

ISSUES WARNING CONCERNING MILK

Food Commissioner Informs
Restaurant Keepers They
Must Obey Law.

J. W. Bailey, dairy and food commissioner, is warning all restaurant keepers that they must keep within the law demanding that milk served for drinking purposes shall be rich and pure. A circular letter which he is sending to all keepers of public eating places reads:

"Your attention is respectfully called to the following extract from section 2 of the 1905 session laws of Oregon: 'An article shall be deemed adulterated within the meaning of this act—

"Ninth—Milk that contains more than 3 per cent water.

"Tenth—Milk that contains less than 13 per cent butter fat.

"Eleventh—Milk that contains less than 9 per cent of solids other than butter fat and less than 1.035 specific gravity after the cream has been removed.

"Thirteenth—Cream that contains less than 20 per cent butter fat."

Rules of Office.

"It is the ruling of this office that all milk or cream served or sold at any lunch counter, restaurant, hotel or any public eating house whatever, shall be considered as coming under the provisions of this act, and all proprietors of said public eating houses who shall serve as a part of a meal or sell by the glass or otherwise milk or cream falling below the standard herein provided shall be considered as violating the provisions of this act. In all cases where the bill of fare contains the word cream, whether it be served separately or with cereals, or with fruit, or with coffee, or if cream be ordered as a part of any meal, whether it appear on the bill of fare or not, if it be served upon an order for cream, it shall be considered as coming under the provisions of this act, and shall contain not less than 20 per cent of butter fat. It shall be considered that milk or cream served with a meal without additional charge is sold as a part of the meal, and must come within the standard provided for milk and cream. Skim milk may be served if it be served as skim milk, and if it be so stated on the bill of fare.

Make Tests Free.

"That the restaurants may be protected against the purchase of adulterated milk from the dairymen, samples taken from the milk just as delivered and thoroughly mixed by pouring from one vessel to another at least twice, and submitted to this office, will be tested free of charge and the result of said test be reported to the party submitting the sample. A 3 or 4 ounce bottle filled full to avoid churning in transit is sufficient for a test.

"Caution—Unless care is taken to keep milk thoroughly stirred (preferably by pouring back and forth) the first poured from the can will contain most of the cream, and that drawn last will be illegal for serving. Milk from topped cans cannot be expected to come within the standard, nor will cream obtained by topping meet the required 20 per cent test."

MASKED BANDIT CONFESSES CRIME

Murderer Who Has Terrorized
Springfield, Mass., for Year
Is Captured.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Springfield, Mass., April 5.—Betram Spence, the police hero today declared, has made a full confession in which he admits he killed Miss Martha Blackstone and severely wounded Miss Harrie Dow, in the Dow mansion here, March 31. The police say the confession shows beyond question that Spence is the mysterious "masked bandit" who for a year terrorized this section of Massachusetts.

The murder at the Dow residence was one of the most sensational in the police history of Springfield. A masked man entered the residence, which is in the heart of the most exclusive portion of the city. There he shot and killed Miss Blackstone and severely wounded Miss Dow. The police have been seeking the "bandit" ever since, and Spence was arrested on suspicion. The confession was forced from him, the police say, after he was confronted with evidence connecting him with the Dow shooting.

A small gold locket, bearing the initials "B. G. S." and containing the pictures of Spence's mother and sister led to his capture. The locket was

found nearly a year ago in the back yard of a residence that had been robbed. The police traced the ownership of the locket to Spence, but owing to his high standing and reputation the inquiry was dropped. The locket incident was not forgotten, however, and when the murder of Miss Blackstone shocked the community Thursday, the citizens' committee and the police started to run down every clue, and the locket problem was taken up again.

Spence was watched and was finally arrested when it was learned that he was preparing to leave town.

In his room were found two black masks, a revolver and several slouch hats, the kind always worn by the bandit. His trunks were found half filled with loot, such as watches and jewelry. The authorities declare that he led a Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde life for a year at least. During the day, they assert, he worked as a packing house clerk, while at night he played the role of burglar.

The police refuse to make Spence's confession public until after it has been presented to the grand jury. They have intimated, however, that the prisoner told where the loot from various robberies was hidden and that officers had been sent to find the stolen property.

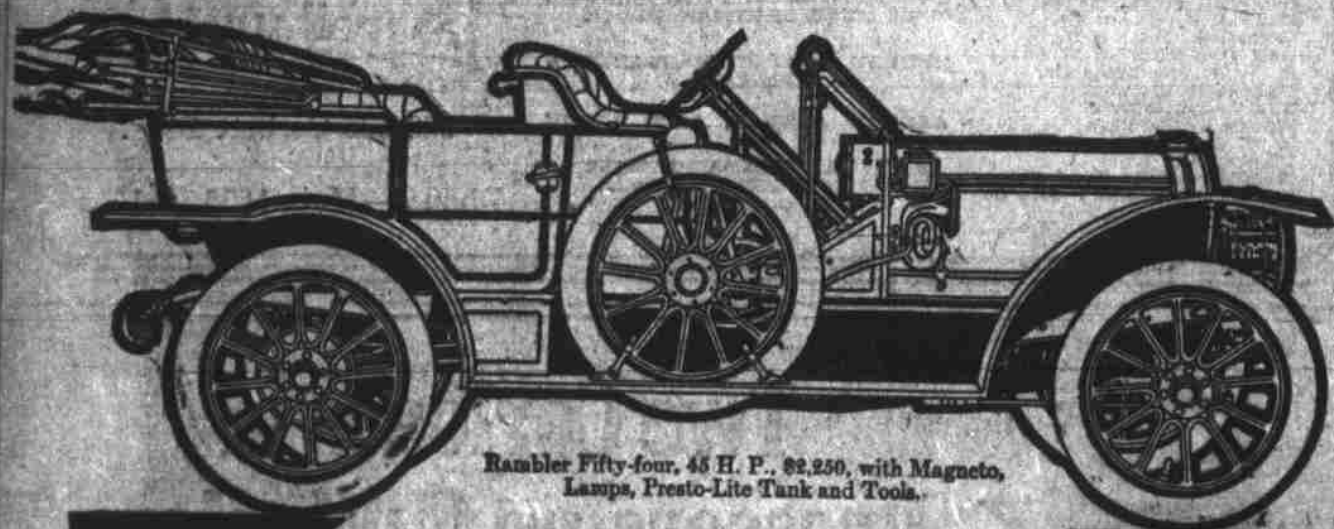

We, J. B. Purcell, president, and C. J.
