WRIGHTS TO TASTE OWN MEDICINE

Suit to Enjoin Them From Manufacturing Aeroplanes Filed By Pasadena Man.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Cincinnati, April 20.—A suit to enjoin the Wright brothers from manufacturing or selling aeroplanes was filed in the federal court here yesterday by Charles Lamson of Pasadena, Cal. Lamson, in the suit, charges that the Wright aeroplanes infringe a patent for a box kite which Lamson and his brother patented a number of years ago, previous to the issuance of the Wright patents.

During the Los Angeles aviation meet in November, Lamson and his brother, who are jewelers in a small suburb of Pasadena, called on Glenn Curtiss, who has had several encounters with the Wrights in connection with patent infringements, and explained that he held patents on the wing warping device, which the Wrights claim to have invented.

The result of the conference between the Lamsons and Curtiss was not made public. It was announced soon afterward by Lamson that he would bring suit against the Wrights. When Lamson patented his box kite he entered a proviso in his application for a patent, to the effect that the kite could be driven by power and be so constructed as to carry a man.

War Cloud Again in Nicaragua

Colon, April 20.—A wireless dispatch received here from the commander of the gunboat Paducah at Bluefields, Nicaragua, declares that the army of Madris is within miles of the city and a battle is imminent. The revolutionists are hastily preparing for a last desperate stand, and the remnants of the Estrada army are being hurried to Bluefields. They have been in the vicinity of Acopya. It is believed that Estrada was outflanked and that the Madris forces, by a ruse after the fighting at Acopya a few days ago, have stolen a march on Estrada.

PREFERS BRONCHO TO AUTOMOBILE

Cowpuncher Has No Faith in Chug-chug Wagon; Wants Sure Thing.

Cowpunchers down in central Oregon do not believe in patronizing chug-chug wagons. They prefer the old reliable way of traveling—by stage or in the saddle. Of course they have no objection to a long journey by train, but as for the auto, well, they have yet to be cultivated.

This is the assertion of Harry Benoit, a young cowboy and rancher who drifted into Portland yesterday from the interior of Lake county, to pass a few days with relatives and friends in vicinity of Milwaukie.

"Automobiles, I should say not," the cowpuncher exclaimed when asked if he came from Silver Lake to Shaniko over the auto line as do most tenderfeet covering the distance between these points.

Branch Better Than Auto

"When we go traveling we go in a way that makes it something like certain we get there," he continued. "The turned autos break down half the time, but take a broncho and he's always there. And there ain't nothing the matter with the stage."

"Lots of people are coming into central Oregon to take up land, but I don't know how some will come out. You see it ain't all the land that's good for farming. Some needs water and that they ain't got everywhere."

"Yes I hear a good deal of dry farming. I don't know a thing about it. Down on our ranch we have enough water to go around. We till the ground and put in the seed and that's all there is to it. That dry farming scheme is a new one, gotten up by the real estate men to sell land. Down our way we just let the grain grow."

Cattle Driven to Reno

Speaking of stockraising young Benoit said building of the Oregon Trunk line into central Oregon will give the cattlemen of Lake and Klamath counties a much shorter drive than now. At present most cattle are driven to Reno, Nev., he says, and shipped to other markets than Portland. But with the big packing plants here and the railroad nearer Portland should become the logical market.

"But," said he, "we won't have to sell here, for we are accustomed to long drives—I have driven as far as Spokane and we'll drive to whatever point pays the best. And with the packing plants at Portland we have several markets. It should mean a great deal to the stockraisers."

Benoit said the stockmen suffered very little last winter from severe weather and everything looks fine at present. He anticipates a good crop of grain this season.

TAGGART CALLS ENEMY'S BLUFF

Announces He Will Be Candidate for Senate, Before Convention.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 20.—Thomas Taggart, former chairman of the Democratic national committee, will be a candidate for nomination for the United States senate before the state Democratic convention, if the convention decides to select a candidate to oppose Senator Beveridge. The announcement comes from a close personal friend of Taggart, and is regarded as authentic. The suggestion that the state convention nominate a party candidate for the senate was made by Governor Thomas R. Marshall. Most of the politicians here regarded the suggestion as a slap at Taggart. It was believed that while Taggart would be a candidate for the senate if the Democrats carried the state legislature, he would not go before the convention and ask the party nomination.

Marshall, however, forced Taggart into the open, and he will become a candidate if the plan for party nomination is adopted.

KING OF SIAM AND 40 WIVES TO VISIT HERE THIS SUMMER

Seattle, April 20.—The king of Siam and all his 40 wives are coming to the United States this summer, landing at Seattle. Back of the local press agent for the transcontinental roads has received orders from headquarters that it is up to him to secure the pleasure and profit of carrying the potentate and his extensive retinue. Each royal lady will be entitled to at least one personal attendant, and there will be about 20 others in the party of a sufficient rank to be entitled to first class passage.

The king's name is Chulalongkorn. This will be his second visit to this country.

SHORT LINE RAILWAY WILL BUILD BRANCH

Ostlin, Or., April 20.—William H. Bancroft, vice president and general manager of the Oregon Short Line railroad, has announced that his company will build a branch line between Astoria and Driggs, Idaho, a distance of 40 miles. It is understood that a committee of representative men from that district a few days ago journeyed to Salt Lake, where they held a conference with Mr. Bancroft, assuring him that they will secure the right-of-way for the entire distance if the railroad would build a branch line.

High Praise of Harriman Lines

Chicago, April 20.—J. C. Stubbs, vice president and general manager of the Harriman lines, is authority for a statement that the Harriman lines are in better physical condition and have better prospects than ever before.

"They are ordering more and better equipment," said Stubbs, "increasing the train service and facilities and giving promise of continuing these improvements."

Stubbs has just returned from a five week inspection trip to the lines in the United States and in Mexico.

TO SHOW WHAT SCHOOLS DOING

Beneficial Results of Medical Examination of Pupils to Be Demonstrated.

To show "what the public schools of Portland are doing for young America" is the purpose of an exhibition of methods to be given Friday afternoon at Eliot school, Knott street and Rodney avenue.

Demonstration of beneficial results attending medical examination of school children will be a feature of the occasion. Since this system was adopted some time ago parents have been induced to see that the decaying teeth of the children were filled, that deficient vision should be corrected and adenoids removed.

"But above all," said Principal S. U. Downs of the Eliot school yesterday, "we desire to prove to the parents that modern school methods are intended to produce strong and efficient men and women, developed in mind and body. We have become satisfied that such a proof will never be established until the parents have been induced to come and see for themselves."

City officials, the board of education and prominent citizens have been invited to attend, in addition to all the parents of children who attend the Eliot school. It is probable that the exhibition will be followed by similar receptions in other schools of the city. The system might be termed a "liberal education for parents." The program will commence at 2 o'clock and will end at 5 o'clock. There will be musical numbers in addition to the following demonstrations:

Drawing work—Miss Esther Wuest.
Sewing classes—Mrs. A. A. Sanborn.
Manual training—By class of William Milne.

Work in deaf and dumb class—Miss Sullivan, instructor.
Musical work—S. C. Hunter.
Trade school work—G. W. Hamilton, principal.

Health department—Mrs. Shatto.
The pupils of the Eliot school have some trophy cups and flags of which they are very proud, and their history will be related by one of the scholars.
