

TO PATROL COAST FOR SMUGGLERS

Line From Ensenada to Point Barrow to Be Raked for Chinese and Opium.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, April 23.—Satisfied that smuggling of Chinese and opium is being carried on between this country and Mexico, the United States government has decided to have the coast from Ensenada to Point Barrow patrolled by revenue cutters.

The McCulloch has been taken from Sausalito to San Francisco to be overhauled. According to Captain Denslow the McCulloch will be busy all summer. The repairs will cost about \$15,000.

To search for smugglers along the north Pacific coast, the revenue cutters Snodgrass and Rush have been ordered into service and they will cover the coast from the Columbia river to Southeastern Alaska.

Other cutters which will patrol the southern coast are the Bear, Perry, Manning and Tahoma.

He is a brother-in-law of President French of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle. George F. Baker, president of the First National bank of New York, is another financial giant representing immense interests.

Although stopping off at other places in the Pacific northwest, Portland is the objective point of the trip, and for that reason the personnel of the party is taken as indicative of increasing activity on the part of the Hill interests in this state. It is believed the visit will result in an early announcement of many new railroad projects to open up isolated districts and afford better transportation facilities to sections already tapped.

To Visit Valley.
It is understood that the distinguished visitors will take a run over the Oregon Electric line into the Willamette valley and inspect the property just acquired by the Hill system, and inspection of the Oregon Trunk line through the Deschutes canyon, will in all probability also be made. Possibly some attention will be given the United Railway lines, as they too are understood to have come under the protecting wings of the Hill people, although President Greenough of Hill ownership. One important matter that will probably be definitely settled during Mr. Hill's presence here is the terminal question, the North Bank line having been unable so far to gain entrance to the union depot because of opposition on the part of the O. R. & N. company. It is understood, however, that negotiations have progressed so far and satisfactorily that the matter can be disposed of on short notice in a way that will give the North Bank trains access to the tracks at the depot.

MARSHALL PLAN WINS DELEGATES

Indiana Convention Votes to Indorse Man for Senate—Taggart Defeated.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 23.—The Indiana Democratic convention, today adopted the plan of Governor Thomas R. Marshall to indorse a candidate for the United States senate.

The fight was taken to the floor of the convention and despite the opposition of Thomas Taggart, ex-chairman of the Democratic National committee and long recognized as head of the Indiana party machine, the plan was carried. It is expected that a hot fight will develop over the naming of the candidate for the senate.

Taggart himself is an avowed candidate for the place. John E. Lamb, vice chairman of the national committee, is another candidate. He is backed by the Marshall forces.

At the opening of the convention last night the forces of Marshall won the initial victory when the committee on rules and order of business reported putting the question up to the delegates today.

The plan for the indorsement of a

senator was adopted after a hot fight. The vote was 88 1/2 to 85 1/2.

The platform adopted favors an income tax, condemns a ship subsidy, denounces the indiscriminate use of the injunction and demands jury trial for persons cited for indirect contempt of court, such as for the violation of injunctions. The platform indorses conservation.

The platform was adopted after Marshall's plan had been voted on. The platform itself does not mention the Marshall idea. It contains a single senatorial plank which declares for the direct election of United States senators.
