WRATHFUL WOMEN
STOP SURVEYORS
WITH REVOLVERS

Attempts to Locate Route for State Highway in Washington Resisted by Farmers—Pitched Battle May Result.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Dayton, Wash., March 20.—When state engineers employed in surveying for a state highway leading from Dayton, at the windward yesterday to pass through the Windward ranch, three miles west of here, they confronted an arsenal manned by two women, Mrs. Lewis Windward and Mrs. Pete Swanson, who, armed with revolvers, declared they would shoot the first man who crossed the fence. The engineers were turned back. Chief Engineer D. L. Sallan obtained yesterday a restraining injunction, and he declares his men will not be turned back again, even at the points of guns. A pitched battle may occur, for the farmers are determined to resist the advance of the engineers, whom they have branded as trespassers. Charles Gilbreath threatened yesterday to shoot if the men came upon his land.

The floor above the furnace could be reduced sufficiently to allow the driver to get up to the trap doors over the burners.

And yesterday was a sunny one, not hot, but a trifle warm. The reporter found himself wondering how any human being could survive the awful smell when the weather gets really hot. He didn't have to be told of the reasons why residents of the Guild's lake district have threatened to enjoin the dumping of any more garbage, either. Nor would anyone else with the hardihood to go within a half dozen blocks of the pile require any explanation.

Waples Appeals for Help.
"I think any taxpayer who will come out here and inspect this crematory and the dump will agree with me that the situation is rapidly approaching a stage where it can no longer be controlled," said Superintendent Waples. "I earnestly appeal for help, believing, as I do, that the health of the municipality is being gravely endangered and that every day of delay in securing a new incinerator means that many more human lives lost in case of an epidemic which may burst upon the city before it can be built."

Bids for the construction of the new incinerator, for which taxpayers of the city voted a bond issue of \$150,000 last year, will be opened by the health board April 6. Mayor Sibley and the members of the board will lose no time in tabulating the bids and awarding a contract if they are not hampered further by some now unforeseen circumstances.

No bonds will be sold for crematory construction purposes, as the mayor and the city council decided that \$100,000 with which to build the burner could be spared from the general fund.

Logger's Head Crushed.

Everett, Wash., March 20.—Sam Johnson, a logger at the Merrill and Ring camp, south of the city, was killed when his head was caught between a log he was sawing, and a tree. The accident was not discovered until the man was missed at supper and the foreman made a search.

A wagon driven by Christ Papas was struck at Pacific crossing by an east-bound Great Northern train. His injuries may prove fatal. The train was hidden by a string of box cars.

35 CRATERS ON
MOUNT ETNA ARE
NOW IN ERUPTION

500,000 People Are Affected
Through Loss of Crops,
and Thousands of Peasants
Are Terror Stricken.

(United Press Local Wire.)
Catania, March 20.—A violent eruption of Mount Etna throughout the night filled Catania streets with ashes and cinders to the depth of six inches. The volcano, 36 miles away, is spewing volcanic dust over a great area to the southward, is ruining vineyards and orchards and is showing every indication of an approaching crisis.

A huge stream of molten lava is moving slowly toward this city and the people are becoming hysterical with fright. Frequent earth tremors add to the alarm of the populace and the increasing detonations from the mountain are causing widespread fear.

New Craters Appear.
Fresh craters appeared in the night and today. Professor Ricco estimates that 35 craters, old and new, are now active.

The prefect and other civil authorities are doing everything in their power to allay alarm. They have assured the people through proclamations that the lava cannot despoil Catania, owing to the conformation of the land between here and the mountain.

The assurances of the authorities that the lava stream will probably be diverted have calmed the more intelligent of the people, but thousands of peasants pass through the ash-strewn streets praying to the Virgin to save them from death.

Vegetation Killed.
The heavy coat of ashes has choked all vegetation for miles and the country has taken on a desolate appearance. The impalpable dust from the craters fills the air to such an extent that breathing is unpleasant. During the day the sun's rays caused the floating particles to become illuminated with beautiful colors, while at night the fires of the volcano present an awe-inspiring but terrifying sight.

An indication of the increasing violence of the eruption was the issuance of orders today withdrawing troops from their stations nearest the mountain. The former danger zone is deserted by every living creature.

Divert Lava Stream.
Government engineers are digging ditches and building dams to stop the main lava stream, which has an average depth of 12 feet and a varying breadth of 500 to 1000 feet.

The greatest damage that has been wrought so far is not from lava, but from the showers of lapilli that are falling over an area of many miles. Nearly the whole country between Catania and the mountain is covered with lapilli. This has killed vineyards and orchards and reduced to poverty hundreds of farmers.

A population of about 500,000 is affected by the eruption, which now promises to be the greatest of modern times.

A freakish feature of the eruption is the sparring of the pretty village of Nicolosi on the southern slope. The town is shut in by foothills, which diverted the lava, and mountain air currents carried the showers of ashes over the village. Nicolosi, however, is abandoned temporarily by its inhabitants.

CARS MUST STOP
WHERE PROMISED

Salem, Or., March 20.—Judge William Galloway on the circuit bench for this country has rendered a decision in which he holds that the right of way contracts made with farmers in Marion county by the Oregon Electric Railway company, by which the company promised to stop cars on farms through which the line passes, as part of the consideration, are valid and must be performed. Proceedings were brought by Frank Ford, who granted the Oregon Electric right of way for the consideration of \$500 and a promise to stop cars on his ranch.

The railway company sought to avoid the agreement on the ground of public policy, holding that it could not stop its cars on every farm between Salem and Portland and do justice to the traveling public.

The company was defended in trial by Carey and Kerr, Harrison Allen and McNary and McNary of this city. Ford's attorneys were Kaiser and Pogue of Salem.

The case is an important one because it is asserted many other similar agreements were entered into by the Oregon Electric in order to get right of way as reasonable as possible, and the case will be carried to the highest tribunal for final determination.

WIFE SAYS MASON
WAS HARD HEARTED

After suffering for several months from abuse heaped upon her by a husband who she alleges was most inhuman, Mrs. Dorothy Mason this morning filed suit in the circuit court for divorce from William Mason, a stone mason. The Masons lived at 1121 Concord street.

Mrs. Mason alleges that her husband on several occasions mistreated her in a manner most inhuman, and that she finally could not stand it any longer. She claims that he became addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors after their marriage and that after becoming so strongly possessed of a thirst that would not down, he gradually dropped from a good laborer capable of earning \$5 a day to one most indolent. Mrs. Mason asks for the custody of their six months old baby. The couple married December 31, 1906, at Vernon, B. C.

WANTS \$30,000 FOR
LOSS OF HIS LEG

Thirty thousand dollars is the value which George E. Moulton places on the loss of his right leg. Moulton was an employee of the St. Johns Lumber company at the time he lost his leg and blames the company for the accident.

Moulton was doing carpenter work at the time the accident occurred, September 27, 1909. He was forced in order to get some lumber which he needed to climb up over a shed which was built against the storage room. The shed col-

lapsed with him, mashing his right leg so badly that it had to be amputated below the knee.

It is claimed in Moulton's complaint that the company had that day removed supports which previously held up the shed and that the management knew of the danger which confronted

any one climbing on it. He claims that despite this knowledge he was compelled to climb up after the lumber.

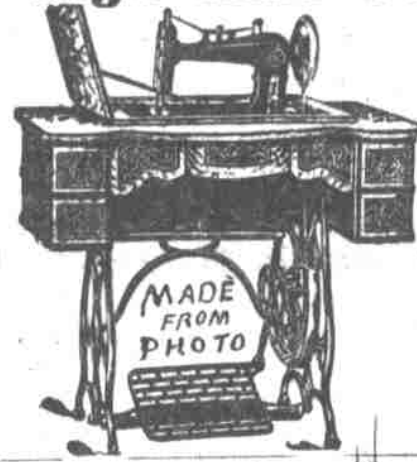
