TWO EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS AT BUTTE

Other Parts of Montana Also Feel Vibrations—No Damage Reported.

Butte, Mont., April 18.—Two earth shocks at 1:30 o'clock this morning, rocked buildings of the city in a terrifying manner for about a second, causing people to rush wildly into the street. The movement was from west to east. The first shock was nothing more than a slight vibration but the second was very severe. The shocks were felt at Missoula, Helena, Great Falls, Bozeman and Livingston, but at those places were they as severe as at Butte. No damage is reported other than cracked walls.

HYDE'S ATTORNEY SAYS PROSECUTION PLAYED THE GHOUL

In Opening in Swope Case Defense Charges Tampering With Body of Swope; State's Chief Witness Dead.

Kansas City, Mo., April 18.—The defense of Dr. B. C. Hyde, charged with the murder of Colonel Thomas H. Swope, outlined its case today. Attorney Frank P. Walsh for the defense began his opening statement by charging that the prosecution played the ghoul in its handling of the case. "Those statements are based upon the testimony of paid detectives, and spring from malice and envy," he said.

Legs Roll; 2 Boys Drowned.

Olympia, Wash., April 18.—News of the drowning of Charles McCarty, 16 years of age, and Roy Whidden, 14, and the narrow escape of John Savage, 14, at Long Lake, this county, Sunday afternoon, has just reached here. Three fishermen saw the accident and rescued Savage. The bodies of McCarty and Whidden were in the water an hour before they were recovered.

When the girl who played the part became ill in San Francisco and had to be sent back home, the manager was disappointed.

A few lines printed in the Los Angeles Herald, explaining the predicament, brought speedy relief. Marjorie Marsh saw the announcement, applied for the part and got it. A local Los Angeles artificial limb company is busy turning out a "quick detachable" leg for use on the stage. Meantime Miss Marsh continues to use the limb she had made in Ohio for street use and for which a railroad company paid her \$2500. She will make her debut with "The Gingerbread Man" next Sunday afternoon.
