ANSWER IS FILED
IN BRIDGE CASE

Defendants in Injunction Proceedings Brought by Frank Kiernan Would Stop.

City Attorney Kavanaugh, Deputy W. C. Newberry, C. W. Fulton, Martin L. Pipes and H. H. Riddell have filed the answer of the city and other defendants to the Broadway bridge delay case of Frank Kiernan, in which Kiernan is trying to enjoin the city from erecting the bridge.

The answer makes the point that Kiernan voted at the election when the bonds were authorized and later permitted the city to go ahead at large expense in preparing for the bridge without making any attempt to contest the election or offering objection until his suit was filed. For this reason, it is asserted, he should be estopped from complaining now about the manner in which the election proceedings were conducted or the way the ballots were prepared and the result declared.

The city attorney defends the proceedings in connection with the bond issue and says that notice was given to all the voters by publication in the newspapers and the official pamphlet of the city. It is denied the voters were deceived by any irregularities in the proceedings, as alleged by Kiernan's attorney, and issue is squarely joined on the questions raised in the complaint, except as to formal allegations regarding ordinances and laws of the state, which are admitted.

TUTTLE LANDS SWIFT
ONE HANLEY'S NOSE

An expensive party gown belonging to the wife of Dr. J. H. Tuttle, with offices in the Columbia Trust building, was the cause of a flat-tire street fight last night between Tuttle and T. E. Hanley, 431 1/2 Washington street. The latter claims he was severely pummeled. Hanley is charged by the dentist's wife with spilling the gown when he cleaned it. The bill for the cleaning was paid, however, but bitter feeling existed between the two men over the settlement of the same. The two men met at 7:30 o'clock at Twentieth and Washington streets.

Dr. Tuttle says he resented a remark made by Hanley, who struck at him. At this the dentist landed a blow on the man's nose, and he fell to the sidewalk. In his fall, Hanley twisted his leg in such a manner as to break it. He was taken to the hospital.

FIRE STARTS WHILE
BREAKFAST COOKING

While breakfast was being prepared this morning in the home of Dr. H. C. Wilson, Nineteenth and Everett streets, the stove became overheated, starting a fire which damaged property valued at \$200. The gas range was lighted by the maid, who went into another room. When she returned the kitchen was in a blaze. Woodwork near the range first ignited. The flames spread to other parts of the room.

The house of A. D. McKee, 1254 Boottwich street, was destroyed by fire. The family had moved from the home in the afternoon and all the contents had been taken out. The cause of the blaze is not known. There is insurance on the house.

SUPERVISOR BEACH
GROWS CHEERFUL

Census Director in Second Oregon District Begins to See Light.

Business men of the east side have come to the front and are now discussing a plan which will provide that all the answers to all of the questions will be written out and ready for the census man when he reaches the homes of the progressive citizens of the east side. The subject has been taken up by Walter St. Evans and other members of the East Side Business Men's club, and special efforts will be made to secure a complete enumeration of the east side. Although every day brings in resignations from the list of enumerators, recently appointed, the vacancies are being filled as fast as made and when the enumeration is settled, Senator Beach will have a full list of men on hand to do the work. The many resignations are due to the fact that the census office and are given for various reasons. Some of the men report that they have secured permanent positions and others that they were of the opinion that they were to receive more money. Senator Beach is drawing on his reserve list, however, and will have a full quota of men when he starts his little army out on April 15.

OPEN BIDS FOR HILL
SPAN OVER COLUMBIA?

Bids for the construction of the Oregon Trunk line bridge over the Columbia river are supposed to have been opened in Chicago yesterday, and it is expected that the contract will be awarded in a few days. President John F. Stevens has not yet returned from Chicago.

The bridge will be built near Celilo, across a stretch where the water is very shallow except for a narrow channel, and where the bottom is in most places solid rock. This will give very little trouble in setting foundation for the piers.

The bridge will give the Oregon Trunk line direct service on the tracks of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle into Portland.

BOXING IS LEGAL
BUT POLICE MUST
WATCH CLOSELY

March Grand Jury Makes Favorable Report on the Fight Game—Noisy Joy Riders Escape From Indictment.

Boxing matches as conducted in the Exposition building recently are given the O. K. of the March grand jury in its final report, delivered to Presiding Judge Morrow in the circuit court at noon today. The grand jury finds they are not in violation of law, but suggest that the police keep their eyes open. The report on this subject says:

"The grand jury investigated the so-called prize fights held in the Exposition building and from all information obtained we find them in compliance with the law, under Stat. vs. Purcell, 43 Or. Rep., page 742. The grand jury recommends that the police department keep close watch on said boxing matches and see that the law is not violated."

John Kieby, John Brown, F. H. Leach, Frank Simpson, Pearl Simpson and John Gowerick, the group of hit-and-run joy riders arrested on a charge of disturbing the public peace and safety by shouting and discharging firearms in the quiet precincts of Rockwood, were not indicted, but the grand jury points out a way to reach them in the justice court, as follows:

"In regard to the case of Jack Kieby and others, the grand jury recommends that they be prosecuted in the justice court. The grand jury returned not a true bill, as a conviction could not be given under the evidence produced, but they could be convicted in the justice court for operating an automobile in excess of the speed limit on the Base Line road and through the unincorporated village of Rockwood."

The grand jury returned eight true bills and three not true as a result of its deliberations the last few days. Its report calls attention to the law requiring the outward opening of doors on public buildings and halls, and says Chief of Police Cox has been instructed to advise the police to look into the matter and report on violations. Particular attention is invited to the Willbur rooming house, 245 East Oak street, where, the grand jury says, the fire escape leads into a firetrap.

Max Uedlick was indicted on the charge of passing a bad check for \$400 on the Oregon hotel, Charles Payne for shooting T. O. Puckett on January 20 in a quarrel. Mrs. Puckett, Murray A. Penock for stealing \$123 from Victor Pierson, Peter Bartholomew for stealing clothing valued at \$42.50 from Thomas Kieby, Porter Loomis for contributing to the delinquency of a 15 year old boy, and George Jackson, A. A. Dixon for passing a bad check for \$15, and Joseph Johnson, alias John Moore, for passing a fraudulent check for \$20 on Charles N. Lake.

Not true bills were returned in the cases of H. S. Reynolds, accused of obtaining \$49 from E. Wheeler on a bad check, and of Mary Brown and Larry Talbot, jointly charged with stealing \$100 from Thomas Martin.

SITE LEASED FOR
OFFICE BUILDING

New Structure Will Rise at Southwest Corner of Park and Washington Streets.

Negotiations were concluded yesterday by Platt & Platt, under the name of the Fidelity Trust company, for a 20-year lease of the Leo Friede property at the southwest corner of Park and Washington streets. Under the terms of the lease the lessee are required to put up a building on the property, which shall cost not less than \$50,000, which upon the expiration of the leasehold will revert to the owner of the ground.

Harrison G. Fiske, one of the owners of the lease, said this morning that while no definite plans for the improvement of the corner had been agreed upon, it is probable that construction will begin on a modern office building soon after July 1, 1911, which will cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

The lease was made upon a basis of a \$250,000 valuation of the lot, the average rental being \$1250 a month for the entire term. For the first five years of the life of the lease, the rent will be \$1000 a month and will increase in five-year periods until it reaches \$1500 per month.

This property is now occupied by the Royal Bakery and C. L. Eckhardt, whose leases expire July 1, next year.

Mr. Friede purchased this lot in 1893 for \$15,000, and for a number of years after acquiring it received a monthly rental of but \$100 for the entire building covering it.

TEMPERANCE SPEAKER
TO VISIT PORTLAND

Mrs. Lulu Shepard of Salt Lake City, state president of the Utah W. C. T. U., will be in Portland in the vicinity of 7 to 12 inclusive. Mrs. Shepard comes from Montana where she has been for a six weeks' lecture trip. She has proved her ability as a convincing speaker by adding to the Montana W. C. T. U. ranks 55 members, arousing great enthusiasm in the work. Mrs. Shepard is not only a leader in the great body of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, but takes her place among the noted club women of the west. At the second district federation of club women she gave the chief address.

Mrs. Shepard will speak in Oregon City, Sunday morning, April 10, at 10:30 o'clock; at St. Johns at 3:30 p. m., and at University Park at 8 o'clock.

Despondency Makes Girl Suicide.

PARE QUORUM OF
COMMITTEEMEN
PLAN CONVENTION

Forty Members of Republican County Central Committee Out of Possible 116 Prepare for July Meeting.

Forty men by liberal count, out of a possible 116 met last night at the Commercial club as the Republican county central committee and mapped out what the republican voters of the county would have to do during the coming campaign. According to the law governing the county central committee, one third of the members of the committee constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Therefore the action of the meeting last night was legal since there was one more member present than was necessary to make the quorum.

Of course the two thirds who were absent will have no say as to what is to be done, and will have to fall in line before the whip of the "leaders."

The old lines present at the meeting last night used a very clever ruse to put the fleece of the lamb on the back of the wolf. It was determined by the meeting that there should be a county convention in Multnomah county July 15, and that the delegates to this convention should be elected at precinct meetings called under the auspices of the county central committee. It was also provided that the members of the county central committee should not be ex-officio delegates to the county convention.

The committee of 13 which had been appointed to fix up a plan for running the convention through, decided at its first meeting, that the members of the county central committee should be, by that token, delegates to the convention. This caused such a protest that the committee altered its report as shown by the report last night.

In spite of the face of the report, which would seem to exclude members of the county central committee from the convention, it is still possible for the precincts to elect committeemen as delegates if they so desire. Since the committeemen have the direct charge of the precinct meetings it is reasonably safe to assume that there will be some few of the committeemen, particularly the leaders, on the convention floor when that organization is called to order.

Jimmy Ketchum threatened to disrupt the program during the discussion of the committee report by moving that it be so amended that the delegates to the state convention would also be elected by the people direct and not by the county convention. His motion was seconded by F. E. Beach, but as the makers of the program gave it the laugh, Ketchum discovered that he was in the wrong and withdrew the motion, saying that he had no desire to oppose the will of the people.

According to the report adopted there will be 225 delegates to the county convention. The same committee which framed the program for the convention was selected to continue in office and take charge of selecting the place for the precinct meetings, and may be consulted as to the most available delegates.

The central committee adopted resolutions in honor of the late Professor J. T. Gregg, who during his life was well known in Oregon politics.

emergency hospital. The horse ambulance is always accompanied by an attendant. The hospital is in the center of the congested district. Much good work is done.

San Francisco has ten emergency ambulances and a full corps of hospital attendants in five stations, including the central emergency station, which makes it possible for the sick and injured to a place where they can be well cared for in from five to eight minutes. The cost is slight and is never complained of.

Denver, well equipped.

Denver has an excellent emergency hospital service. It is under permanent supervision. The hospital is maintained in connection with the city jail. First aid to the injured is never long in coming.

Kansas City, Mo., and Kansas City, Kan., each maintain a city hospital in addition to emergency service given by the police department.

Cincinnati has a half dozen emergency hospitals with a large city hospital in the center of the congested district. Other eastern cities, such as Philadelphia, Boston, New York, have emergency service conducted with a view to saving life.

None of these cities depends upon a county hospital for emergency work, since in every instance, as in Portland, the county hospital is located at a place too remote to be of practical value.

A place for Portland's emergency hospital has been promised by the county commissioners in the new court house, in connection with the city jail. An ambulance has been offered by Edward Holman. The employment of an attendant for the ambulance, a man able to stop bleeding, restore consciousness, or relieve pain, has yet to be authorized. There must also be a nurse in attendance. But the hospital need not be large nor costly. It is pointed out. A few cots and some provision for medicine must be provided. The appropriation must be made by the city council.

At the present time it is possible for a man to bleed to death on Portland streets without the possibility of help. John Higgins, a veteran, bled to death, because, under the present system, it required two hours' employment of minutes to give him medical assistance.

Excitement Over Taku Placers.

Tacoma, Wash., April 8.—According to advice received here today from Juneau, the excitement over the rich placer discoveries in the upper reaches of the Taku river continues. Canadian Customs Agent Gushy has just returned
