

MAYOR REALIZES FIREBOAT NEEDED

Gives in to Plea for Better Fire Protection; Authorizes Bond Issue.

The determined efforts of the Portland Chamber of Commerce to convince Mayor Simon that the city is badly in need of a new fireboat and reinforcing mains for the protection of business houses in the neighborhood of the water front have proved successful. The mayor has concluded to withdraw his opposition to the sale of \$275,000 worth of bonds, which were voted by the people for the purpose of installing reinforcing mains and securing a new fireboat.

In accordance with Mayor Simon's recommendations the fire committee of the city executive board yesterday afternoon instructed Fire Chief Campbell to seek a mooring place for the new boat.

"The mayor told me this morning," said Chairman John F. O'Shea of the committee, "that he believes the time is now ripe for the acquisition of a fireboat and additional protection for the water front in the way of reinforcing water mains. I think we should proceed to select a landing place for the fireboat as it will be long enough before we can get the boat, anyway, even if we make all possible haste."

A committee from the Chamber of Commerce, headed by President MacMaster, visited the mayor yesterday to urge him to use his influence to sell the \$500,000 dock bond issue. The mayor was noncommittal on the subject of docks. He said he would have to give it more careful consideration before coming to any decision, but lessened the disappointment of the committee by promising the city a new fireboat.

SAYS CHARGE MADE BY EXPRESS CO. EXCESSIVE

W. J. Wimer, of Waldo, Or., had occasion to ship by express 17 pounds of sand from Grants Pass to Portland, and was charged 6 cents per pound for the same. Mr. Wimer believes the charge excessive.

Inquiry at the Wells Fargo & Co.'s express office here establishes the fact that the express rate for sand is \$2.25 per 100 pounds, or the same as on merchandise, and that the value on express packages is not considered in making the charges unless the value is over

\$50. All packages under \$50 are figured on weight alone.

The 6 cent charge on the small sand shipment is explained by the fact that on weights of less than 50 pounds, the express company uses a graduated scale, which runs like this: One pound, 25 cents; two pounds, 35 cents; 3 pounds, 45 cents; four pounds, 55 cents; five pounds, 65 cents; seven pounds, 75 cents; eight, nine or 10 pounds, 75 cents; 10 to 15 pounds, 85 cents; 16 to 20 pounds, \$1.

The sand was shipped here as samples and carried no intrinsic value. The express company explains that sand is a class of freight that should be sent by freight and not express.

Mr. Wimer, however, contends that to charge 6 cents per pound, or about \$1 for carrying 17 pounds of sand from Grants Pass to Portland, is out of reason.

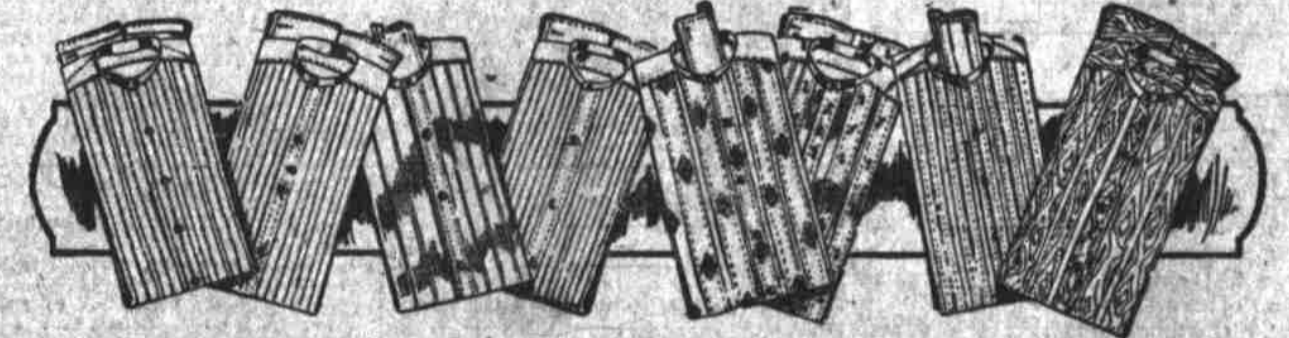
