

NEW HIGH SCHOOL FOR KAMM BLOCK

Board Decides to Erect Institution Between Market, 6th, Mill and Seventh.

The school board yesterday afternoon at a special meeting authorized its building committee either to secure a 50 day option or to purchase outright the Jacob Kamm block bounded by Market, Sixth, Mill and Seventh streets. It is the intention of the board to utilize the Kamm property as a site for the proposed new west side high school.

As soon as negotiations for the new site have been advanced far enough the property purchased more than a year ago by the board for \$55,000 will be sold. This property is in the block surrounded by Couch, Seventeenth, Davis and Eighteenth streets.

When the board announced its intention some time ago of building the new high school in this location there was a strong protest on the part of neighboring property owners. Some of these said they would assist the board to sell the site if a new one should be selected in some other part of town. These people will now be asked to come forward and "make good."

The board expects to get the Kamm block for \$115,000, although Chairman Fleischner was not certain, when seen this morning, that the owner would stand by that figure which was quoted several days ago to a member of the board. Two weeks ago Mr. Kamm agreed to take \$110,000 for the block, but when seen a few days later he asked for an additional \$5,000. The block was appraised for the year 1910 at \$41,000.

The board expects to be able to sell the block bounded by Couch, Davis, Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets for \$150,000, which will give the school district a handsome profit on its investment of 18 months ago.

Hood River, Or., April 6.—The high-

est price ever paid for orchard and brush land in the Hood River valley was paid today by Reed A.
