

BIG STORE HAS SPRING OPENING

Windows, Decorated in Apple Blossoms, Greet Crowds at Tull & Gibbs.

As though by special arrangement with the weather man, the spring opening of Tull & Gibbs store Tuesday fell on one of the first real spring days of the season when the thought of the feminine world instinctively turned from the more somber garments of winter to those of brighter and daintier creations for summer wear.

As if to give promise of what was to come, the windows were decorated in apple blossoms with a paneled background of cream and pink for a display of the most gorgeous gowns in the establishment. Tuesday marked the opening of a new department—velvet, neckwear and belts. A series of debutante gowns in satin, net, marquisette and chailles in dainty colors was displayed to advantage. An attractive assortment was shown in white and all new shades showing imported models, especially the kind which are brought into this country in robe patterns and are put together in New York. Foulard dresses were much in vogue and fetching three piece suits in the new seersucker silks, as well as suits in tussah, shantung and real imported pongee were features of the display.

An interesting departure in seen in the new riding coats, which are made of very sheer materials, such as crepe, crepe melle, marquisette and many other materials, to be worn over dainty dresses for afternoon and evening wear even to the plainest lingerie. To be made more attractive, patent leather belts are worn with them and, in fact, belts appear on everything. Tailor made dresses in plain styles and of fancy mixed fabrics such as English and French cloth, well as Irish homespun and the celebrated Donaghi tweeds.

New coats of almost every description in the assortment, as well as hats, negligees, pajamas and kimono, plain and fancy. In the coat department were the new lingerie combination garments, shown in plain, but dainty effects. Long sleeves, short sleeves, high necks and low necks, draped effects, overdirt effects and, above all, normal waist lines were to be seen at the opening and the striking feature of it all was the simple but beautiful effects which are the prevailing characteristics of the Tull & Gibbs store.

Lawyers and Supreme Court to Meet at Festive Board

The Multnomah County Bar association will play host on Thursday evening to the supreme court of the state and to Judge George H. Williams, the dean of the Oregon bar. On that occasion the members of the Bar association, their guests of honor and a large number of out of town attorneys will gather at the Commercial club, where a banquet will be given. Ex-County Judge L. R. Webster will serve as toastmaster.

The banquet will be notable for two reasons—one that it will be the first time in the history of the state that the members of the bar have formally entertained the members of the supreme court of the state; the other reason will be that Judge Williams will be in attendance and will speak.

During the past winter the advanced age of Judge Williams has prevented his attendance at several large functions where his presence has been especially desired. With the coming good weather, and the improvement in the health of Judge Williams, it is believed certain that he will be able to attend the banquet of Thursday night. He has given assurance that he will be present if his health permits. Judge Williams will speak to the toast, "The Nestor of the Oregon Bar."

The banquet had been planned for Tuesday next, but owing to the inability of members of the supreme court to be present on that date, it was changed and set for Thursday night. This is the first time that the Oregon bar has entertained the members of the supreme court, but it is the intention to hold such a banquet once a year in the future.

Among the other toasts will be: "The Supreme Court," by one of the justices of that tribunal; "The Federal Court," by Judge R. S. Bean; "The Nestor of the Oregon Bar," by Judge W. N. Gaten;

BALLINGER'S SILETZ POLICY EXPLAINED

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)
Washington, March 12.—The disappointment of those who hoped Ballinger would endorse Senator Chamberlain's bill for the relief of the Siletz settlers is explained, it is thought, in part by the apparently unwise activity by A. W. Lafferty, a Portland attorney. Lafferty telegraphed the president to "direct" Ballinger in the premises. Ballinger promptly transmitted a report to the senate public lands committee that placed him on record as against the enactment of the bill. No disposition to criticize Ballinger for his ruling is manifested here.

The public lands committee, to which the Chamberlain land bill had been referred, had asked Ballinger to submit a report thereon, and some delay in reporting had occurred. Committee Chairman Nelson had asked him several times to hasten the report, but until the Lafferty telegram came action had not been taken. On the same day on which this telegram reached Washington, however, Ballinger sent in his report, which was adverse to the bill.

It is not said by anyone that the Ballinger report was actuated by any undue motive, but was dictated by what he thought proper in the premises.

Watson; Wasco county, Grant Mays; Yamhill county, Dr. G. S. Wright.

The bylaws of the association are being printed by the Western Motor, an auto paper of Seattle. They will be distributed among the members. The membership has grown wonderfully since the birth of the club a few months ago. The program for the summer months has not yet been prepared. Races are to be one of the features of the club's entertainment.

SOME CHANGES OF OFFICERS IN ARMY

Washington, March 12.—Army orders: Major Patrick H. McAndrews, medical

corps, is relieved from duty at Fort McKenzie, Wyo., effective upon his relief from treatment at Fort Omaha, and will proceed then to Fort Tetter, N. Y., for duty.
The resignation of Captain J. H. Pools, Corps of Engineers, as an army officer, has been accepted.
First Lieutenant James E. Abbott, Signal Corps (cavalry) will report to the commanding general of the Department of California for assignment to duty.
First Lieutenant Walter O. Howell, medical reserve, will proceed to the President of San Francisco for duty.

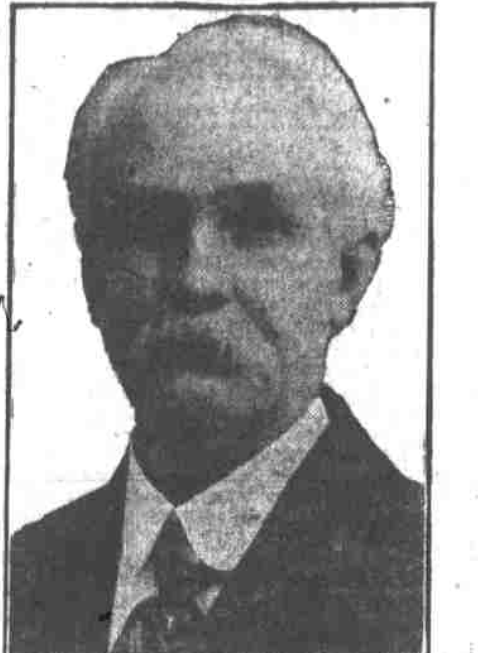
