MINISTERS START CRUSADE AGAINST JIM-JACK COMBAT

Methodist Pastors of Cincinnati Propose Nation Wide Protest From the Pulpit, and Petition Will Follow.

PRINCE MIGUEL ROYALLY IN DEBT

And Watchdogs of Anita Stewart Treasury Refuse to Come Through.

Vienna, April 26.—Relatives of the wife of Prince Miguel of Braganza, formerly Miss Anita Stewart, have offered through their legal representatives here to settle the prince's debts at 50 cents on the dollar.

The creditors do not like this. When the prince, or the Duke of Viseu, he is more commonly called in Vienna, married Miss Stewart, they supposed Miguel would have unlimited funds at his disposal and that they would get their money in full, besides making much more out of him in future.

The young American woman's advisers were too artful for this, however, and so arranged matters that Miguel has the handling of almost no actual cash at all. Their representatives have openly informed the representatives of the creditors that they consider the latter "harpies" and would give them nothing whatever, were it not that they think the princess' situation will be more comfortable if some sort of a settlement is reached. But they think that even comfort would be purchased at too high a rate if the claims were to be paid off in full.

Though the Braganza-Stewart marriage was advertised as a genuine love match into which financial considerations did not enter, the prince being, as it was announced, a very rich man, the truth is that his debts were enormous. It is reported that he is much annoyed by the "parsimony" with which he is being treated.

people who cross it daily and will topple into the river. In addition, the resolutions point out that people are delayed in going to work by early congested traffic on the ancient and frail span, and that thousands of dollars are annually lost because of hindrance to business caused by the inadequacy of the bridge to the traffic demands made upon it.

The committee appointed from the club to wait upon mayor and council consists of J. H. Nolte, chairman; H. A. Rubie, S. L. Osborne and L. D. Hald.

Other organizations wait upon an announcement of results from this afternoon's conference before making plans for further demonstration.

The members of all these organizations are intensely concerned for the outcome of the conference. They regard the situation as critical.

The O. R. & N. company and the Northern Pacific Terminal company have offered to give the city right to construct the east and west approaches of the Broadway bridge over their grounds in return for some 80 lots of unoccupied street in the west side terminal yards, 14 blocks on the east side between East First and Second streets, and other streets upon which the railroad desires to build. The ground on the east side is wanted, according to the railroad's announcement, for a freight depot. In addition the Northern Pacific Terminal company has offered to build free of cost to the city a viaduct over the railroad tracks on Seventh street, beginning near the union depot and ending with a double approach on Front street. The O. R. & N. Co. has offered to the city, too, a tract of land in South Portland Heights that may vary in size from 35 to 55 acres and whose assessed valuation is a trifle more than \$200 an acre. The land has been desired by the city for park purposes.

PLYMOUTH ROCK HENS VIE WITH EACH OTHER IN LAYING BIG EGGS

Plymouth Rock pullets are establishing records these delightful April days. It is no unusual thing for a 10-month-old hen to present her lord and master with a 5 by 8 inch egg, in fact pullets belonging to readers of The Journal have done better than that in several cases during the past few weeks.

Mrs. E. J. Hargis, of Fulton Park has a 10-month-old Plymouth Rock hen which has laid an 8 by 5 1/2 inch egg. A peculiar feature of this pullet's exploits in the egg producing line is that she lays one of these big eggs every two weeks. Her other products are of normal size.

Carl Amous, living at Gates Crossing on the Casadero line, owns a Plymouth Rock hen not quite a year old whose latest performance in the egg line measured 7 1/2 by 6 1/2 inches.

PANAMA-PACIFIC STOCK TO BE SOLD SATURDAY

San Francisco, April 26.—The ways and means committee has set Saturday afternoon as the date when the subscription books will be thrown open and stock in the proposed Panama-Pacific exposition sold. The sale of the stock will commence promptly at 2 o'clock in the afternoon on the floor of the Merchants Exchange. The sale is to last two hours. On the same evening Governor Gillett and his party will leave for Washington, where an effort to secure federal aid for the mammoth project will be made.

Roosevelt to Open G. O. P. Campaign

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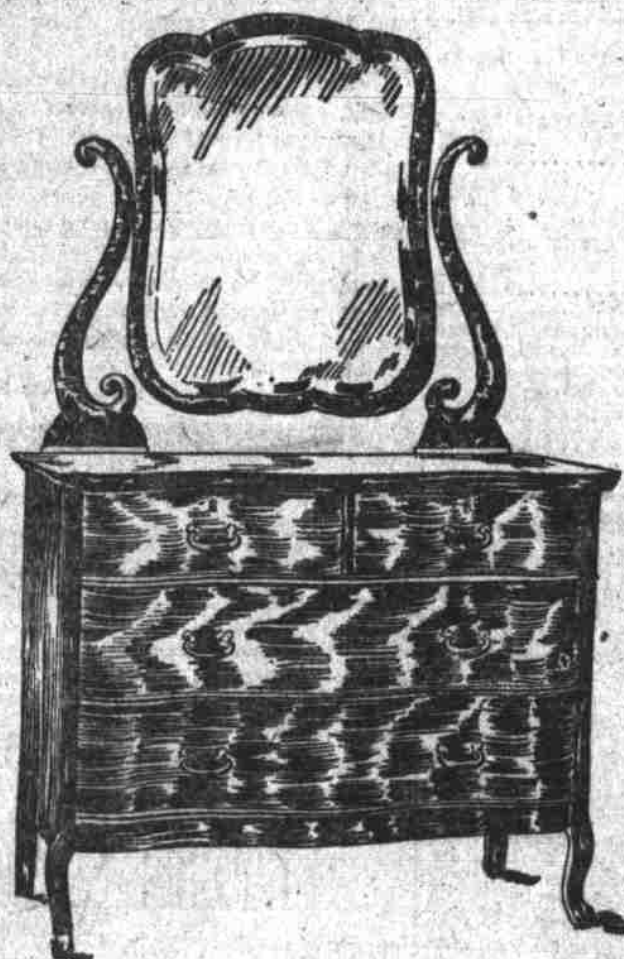
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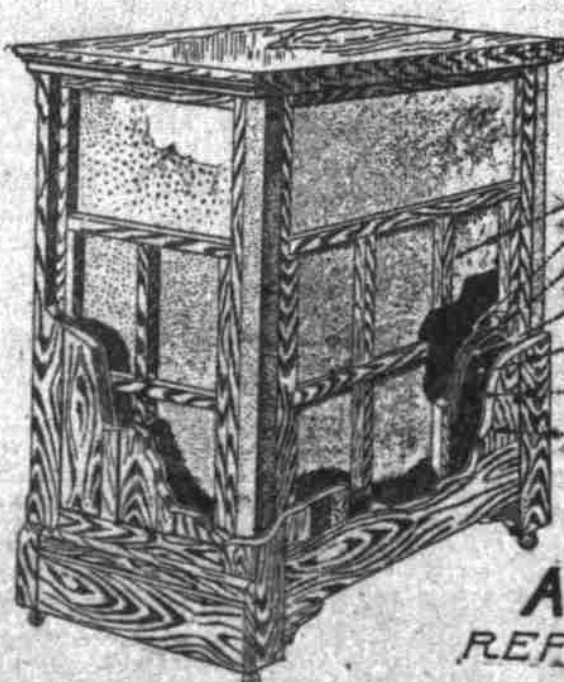
