





WEATHER REPORT

The two western disturbances have united and formed a single disturbance of decided character which is central morning over Nebraska. A large presure area overlies the north this Pacific states, and another large high pressure area overlies the Atlantic states, being central in the south. Rain has fallen in northern Texas, Oklahoma, Nebraska and the Dakotas, and snow has occurred in northern Arizona, Colorado and Wyoming. Fair weather pre-valls in the Mississippi valley and thence eastward to the Atlantic coast, and no rain has fallen on the Pacific slope except a small amount at San Diego.
