INVESTIGATION OF
HINDU RIOTS ON

Grand Jury Takes Up Inquiry
of Trouble in St. Johns;
Officials Implicated.

Investigation by the grand jury of the Hindu riots at St. Johns began at a late hour this morning. Owing to delay in reaching St. Johns, the grand jury was not able to get to work before 11 o'clock and spent much of the rest of the morning in visiting the various scenes of the rioting. The taking of evidence will begin this afternoon.

The investigation will, according to Deputy District Attorney Garland, take up the greater part of five or six days. Nearly 150 witnesses are to be examined. Any connection the St. Johns officials may have had with the riots will be thoroughly inquired into. It is maintained by the prosecutor that the rioters were encouraged by the city officials.

12,000 ARMENIANS
DYING OF FAMINE

New York, April 12.—Twelve thousand Armenians are starving and many of them will die unless aid is sent them from this side, according to a cablegram received here by the American Relief association. Money is needed to purchase foodstuffs until the latter part of June, when the harvest season commences.

The association has sent out an appeal. In the request for donations it is stated that \$1500 have already been sent and that \$10,000 more is needed.

RECORD FRUIT CROP
PREDICTED IN OREGON

ONE MILLION FOR
FOREIGN MISSIONS

Methodist Society Plans to In-
crease Membership
Quickly.

The spirit that stirred the laymen of the nation to unusual activity in missionary lines has affected other missionary workers as well. Drawing inspiration from the Laymen's Missionary Movement, which has sought to double the gifts of the church to foreign missions, the Women's Foreign Missionary society of the Methodist Episcopal church has set a goal for itself in increased membership and increased giving.

The general society of the Methodist church will try to obtain 1,000,000 new members in five years in each year it will try to increase its appropriations for foreign missions \$100,000. The share of the Columbia river branch, now in session at the Taylor Street Methodist church, will be 1200 new members in five years. The branch has appropriated an advance of \$1500, but is now trying to raise this to \$3000. The general society gave last year almost \$700,000, and in the four years of its existence has appropriated over \$10,000,000 to foreign missions.

COMMERCIAL BODIES
TO BOOST CENSUS

The commercial bodies of Portland have arranged to check up the work of the census so that no resident of Portland may be missed.

"I will welcome the help," said Census Supervisor S. C. Beach today. "Our commercial organizations are certainly all right. They have been very prompt in offering assistance and I shall avail myself of all the help that will be given. If I miss any one according to the present arrangement the commercial bodies will land on me just about proper, and so together we will get the census as accurately as is necessary and we will know how many people are living in Portland."

Supervisor Beach is preparing to meet all the enumerators who will work in Portland and Multnomah county on Thursday evening at 8 o'clock in the assembly room of the Commercial club. "This will be a vitally important meeting," said Mr. Beach. "I cannot urge too strongly that every enumerator be present. The success of our work in this locality will hinge largely upon the success of that meeting."

Commander Hill on Trial.

Portsmouth, N. H., April 12.—A court martial convened at the Portsmouth navy yard today for the trial of Commander Frank K. Hill, U. S. N., on charges growing out of the condition of his ship, the gunboat Marietta. Keen interest is manifested in the case, not only because of Commander Hill's exalted position as an officer, but because the charges are without precedent in the history of the navy. The only reason suggested for the alleged action of Commander Hill in allowing the Marietta to become "dirty" was that he had lost interest in the ship, because he did not believe the command of the gunboat was commensurate with his rank.

No Hanging in Saylor Case.

Waukegan, Ill., April 12.—Judge Dibble today set April 30 as the date for a hearing of arguments on the motion of the Saylor defense for a new trial of Mrs. J. E. Saylor and Dr. William Miller, convicted of manslaughter. Mrs. Saylor, who was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary for the killing of her husband, is prostrated today. Her attorneys will not make a statement, but it is intimated that if the motion for a new trial is denied they will take the case to the supreme court of Illinois. If a new trial is granted the defendants can be tried on a manslaughter charge only, as yesterday's verdict prevents any action against them on a charge of murder.

Monument to Henry Clay.

Lexington, Ky., April 12.—The one hundred and thirty-third anniversary of the birth of Henry Clay, who was born in Virginia April 12, 1777, witnessed the completion and dedication of the new monument erected here in his memory to take the place of the memorial which was destroyed by lightning several years ago. The new monument was designed by Charles F. Mulligan of Chicago and depicts Clay in the period of greatest vitality, in the full strength of his oratorical powers, delivering a speech in congress.

Destroyer Launched at Bath.

Bath, Maine, April 12.—At the shipyards of the Bath Iron works the torpedo boat destroyer Paulding was successfully launched today. As she slid from the ways the new naval vessel was christened by Miss Emma Paulding of Huntington, L. I., daughter of the late Admiral Hiram Paulding, in honor of whose memory the destroyer was named. A large number of invited guests attended the launching. The Paulding is of 400 tons displacement and is designed to have a speed of 25 knots.

Bishop Grafton 80 Years Old.

Fond du Lac, Wis., April 12.—Bishop Grafton of this city, one of the best known Episcopal clergymen in America, reached his eightieth birthday anniversary today. The bishop was born in Boston and received much of his education in England. During the 30 years that he has been in charge of the Fond du Lac diocese he has been particularly active in educational work.

Textile Meeting at Memphis.

Memphis, Tenn., April 12.—Pursuant to the call issued recently by Governor Patterson of Tennessee, a three days conference of representatives of the textile manufacturing plants and the labor organizations of the cotton states was begun in this city today. The chief purpose of the conference is to arrive at some agreement in respect to the hours and conditions of labor in the southern cotton mills.

Enumerators Get Busy.

Bristol, Wash., April 12.—Census enumerators from all parts of Klickitat county met in White Salmon yesterday for final instructions preparatory to taking the 1910 census, which begins Friday. Edwin P. Case, special agent, represented Supervisor Guy E. Kelly, of Tacoma, at the meeting.

MAN BECOMES CRAZY
WHEN SHOW RECALLS
DOMESTIC TROUBLES

During a theatrical performance at Florence one day last week Green witnessed a scene that reminded him of his domestic troubles years ago, and his mind soon afterward became unbalanced.

POOR FARM TANGLE
NOT EASY TO SETTLE

Because of the tangle over the sale of the county poor farm, County Judge Cleeton and the county commissioners may ask the circuit court to name a trustee to receive the deed to the property, the trustees being held to account for a division of the property as the courts may finally decide.

Judge Cleeton and the commissioners want to give a deed and close up the transaction, but are anxious to avoid the possibility of a new suit. B. M. Lombard has offered a certified check for \$30,000 for the first payment and is willing to be designated as trustee for the others, as their interests may appear. H. R. Reynolds, chief holder in the United States Trust company, to which W. A. Spanton, the original bidder, made an assignment, also assures the court that he is ready to pay.

TAKES LEAD FOR HIS
ACHES, AND WILL DIE

Los Angeles, Cal., April 12.—Steve Bodig is near death at the California hospital, because he swallowed 14 ounces of lead to cure a stomach ache. The metal was removed by a delicate operation, but the attending physicians declare that Bodig contracted tuberculosis as the result of the lead poisoning, and has but little chance to recover.

Bodig swallowed the lead after someone had told him it would relieve severe abdominal pains to which he was subject. He secured the metal by chipping it off a sewer pipe. He carried it in his stomach for several weeks before he took his case to a physician.

Bodig is a Slavonian laborer, about 35 years of age, and has a family.

GILLETT WOULD NOT
REFUSE THE TOGA

Los Angeles, Cal., April 12.—Governor Gillett has intimated that if sufficiently urged he might, despite reputed "authentic" announcements to the contrary, become a candidate to succeed Frank P. Flint in the United States senate.

When confronted with a pointblank question concerning the possibility of his entering the senatorial race, Gillett replied:

"I am not going to announce my candidacy for any office, but neither have I stated that I would not be a candidate for some office. I don't believe that sort of thing is wise. You know, many men have declared positively that they would not seek an office, yet when the time came they were among the candidates."

"If a sufficient number of Republicans urge me to make a fight for the senatorship, I don't know what my attitude would be. One can never tell what way his mind might turn. At any rate, it is certain that I have not announced that I would be a candidate."

Woes of Auto Speeder Increase.

Redwood City, Cal., April 12.—Under the provisions of a new county ordinance which went into effect here today the speed of automobiles is limited to 10 miles an hour on country highways and to 10 miles an hour in cities and towns. A unique feature of the ordinance is that autoists must stop their cars when signaled to do so by drivers of horses. This is for the purpose of preventing accidents. Violation of the law constitutes a misdemeanor punishable by a maximum fine of \$50 or 25 days imprisonment in the county jail. The informer is to receive \$10 for his trouble in case the county collects a fine.

Uses Beer Bottle; Arrested.

Albany, Or., April 12.—Harry Owens, formerly of Portland, and lately a clerk

in a local store, was arrested yesterday by Chief of Police Munkers and bound over to the grand jury under \$500 bonds on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. He is charged with hitting a fellow employe over the head with a beer bottle and fracturing his skull.

PEACEMAKER GETS
SHOT IN THE BACK

Imperial Junction, Cal., April 12.—A posse started today for Flowing Well to arrest W. R. Petty, a track walker employed by the Southern Pacific railroad, who, it is alleged, shot and seriously wounded C. H. Wismer of Los Angeles when Wismer interfered in an argument between Petty and another man.

According to Wismer's story he attempted to prevent Petty from striking a smaller man. Petty's wife, he states, ran from the section house, revolver in hand. Petty, Wismer said, took the weapon and shot him through the back. Wismer was taken to Yuma for medical attention. Later he was placed on a westbound train and taken to Los Angeles. He is an assistant signal supervisor for the Los Angeles division of the Southern Pacific.

Officers who tried to arrest Petty, it was reported, were prevented from doing so by his wife, who guarded the door of the section house where he had taken refuge, with a revolver.
