

BUCKBEE HAS NEW IDEA FOR AIRSHIP

YOU CAN DIE AND STILL BE COUNTED

Resembles Life Saving Boat But It Must Be Shown to Census Taker You Lived Until April 15.

C. H. Buckbee of Sellwood has a new scheme for an airship. He has experimented with a model 24 feet in length and finds that the model will do everything that it is called upon to do. He is now at work on a larger ship, capable of carrying three persons and expects to have it completed in time to enter in the Rose Carnival aviation meet.

The Buckbee machine is to be equipped with two 40 horsepower motors, and is expected to be capable of developing a speed of 40 or more miles an hour. It is also the contention of the inventor that the machine can be used in any kind of weather.

The main body of the airship is to resemble a life-saving boat. On the top will be fixed a raising device, working something on the principle of an electric fan. On the nose of the boat, and on each side will be the driving propellers, three in number, which will work something after the plan of the marine turbine.

It is explained by Buckbee that the lifting device will take the boat up into the air, where the wheel will be stopped and the propellers started, driving the ship ahead. Since the driving power will be communicated to the wheels by a clutch, as in automobile construction, Buckbee contends that he will be able to reverse his engine in the air and back his machine up as easily as an automobile is backed. He expects to make a practical demonstration of what his machine will do in June.

"Kindly do not die until after April 15, but be sure to be born before April 15." is the title of a petition addressed to local residents by Portland population boosters.

For if you live until April 15 and die April 15, you will yet be counted one of the population. But if you should die April 14, you are out of the game. The census enumerators will not be interested in your name, your age, your personal appearance nor what you are doing. He will assume that you are being enumerated elsewhere.

The same rule applies to your getting married, divorced or widowed. If any one of the three happened before April 15 it counts, but if after April 15, even though the enumerator came to see you April 20 or April 25, no account whatever is taken of your present condition.

Instructions to Enumerators. Uncle Sam's instruction to census enumerators covering this point reads: "All returns on the population schedule should relate to the census day, April 15, 1910. Thus, persons dying after April 15 should be enumerated, but persons born after April 15 should not be enumerated. Again, persons who were single on April 15 should be so reported, even though they have married between that date and the day of your visit, and this is also true with respect to persons who become widowed or divorced after April 15."

The paragraph of instructions introduces, however, another serious question. What place of residence shall be assigned the accommodating individual, who, fired by municipal ambition, refuses to die until after April 15 and then sleeps peacefully in the cemetery?

What Shall It Be?

Should it be, "John Smith; residence Riverview cemetery?" But the complete instructor of Uncle Sam to the enumerator answers even this bewildering query. It reads:

"The law provides that all persons shall be enumerated at their 'usual place of abode' on April 15, 1910. This means the place where they may be said to live or belong or the place which is their home."

"As a rule the usual place of abode is not the place where a person works or where he eats, but where he regularly sleeps. Note, however, that where a man happens to sleep at the time of enumeration may not be the place where he regularly sleeps."
