VALUATION URGED
OF PROPERTY IN
BRIDGE MATTERMayor Simon Besieged With
Requests That True Value of
Railroad's Offered Conces-
sions Be Made.

Many taxpayers are expressing the opinion that the O. R. & N. and Northern Pacific Terminal companies are asking much more than they wish to give in the matter of the Broadway bridge approach concessions. Mayor Simon said this morning that he was receiving demands from individuals and organizations all over the city, asking an engine house here, a railroad track there, in addition to the concessions offered by the railroad interests.

Just what is the valuation upon the property asked of the city by the terminal and railroad companies and what the value of property offered in exchange, is the topic of warmest discussion.

At meetings yesterday and the day before, Mayor Simon and the bridge committee of the council attempted no definite valuations. It is considered important that they have a list of values before they meet with representatives of the railroad interests tomorrow. The bridge committee of the North East Improvement association will attempt to supply these valuations, in response to a suggestion from the mayor.

Communication to Mayor.

A communication was addressed to the mayor this morning by the improvement association committee, in the opinion upon valuations is being prepared today by the committee, and will be delivered tomorrow. Today's letter reads:

"To the Honorable the Mayor, and the Special Rights of Way Committee of the City Council—Gentlemen: In pursuance of a suggestion from the mayor to Mr. Povey of the undersigned special committee to aid in securing rights of way for the Broadway bridge, this committee begs to submit the following suggestions relative to rights of way for said bridge over the property of the Northern Pacific Terminal company on the west side, and the property of the O. R. & N. Co. on the east side of the Willamette river:

"The city requires from the Northern Pacific Terminal company a right of way over the terminal grounds above the railway tracks, extending from Front street to Seventh street, directly north of the union depot. This right of way is to be 70 feet in width and about 440 feet in length, or an aggregate of 30,800 square feet, equivalent to about seven city lots.

"The terminal company asks to have vacated portions of public streets for many years occupied by them under permission of the city, as follows:

Lin. Ft.	
On Fourth street between Hoyt and Irving streets	100
On Irving street between Fourth and Fifth streets	200
On Seventh street between Lovejoy and Front streets	520
On Eighth street from south line of Kearney to Front street, about	930
On Park street from south line of Kearney to Front street, about	1200
On Ninth street from south line of Johnston to Front street, about	1550
On Kearney street from west line of Seventh to east line of Ninth	620
On Marshall street from west line of Seventh to east line of Ninth	520
On Northrup street from east line of Ninth to Front, about	520
On Overton street from east line of Ninth to Front, about	560
Total	8840

"This is the equivalent of about 400,000 square feet, or 80 city lots.

sincerity the passing, sat side by side in common sorrow.

Largely in Body.

At 1 o'clock the members of the bar of Multnomah county met at the courthouse, and headed by the judges of the circuit court, marched in a body to the church, where space had been reserved for them.

At 1:30 o'clock the county buildings were closed and the county officials and employees stopped the wheels of county business while they paid their tribute to Judge Williams' memory.

At 2 o'clock the city hall was closed and Mayor Simon and city officials and employees attended the funeral.

The United States court, as soon as routine business was transacted this morning, adjourned for the remainder of the day out of respect. The judges of that tribunal attended the services at the church.

Business Men Attend.

The chamber of commerce, of which organization Judge Williams was one of the two honorary members, was represented by its board of trustees, composed of President William MacMaster, Vice President F. C. Knapp, Secretary Edmund G. Giltner, Harvey Beckwith, G. W. Curry, Dodge L. Gilman, H. M. Haller, Ben Selling and Charles T. Whitner.

At a meeting of the board of governors yesterday a committee consisting of E. B. Piper, Colonel James Jackson and F. S. West was appointed to draft resolutions of respect in commemoration of the death of Judge Williams.

The honorary pallbearers, selected from among those who had been long-time friends of Judge Williams, and who had stood side by side with him in public life, were Governor Benson, United States District Judge William B. Gilbert, Judge J. B. Cleland, Mayor Simon, H. W. Scott, John McCracken, William MacMaster, Charles F. Deane, W. D. Wheelwright and Cyrus A. Dolph.
