

CLUB WILL EXTEND STREETCAR LINE

Plan of Improvement Association Is to Build Car System to 27th Street.

Extension of the Woodlawn carline from its present terminus at East Eighth and Dekum to East Twenty-seventh street was decided at the meeting of the Woodlawn Improvement association in Green's hall last night. It was the first meeting held by the new organization.

At a preliminary step toward the extension of the carline, it was voted to widen Dekum avenue to fit the car from the west edge of Columbia Heights to East Twenty-seventh street. The majority of the property owners along the section of Dekum avenue in question were present and signed the petition for the widening of the street voluntarily.

The club itself is to have charge of the building of the extension of the street railway and has appointed a committee to take charge of the assessment or subsidy to be paid the railway company. Besides the subsidy the company is to be guaranteed running expenses for the line. Taking the Alberta line as an example, however, it is not believed the people will have to pay much of a guarantee. The Alberta line paid its own expenses after the first month.

A general movement towards cleaning up the suburb was undertaken last night. The Portland Railway, Light & Power company has promised to assist. It has promised to remove the old barn which has been an eyesore for some time, to clean up all the rubbish lying around the barn and to build an up to date waiting room.

A committee was also appointed to report on the status of the preliminary survey for a sewer for Woodlawn. The residents want a sewer and are willing to pay for it. The committee intends to see what can be done towards securing it.

BAD ROADS MEAN NO RURAL DELIVERY

In a circular letter received from P. V. DeGraw, fourth assistant postmaster general, Assistant Postmaster W. E. Williamson is informed that unless the different counties of the state keep roads in rural free delivery shape, he and other postoffice officials should notify the postoffice department to the end that action looking toward discontinuing certain routes may be taken.

The circular asks that all postmasters keep themselves informed as to the condition of the roads over which their rural free delivery carriers are compelled to travel. If it is found that certain roads are not in good shape, the postmaster is asked to notify the county commissioners. If the commissioners do not make an effort to improve the road or roads in question, the fourth assistant postmaster general asks that the department be notified, which notification, it is understood, is sufficient to cause the postoffice department to discontinue the route or routes.

Only two rural free delivery routes are sent out of the Portland postoffice. One is R. F. D. No. 1, from Montavilla into the country, and the other is R. F. D. No. 2, which covers the Cornell and Barnes roads.

PRESIDENT TAFT ASKS ALL PEOPLE TO HELP CENSUS ENUMERATORS

The census begins April 15, and must be completed in 30 days in all other areas.

The enumerators will wear a badge inscribed "United States Census, 1910."

The law requires every adult person to furnish the prescribed information, but also provides that it shall be treated confidentially, so that no injury can come to any person from answering the questions.

The president has issued a proclamation, calling on all citizens to cooperate with the census, and assuring them that it has nothing to do with taxation, army or jury service, compulsory school attendance, regulation of immigration, or enforcement of any law, and that no one can be injured by answering the inquiries.

It is of the utmost importance that the census of population and agriculture in this state be complete and correct.

Therefore every person should promptly, accurately, and completely answer the census questions asked by the enumerators.

SIGMA NU SOCIETY CONVENTION IN GEORGIA

Atlanta, Ga., April 7.—The Georgia state convention of the Sigma Nu fraternity, the youngest of the Greek letter college societies, began in this city today. Besides the Georgia chapter the three Alabama chapters of the University of Alabama, Auburn and Howard universities are represented at the meeting which will continue its sessions until the end of the week.

The Sigma Nu fraternity was organized at Lexington, Va., January 1, 1889. Five young men of the Virginia Military Institute felt that they were oppressed by college men, who were attached to other fraternities, and refused to be dictated to in college affairs and in a spirit of rebellion they founded the Sigma Nu fraternity. This society has grown until it now embraces 33 active chapters, having a membership of over 8000. Among the most notable of its living graduate members are Wade H. Ellis, former assistant attorney general of the United States and Congressman Clayton of Alabama and Helm of Kentucky.

Fire Destroys Farm Home.

OLD TIMER SEES GREAT CHANGE IN PORTLAND

After an absence of 18 years, "Jake" Brenner, one of the "boys" of Portland of a quarter century ago, has returned, accompanied by his wife, to meet old friends and visit old scenes. Mr. and Mrs. Brenner are staying at The Cornolius.

Mr. Brenner left Portland 24 years ago, and although he visited here several times up to 10 years ago he has not seen the city for a decade and a half. Mr. Brenner was proprietor of the Esmond hotel in Portland for years, giving it up in 1886. He was one of the characters of the Society of Amateur musicians and was prominent in musical circles in Portland. Leaving Portland in 1886, Mr. Brenner went to Los Angeles, Cal., where he engaged in the business of selling pianos and musical instruments. Later he moved to San Francisco, and went through the fire and earthquake. He is now proprietor of a San Francisco piano sales house.

"Sixteen years have made a wonderful difference in Portland," said Mr. Brenner. "Many of my old friends have died or left the city, but I have found a number, and all of them have prospered."

"Portland, itself, is a revelation. Where a quarter century ago I knew every street, alley-way, lane and cow path, I found that when I went down town yesterday I could not find my way around. I have found that great buildings have risen on lots where we, as boys, played marbles. Where before I knew nearly every person in the city, I am a stranger now."

"Within four or five years' time real-estate values in Portland will just about double. I saw Los Angeles rise and build up wonderfully, and I can see now that Portland will follow suit, and in the same way. I hear something of inflated values, but I know, from my experience in Los Angeles, that the values are not artificial."

CENSUS TAKERS HAVE NO SNAP

Will Find Task of Getting History of Families Quite Difficult.

In the eyes of Census Supervisor Beach, the wisest enumerator of all the Oregon appointees is not so accurate but that his first work will need checking over.

"Getting every detail of a family's history in the short space of the fewest possible moments is no sinecure," said Mr. Beach today. "To get all this information properly and accurately arranged will be a bewildering job for the first few days."

"For that reason I have instructed all census enumerators to send to me direct the records of their first few days' work. All this matter will be checked over in the Portland office, and enumerators who are not doing their work as they should will be shown how to do it right."

The census supervisor says that Seattle methods in census taking will not be patterned after in Portland.

"We want all the people we can find actually living here, but no more," he said. "We won't tag people at the station or those who come here on a week's visit."

Mr. Beach left for a tour of cities in the second congressional district this morning. He will not return to Portland until Monday. Meanwhile, he will visit La Grande, The Dalles, Pendleton, Baker City and Astoria. He will address the census supervisors concerning their duties and make certain that in each city there will be enough enumerators to cover the field. He will speak to the enumerators of Portland in the assembly room of the Commercial club at 4 o'clock in the afternoon of April 14.
