MADRIZ' STATUS

MAY BE SETTLED

Operations of Filibuster Gordon Force Question Upon State Department.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

New Orleans, La., March 31.—The attempt of General Gordon, former commander of artillery for Provisional President Estrada of Nicaragua, to outfit an expedition for the aid of the provisional government will end in the state department's taking a definite stand in the Nicaraguan case, it is believed here.

The federal authorities here were asked to stop the expedition. Gordon declared that the state department did not recognize the Madriz government in Nicaragua and that he was, therefore, not planning an expedition against a friendly power and was not violating the neutrality laws.

The Madriz agents who brought the case before the federal authorities argued that the Madriz government in Nicaragua was the regular government and that all treaties and understandings between the United States and Nicaragua in effect before the Estrada revolution were still in effect, in spite of the action of Secretary Knox, who returned the passports of the Nicaraguan representatives at Washington the time it was reported two Americans had been executed at the order of former president Zelaya.

Passed Up to State Department.

The federal authorities here concluded the problem was too knotty for them and decided to send the whole matter to the state department for settlement. They declare that the state department will have to decide officially whether the Madriz government is the government of Nicaragua or Estrada is the president of the little republic.

The situation in Nicaragua has been a source of considerable annoyance to the federal authorities here ever since Knox wrote a note to the former representative of the Nicaraguan republic declaring he held each faction in the republic responsible for its actions. Since then, Zelaya has fled from his country and Dr. Madriz has been chosen by the Nicaraguan congress to succeed him.

Estrada claimed that the eastern half of the republic was without representation in congress and that the election was illegal. His faction contends that the Madriz faction is not one of those referred to in the Knox note, and that therefore, the Estrada government is now the only government recognized by the United States.

Both Sides Have Sought Ruling.

Both sides have made efforts before to get a ruling from the state department but the secretary has so far never made any indication of the position of the United States in the matter and since the first withdrawal of gunboats from Greytown and Bluefields the matter has been left without official settlement.

Federal authorities here have had dealings with the representatives of both governments. Every ship that has sailed for Nicaragua has caused a dispute. The representatives of one faction have refused to sign manifests for cargoes and each ship has sailed under protest from the government of either Estrada or Madriz.

The authorities here are glad of the opportunity to get a definite ruling from Washington as to the standing of the governments.

LABORER ROBBED AND THROWN INTO WATER

Seattle, Wash., March 31.—Thugs seized Steve McKinnon, a laborer, from behind, shortly after midnight along the waterfront, robbed him of \$150 and unceremoniously dumped him into the sound. He was almost exhausted when rescuers threw him a rope. He was pulled into a small boat and brought to the wharf unconscious.

Uprising in West Africa Spreads.

Liverpool, March 31.—Numbers of Germans have been assassinated and minor clashes between unorganized natives of the hinterland and troops stationed on the Ivory coast are reported in dispatches from Africa. The native uprising in Liberia is spreading and the messages indicate that it has extended to the Ivory coast. Scattered detachments of the 600 soldiers stationed on the Ivory coast are opposing unorganized bands of thousands of natives, and further fighting is reported.

BREWER FUNERAL WITHOUT POMP

Body of Late Supreme Judge Taken to Leavenworth, Kan., for Burial.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Washington, March 31.—In accordance with his wishes, the funeral ceremonies over the remains of David J. Brewer, associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, were simple. Although it was attended by the most prominent men in the nation there was no pomp nor ceremony.

Justice of the supreme court acted as honorary pall bearer. President Taft and the members of the senate and house committees on judiciary attended. Short services were held at the Brewster home. Late today the body will be taken to the station, where it will be placed in a special car and taken to Leavenworth, Kan., the former home of the jurist, for burial. It is expected that the funeral party will arrive at Leavenworth Saturday.

PRINT BILL TOO HIGH; HOWLETT FILES APPEAL

The city civil service commission yesterday afternoon refused to pay a claim of \$3.75 for printing done by the Ivy Press, one of the contracting firms of printers in the city. Mayor Simon, Commissioner Brewster, Armstrong and Willis and Secretary Kennedy were outspoken in their remarks about the cost of printing done by the city. The mayor expressed the belief that there is a combination of local printers to maintain excessive prices.

On motion of Commissioner Brewster the commission instructed the secretary to make an investigation to ascertain whether the printing bills being presented to the various municipal departments are exorbitant.

Attorney J. H. Stevenson filed the appeal of F. A. Howlett from the action of the city executive board, which ordered Howlett's dismissal from the fire department. The discharge of Howlett was recommended by Chief Campbell "for the good of the service." The appeal will not be considered, as it does

not charge bad faith or that the dismissal was for religious or political reasons.

AVIATION MEET TO BE HELD AT YAKIMA

North Yakima, Wash., March 31.—North Yakima will have an aviation meet this spring in spite of the fact that the Business Men's association refused to give the guarantee of \$2000 asked by Hamilton for the exhibit. A meeting of public spirited business men was held this morning, and within a few minutes the 10 who were present had raised the guarantee by subscription. The meet will now be held in this city about the middle of April, and will be the last aviation exhibition to be given in the northwest this season, as Hamilton will go directly east from here.

Woman Gets Her Jewels Back.

Chicago, March 31.—It was learned today that Mrs. John W. Jenkins, formerly of Chicago, who was robbed of \$127,000 worth of jewels at her apartment in the Hotel Lorraine, in New York, has recovered practically every one of the gems. It is understood that she paid \$4000 to a man to learn where the jewels had been sold. All the articles were recovered in Chicago with the exception of one piece, which was composed of several jewels and valued at \$10,000. Negotiations for the return of the gems were conducted by a firm of Chicago lawyers, who, it is said, received \$5000 for their services.

John R. Clark Drowned.

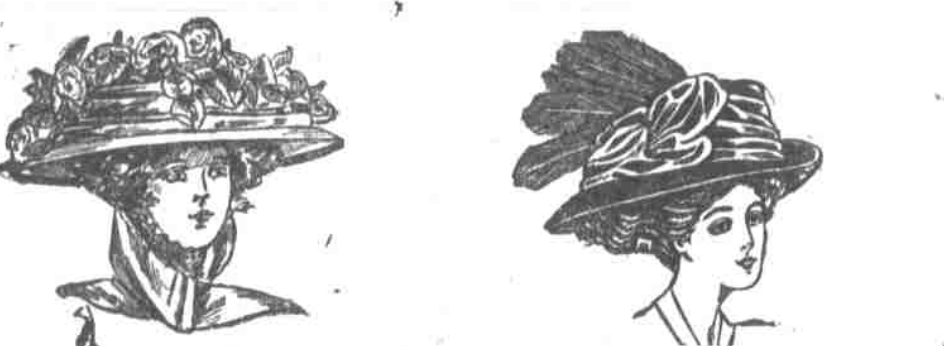
