Marri-

son and Alder, C. A. Hoy has begun the erection of a two story frame dwelling to cost \$2000.

Permits were taken out Wednesday last by G. Goodsell providing for two one and one-half story frame cottages to be built on Clinton street in the vicinity of East Thirtieth-second. The buildings will cost \$2000 each.

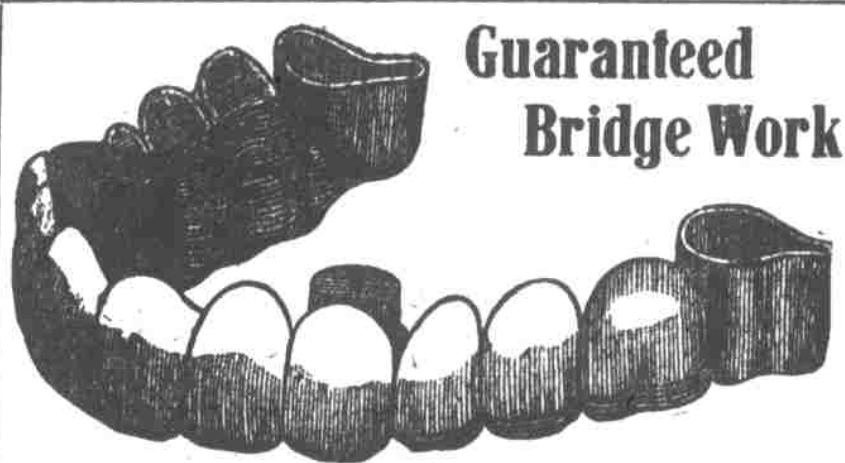

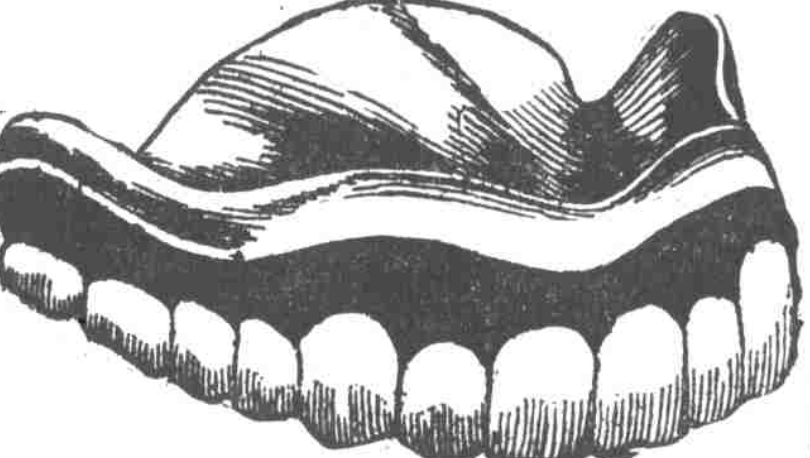
