Taxidermists Wanted—Taxidermists (male) are wanted by the government. Wants \$10,000 From Wyatt—Circuit Judge Cleland this morning took up the trial of the suit of Elam Shaw against F. J. Wyatt, in which Shaw demands \$10,000 damages because Wyatt went into business and dealt with Shaw's old customers after he had agreed, it is alleged, not to do so. Shaw and Wyatt formerly were partners in a bicycle shop at 207 Stark street, and Wyatt sold out his interest to Shaw in 1907 for \$1500. At that time, it is alleged, he agreed not to engage in any business that would compete with Shaw for two years thereafter, but he soon set up a shop at 183 Morrison street. A jury has been called to try the case.

Damages Awarded Woman—Thirty-five hundred dollars damages in excess of benefits was awarded to Margaret Holland in the circuit court for property wronging in her name at Mill and Sixteenth streets, 30 by 110 feet. The lot is to be taken by the city in the opening of Mill street. It has been occupied by Mrs. Holland and her husband, Patrick Holland, as their home for many years. The viewers appointed by the city awarded \$2880 damages and the Hollands appealed, a verdict for the increased amount being returned yesterday afternoon in Judge Cleland's department.

POLICE ORGANIZE FOR PROTECTION

Will Have Beneficiary and Athletic Association of Their Own.

A benefit feature was added yesterday to the Portland Police Athletic association, such as is maintained by all departments of the larger cities of the country. All members of the athletic club are eligible to the new organization.

Henceforth, each member of the police department has paid 24 cents each month into the fund for injured and sick firemen and patrolmen. This was compulsory. The police felt they should be free to manage their own benefit funds. In order to withdraw from the old system, a legislative measure will have to be adopted and the charter changed. This will be attempted at the next session of the legislature.

The new organization starts with a fund of \$800, which was derived from the annual ball. Each member is to pay 10 cents a month, which gives him privilege of athletic and club rooms and financial relief. A graded scale for sickness or injuries is provided by the new organization.

The name of the new club will be the Portland Police Athletic and Beneficiary association. The same officers for the athletic club have charge of the new society. They are Patrolman Ben Wade, president; R. S. Black, secretary; and L. Madden, treasurer. A board of directors will be elected at the next meeting.
