

WM. PENN. WATSON CALLED BY DEATH

Former Resident of Portland Dies at Ripe Age at Long Beach, Cal.

William Penn Watson, one of Oregon's most prominent citizens 20 years ago, died at Long Beach, Cal., yesterday from the effects of an operation which he was unable to stand at his advanced age. Mr. Watson was 84 years of age and was prominent in politics and in fair circles in this state. He was president of the state fair board a number of years.

VANCOUVER TO HAVE LYCEUM CLUB COURSE

SUFFRAGISTS THANK TAFT

Those Who Hissed Speech Are, by Negation, Repudiated in Resolution.

(Called From Lensed Wire.) Washington, April 15.—Amid loud cheers, the convention of the National Woman Suffrage association today adopted unanimously a resolution thanking President Taft for the speech he delivered before the delegates last night. Reference to the hisses which a portion of the speech was greeted with was omitted from the resolution. It is said the delegates will take no formal notice of the incident, on the ground that visitors in the hall, and not delegates to the convention, took part in the demonstration against the president's position.

The general election in Georgia this year will be held October 5, when a full list of state and county officials will be chosen.

2 SCHOOL GIRLS COMMIT SUICIDE

Despondency and Chance to Get Names in Paper Reasons for Rash Deeds.

(United Press Lensed Wire.) Pittsburg, April 15.—Two school girls, Mildred Brown, 13, and Naomi Haylett, 17, died today, suicides. The two girls were almost inseparable. They had a long talk together and discussed their troubles. Mildred Brown killed herself because she could not keep up in her studies. The Haylett girl ended her life because of a love affair. Mildred Brown's body was discovered by her aunt. The papers printed a story of her death and published her photograph. Naomi secured a copy of the paper and went to her room. Later her sister heard her groan and went to the room. The girl was dying. On her breast was a note reading: "Put my picture in the papers, too."

Charles Sued for Commission

B. R. Charles, who lost \$5000 through the mysterious "A. B. Carson" from the safety deposit vault of the German-American bank, has been sued in the circuit court by J. W. Wilson, who was a salesman for stock in the Electro-Thermal Garment Manufacturing company. Wilson says he was to receive \$50 per month and 50 per cent commission on all sales. He sold \$25,000 worth of stock to Arthur C. Strubling, he states, and is entitled to half the money. Charles at that time owned three-fourths of the \$50,000 capital stock of the company.

DAVENPORT WITNESS IN MRS. JOHNSON CASE

Vancouver, Wash., April 15.—By coming to Vancouver to deliver a lecture, Homer Davenport, noted cartoonist and lecturer, will figure as a witness in the case of the Northern Pacific Railroad company vs. Mrs. Mabel Johnson, alias Hazel Peterson, which will be called for trial in the superior court of Vancouver on April 28. Mr. Davenport came to Vancouver to deliver a lecture, and was yesterday subpoenaed in the case. He is alleged to have been a passenger on a train with Mrs. Johnson, between Portland and San Francisco, soon after she had settled with the company for \$1250, and to have overheard certain remarks relative to the case.

CASHED CHECK; KEPT MONEY, IS THE CHARGE

Vancouver, Wash., April 15.—G. E. Pettit, who it is alleged cashed a check for his landlady and kept the money, will be given a hearing before Judge McMaster today. Mrs. Parker keeps a boarding house for the Lake River Boom & Logging company near Felida, and gave Pettit a check for \$120 to bring to Vancouver and cash for her. He was to pay W. S. Miller \$50 of this money and she then loaned Pettit the balance, and he was also to get his watch out of pawn with this money and return it to her for security, she alleges. Not hearing from the man, Mrs. Parker telephoned Miller who told her he had not been paid any money. Mrs. Parker then notified the police. Officer Cresap arrested the man in Portland and brought him back to Vancouver. He says he intended to pay the bill.

FRIJOLES BATTLE STILL IN PROGRESS IN BANANA LAND

Bluefields, Nicaragua, April 15.—(By Wireless to Colon.)—Fighting between the Estrada and Madris factions of the government of Nicaragua has been resumed, following a long truce. An engagement occurred yesterday between the armies somewhere on the road between La Magua and Acosyapa, according to runners who reached here today. Heavy losses are reported on both sides as a result of the engagement. The Madris army retreated late in the day to Acosyapa, where it is resting today.

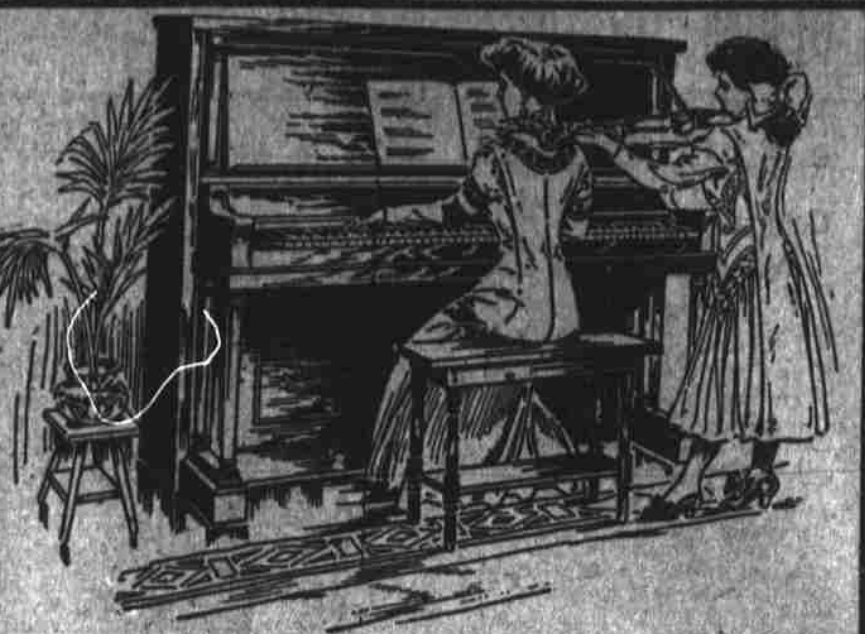
