



Leaf had received information of the iptended attack while at the dance, and went to Roble hall with Cortes Shelton, winner of the 1906 Carnot medal, acting as bodyguage.

When the enraged students laid hold of Leaf, Shelton drew a revolver from his pocket and threatened to shoot any

one who assaulted the editor. Not to be rebbed of their prey by threats of death, several of the students closed in upon Leaf and Shel-ton. Shelton passed the gun to his brother, J. E. Shelton, president of the student body and prominent Carnot and intercollegiate debater. Cortez Shelton then stepped forward, saying;

"Till whip any one of you alone." The words had hardly left his mouth when one of the attacking party struck Shelton, knocking him down. The blow






